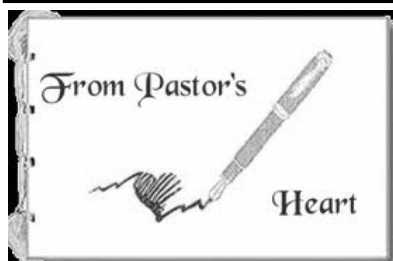

⁴Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant ⁵or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; ⁶it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. ⁷It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things...¹³And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love.
1 Corinthians 13:4-7,13

The thirteenth chapter of First Corinthians is one of the most familiar passages in all of scripture. Even those who are not especially religious, and whose entire experience of church is that they happened to get married in one, have probably come across these words before. "If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels ... when I was a child, I spoke like a child ... for now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we shall see face to face ... so faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love." For many of us, these verses have become like old, trusted friends. No matter how long it's been since we last visited, they express truths so timeless and profound that just sharing their company has a way of instructing and inspiring us.

In a sense, this chapter represents Paul's attempt to describe the governing rule for Christian life - love. And according to Jesus, the supreme requirement also is that we love God with all our hearts, souls, minds, and our neighbors as ourselves. Love is the one thing, above all else, which our Lord requires of us as disciples, and thus it should be the primary characteristic of our faith. If someone were to inquire, "What does it mean to be a Christian?" what better answer can we give than to say, "It means that we love one another." And if by chance there would be the follow-up question, "What does it mean to love one another?" we can find no better example than the life of Jesus Christ. He did more than merely tell us to love our neighbors; he also taught us how. His intent, it seems, was to move us to the point where we finally love everybody we meet -- including those we just met and even those we wish we never had.

The type of love Paul speaks about is agape love. Agape does not want. It gives. Agape does not need. It serves. Agape is not an emptiness desperately trying to be filled. It is already overflowing. Agape is patient and accepting and willing to endure all things. Agape love never ends, while other types of love cease the moment the object of our attraction becomes unattractive. Agape love is love by choice, and not simply a feeling.

The Apostle Paul says that, of all the gifts God has given us, love is the greatest. It is the most powerful force that exists. But to some extent, it is also the most powerless, because it can do nothing except by our consent. We need to decide to love. It's not a feeling; it's a choice.

“For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit.”

1 Corinthians 12:12-13

This passage goes on to talk about how the members of the church in Corinth all contribute to the well-being of the church. At Fellowship, we have many members with many different skills and backgrounds. That gives us a lot of assets to use in our work for God.

The Leadership team spent Saturday Jan. 26 planning and visioning for the new term. Much of our focus is on making better use of our members' talents and time. That is one of the key objectives of the organizational structure that is outlined in the constitutional update. We hope to empower our members to contribute to the congregation and the community that give fit their skills and passion. This approach comes from a book, *Power Surge*, written by an ELCA Lutheran pastor in Burnsville, MN. Picking people for specific roles can easily pigeon-hole someone into a role that doesn't really fit them. Therefore, you can get burn-out and lack of energy in that role. One of the comments that came from several people in our focus groups was a seeming lack of energy. This is one way we hope to address this challenge and turn it into a strength.

We also identified 3 key principles that we wish to guide us in this term:

- Reinvigorate our congregation
- Be willing to Innovate and take some risks
- Empower and be empowered

These principles will help us narrow down our goals and objectives and keep us focused on what is most important for our mission. And, we hope it generates excitement and commitment to help us meet our purpose of sharing God's love and Grace through our words and actions.

We are committed and optimistic that we can make some important changes and improvements that will lead to long term growth in members and our mission and ministries. We encourage you to think about their talents and skills and what things you would like to participate in and maybe even new things that no one else has thought about. You and I are all empowered to do things that move us forward in our ministry and mission.

We held our January congregational meeting on Sunday, January 27. Unfortunately, we did not have enough voting members in attendance to reach a quorum. Amazing Grace Day Camp

Fellowship has signed up to host Lutheran Outdoor Ministries of Ohio's (LOMO) Amazing Grace Day Camp again this summer, July 15-19. We have hosted this day camp for the last 2 years. It started when the Southern Ohio Synod (SOS) asked us if we would be interested when another church bowed out.

Amazing Grace Day Camp is a unique blend of outdoor ministry and congregational evangelism, outreach, and outdoor ministries. Amazing Grace has been developed by LOMO and is a partnership of the ELCA, Southern Ohio Synod and LOMO. The camp is staffed with LOMO counselors.

The Day Camp was started with a couple ideas in mind. First, fewer people are interested in overnight camps, especially church-oriented ones. And, second, SOS and all Lutheran organizations are looking for ways to broaden their appeal to non-churched people and people outside of our traditional demographics. SOS thought that the area around Fellowship was a good match with that strategy. Our area has a lot of apartments nearby and growing numbers of people with lower incomes and are often minorities, and day care in the summer is challenge for many of them.



The goals and principles of the camps are:

- To provide an opportunity to invite new people to experience the Gospel.
- Value relationships.
- To provide a camping experience for youth who may not be able to attend a resident camp.
- A tool for outreach to the unchurched



We have had good success hosting this camp the last 2 years, largely due to the tremendous efforts of our congregation's volunteers. We had more than 15 of our members involved last year in making the camp a success. We are still looking for volunteers for this year. When you volunteer, you get to be a part of the fun, exciting week with children and the wonderful counselors that LOMO provides. Please contact me, Pastor Robin, or Bill Lude if you are interested or able to help with meals, crafts, registration, or hosting one of the counselors. I promise you will enjoy it as much as the kids do.

If you know someone with elementary aged kids, this is a great thing to invite them to.
