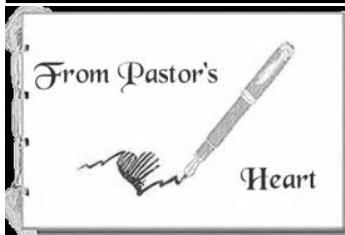

As it is written in Isaiah the prophet, "See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way; the voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight.'" Mark 1:2-3

On December 3rd, we enter the season of Advent, a season of anticipation and preparation. We begin a new church year while the world is busy finishing a calendar year—and the month is filled with shopping, pageants, and parties beyond what our energy and time can handle. But while society urges us to hurry and spend, scripture and tradition beckon us to slow down and wait.

We are again reminded that God comes to us. God came to us in the form of Jesus, many years ago in Bethlehem, and continues to come to us now in Word and Sacrament. During Advent, we prepare to celebrate the birth of Jesus who came into the world as both God and man so that our sins might be forgiven. And we anticipate the day when Jesus will return to Earth and look forward to that time with hope because through our faith we know that this means the beginning of a new life with Christ for eternity.

Our Advent wreaths and calendars are symbols and tools of what Advent urges us to do: mark the passage of time as we wait. Despite all evidence to the contrary, Advent is about the art of waiting. But holiday decorations have been on the shelves at Target and Walmart since well before Halloween, and the world declares everything after Thanksgiving Day the "Christmas season."

Though all of us are tempted to act otherwise, now is the time for slowing down. As our long ago ancestors did, we gather in the darkness to wait for the light. In the dead of winter, we need one another and we need signs that the sun (and the Son) will come again—life returning to dark and dormant land and lives. Like the ancients who gathered together for courage and hope that the sun would return, we gather each week to hear the word that does not pass away. Our scripture readings during Advent give us voice for our brokenness and the promise of a savior. We are reminded to keep alert, to stay awake, to reorder our lives, to prepare for the way of the Lord, not in haste but in love and with longing. We are called to join the baptized of all generations to testify to the one who brings light and life to a broken world.

Let this Advent season challenge us to honor these dark days. As twenty-first-century people, we are not good at either embracing darkness or slowing down. We don't even know darkness anymore—we've banished it with electricity, everywhere and at all hours. And we certainly can't wait. We look for the shortest line at the grocery store and rush through yellow lights. But we know incubation is what we often most need: for grapes to become fine wine, for a novel to be written, for dough to rise, for a crop to grow, for a baby to be born. It is in the waiting that we learn about ourselves and others, taking important steps toward understanding. Perhaps there is no better gift to teach our children than the ability to wait. Christmas is coming; it's just not here yet. (excerpts from Sundays & Seasons)

The church is full of opportunities during this season of expectant waiting. Come to Advent Family Night on the 6th and join us for a meal, devotion, and singing. Come to worship at 10:00 on December 10th and enjoy our Sunday School classes each do their own Christmas "gig" - have pizza with us after worship and go caroling to our homebound members. On December 17th we have two worship opportunities - Sermon in Song will be in the morning and we'll offer a Blue Christmas service, a service of hope at the 5:00 service. Hope to see you a lot this Advent season!

offers and celebrates gifts such as these: God's presence with strength and comfort in time of suffering, God's promise of wholeness and peace, and God's love embodied in the community of faith. We encourage everyone to experience the power of a healing service - we are all broken people in need of some kind of healing.

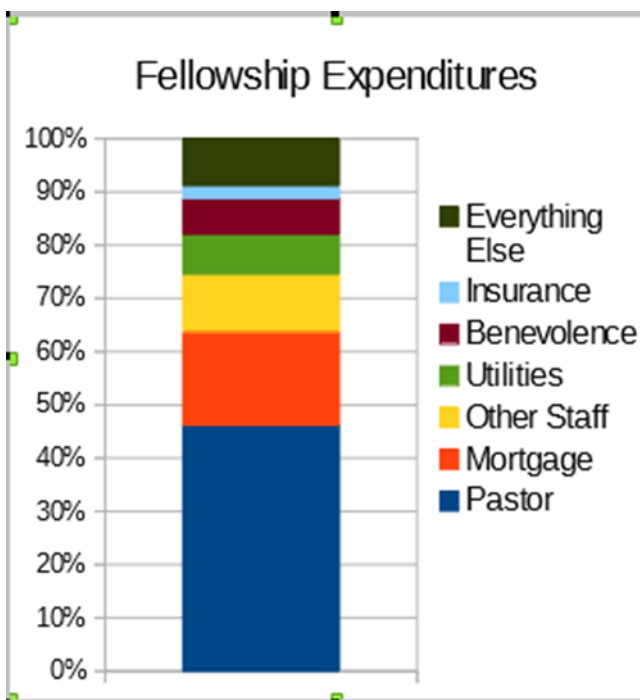

"Honor the Lord with your substance and with the first fruits of all your produce; then your barns will be filled with plenty, and your vats will be bursting with wine." Proverbs 3:9,10 (NSRV)

The Stewardship campaign is over and now the boards of the congregation are preparing their budgets. As in all budgeting, we try to match the expected income to the expected spending. Our 2017 total budget is about \$208,000. Next year will probably be similar. Have you ever wondered where all of our spending goes?

Well, I have done a little analysis of our 2017 budget, and here is a high-level overview of our spending:



As you can see from this chart, the sum of our critical spending (Pastor's compensation and expenses, mortgage, staff compensation, utilities, benevolence, and insurance) accounts for over 90% of our expenditures. The amounts that our boards spend on things like evangelism, advertising, supplies, programming materials, maintenance, and all the other stuff that supports our ministries is less than 10%.

In the last couple years, we've had special stewardship campaigns to try to bring our income up to this level of expense. From this chart, you can see how important that last few thousand dollars is. Since most of the 90+% is fixed, all of our leverage is in the last 10%.

If we could get to a point where our giving exceeds our current requirements, there are many things we could do in support of God's work here on Sawmill Road. We could expand our outreach and evangelism to help us to reach more people

with God's Word. We could continue our new evening service by being able to cover the cost of the pianist for an entire year. We could increase our benevolence.

As you can see, every dollar counts. As we finalize our budgets and bring them to the congregation for approval in our January meeting, I ask you to consider what you might contribute to that slice that is now under 10% to help us grow our outreach, mission and evangelism.

Also, a big thank you to Pastor Robin for recognizing the veterans last month. It was a very nice "Welcome Home" for my vet friends and me.

Finally, the LSS food pantry new method of providing to those in need is still a work in progress. I'll keep you informed...

Advent is a word that means "coming" or "visit". In the Christian season of Advent, we prepare for the "advent" of Christ at Christmas. By lighting one candle each week of Advent, we help ourselves get ready for the birth of Jesus. The candles have different meanings, each based upon the Bible. These meanings help us understand how special the birth of Jesus is for us.

PREPARING FOR CHRISTMAS

We will decorate the church after worship on Sunday, December 3. Please help us prepare for this joyous season!

Our observance of Advent will begin with Advent Family Night on Wednesday, December 6. Plan to join us for a pot luck at 6:30, followed by a devotion and carol sing at 7:00 p.m.

CHRISTMAS EVE

We will worship together at two services on Christmas Eve. Morning worship will be at 10:00 a.m. and our traditional candlelight service will begin at 7:00 p.m.

"LONGEST NIGHT" SERVICE

The Sunday evening service on December 17 will be an observance of the "longest night." The Service of the Longest Night, sometimes also known as a Blue Christmas Service or Service of Light, is held near the winter solstice, the longest day of the year. It is designed to temper the struggle with darkness and grief faced by those living with loss. Loss may include the death of a loved one, divorce or separation, separation due to military service, the loss of a job, or living with serious illness. In this service, the Advent candles will have special meanings:

First candle: To remember those whom we have loved and lost.

Second candle: To remember the pain of loss.

Third candle: To remember ourselves at Christmastime.

Fourth candle: To remember our faith and the gift of hope which the Christmas story offers to us.

Oesterlen Services for Youth and Families

Religion that is pure and undefiled before God, the Father, is this: to care for orphans and widows in their distress, and to keep oneself unstained by the world. James 1:27



When I'm working in the Pumpkin Patch, I frequently tell our customers some of the organizations that our proceeds benefit. One of those organizations is Oesterlen Services for Youth and Families, and is one I have always had a hard time explaining. So, I thought a little research was in order.

Oesterlen is a Lutheran organization that is supported by the Southern Ohio Synod and the ELCA, and is located in Springfield, OH. It was originally formed as an orphanage in 1903. As orphanages were replaced by non-institutional care, Oesterlen transitioned to a full-services social service organization in the 1950's and 60's. Today, Oesterlen offers a complete spectrum of residential, community-based, treatment foster care, home-based, and school-based therapeutic services, and the respite and resource center, serving more than 1,000 clients and families annually.

The photo above is from a 4-H fair that Oesterlen has been doing for the last 2 years.

Oesterlen Executive Director Don Warner said, "The kids participate in the local county fair and then we have a fall fair here at Oesterlen for those kids who for whatever reason (weren't) able to participate in the county fair," he said. "It helps to build social skills, helps to provide therapeutic treatment opportunities with the kids. It's a great opportunity."

Oesterlen's kids can also participate in the county fair. They participate in things like pumpkin painting, cake baking and decorating. This summer, they won several ribbons for chickens. Pastor Bonny Kinnunen said, "(The kids) really enjoy the process for what they want to do and planning what they want to do." After participating in Oesterlen's 4-H club, they can move on to other 4-H clubs after they leave Oesterlen. As you might imagine, the type of child that Oesterlen has, probably hasn't had much of an opportunity to participate in 4-H prior to this. After gaining some experience at Oesterlen's club, they can go on to any other 4-H club in the country. It can help prepare them for opportunities as adults through the social interaction, project planning and execution.
