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Jesus took a little child whom he placed among them. Taking the child in his arms, he said to them, "Whoever welcomes one of these little children in my name welcomes me; and whoever welcomes me does not welcome me but the one who sent me."
Mark 9:36-37

I was recently approached by a parent asking about Fellowship's policy of first communion and the age that children usually start communing. My, but has that changed over the years. When I was growing up, our first communion was the day that we were confirmed - no exceptions. We were required to have three years of confirmation classes before we were able to celebrate the eucharist with the adults. It seemed to me at the time that the church was being a guardian of God's grace...not a sharer of God's grace. Today, many congregations are communing infants!

The Use of the Means of Grace talks about the various customs in regards to age of first communion.

A number of congregations have continued to lower the age of communion, especially for school age children...Baptized children begin to commune on a regular basis at a time determined through mutual conversation that includes the pastor, the child, and the parents or sponsors involved, within the accepted practices of the congregation. Ordinarily this beginning will occur only when children can eat and drink, and can start to respond to the gift of Christ in the Supper... In all cases, participation in Holy Communion is accompanied by catechesis appropriate to the age of the communicant. When infants and young children are communed, the parents and sponsors receive instruction and the children are taught throughout their development.

Augsburg Fortress has a wonderful resource available entitled, *A Place For You: My Holy Communion Book* by Daniel Erlander, that we have ordered for our families with young children. Parents will work with their children and when they feel the children are ready, I will sit down with the children and prepare them for their first communion.

Our previous practice has been for children to receive a blessing when they accompany their parents up to communion until early/mid elementary age when they took a first communion class. I have often noticed young children's interest in the bread and wine and their look of longing to participate in communion with their parents. I am looking forward to inviting them to the table. What a wonderful example of God's grace for all!

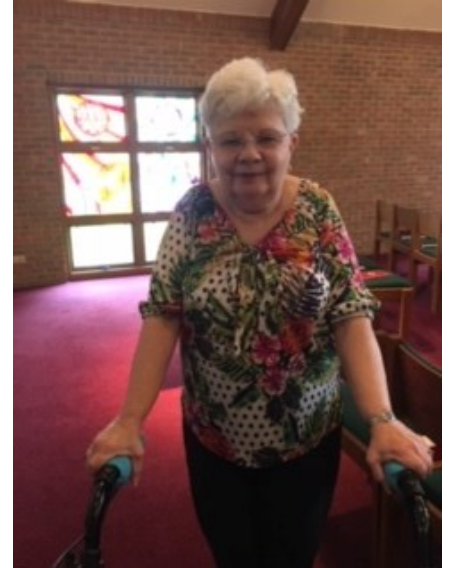

*“God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear, though the earth should change, though the mountains shake in the heart of the sea; though its waters roar and foam, though the mountains tremble with its tumult.” **Psalm 46:1-3***

This Psalm tells us that we have nothing to fear, no matter how things change or how crazy things get. As Christians, we know that God loves us, no matter what. So, we have nothing to fear. As long as we follow Him, we are free. We have the freedom to change ourselves to be more like God. We can try things to see if they work, knowing that God will be with us and assure us that He will make it right.

What are you most afraid of? Speaking in public? Changing your routine? Spiders? Change probably causes most of us more anxiety than anything but speaking in public. However, if you do not change occasionally, especially when the world changes around you, you will not be successful, whether it is in your work or personal life and the same for a congregation. Think of a caterpillar becoming a butterfly.



Your Council has been working in every monthly Council meeting on where we are as a congregation: what are we good at and what we need to change to do better. We are working with the book, *Power Surge*, that I have referenced in several of my previous articles. A major focus of it is to enable congregations to implement change that is consistent with God's intention for us as Christians and as a congregation. Two years ago, we held a series of discussions with leadership and members of the congregation to identify God's purpose for Fellowship. That led us to our Purpose Statement (or Mission Statement if you like that term better): To share God's love and grace through our words and actions. This, along with our Core Values and Vision form a basis for assessing ourselves and any actions we might take.

This summer, we are going to do some experimenting with our worship service like we have frequently done in previous summers. We will be going to a different liturgy that is based on hymns rather than our familiar liturgy. We will also be using the newer translation of the Lord's Prayer. One advantage of trying new things is it gives us a chance to think about what we are doing or saying. In the case of the Lord's Prayer, we are going to wording that most of us are not very familiar with. That will give us an opportunity to think about what we are praying and to understand it better with more current words and language. Hopefully, that can help us be a little more aware of what we are praying compared to doing it by rote as we all do normally.

In the early fall, we are planning to review with the congregation what council is learning and planning from the *Power Surge* book. We hope to convey some of the energy and excitement we are experiencing. We will be discussing some of the things we are working on and what they mean to our congregation. We will also be discussing how we take advantage of the team structure to do a better job of sharing God's love and grace and leveraging the skills and talents of everyone.

Our objective is, that as we make some changes, we will more closely follow our Purpose Statement and God's commission to make disciples of people and serve our community. Remember, God has our back. Do not be afraid of change. God will help us and comfort us.

Education For Girls in Guatemala

"And the king will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me.'" Matthew 25:40 (NSRV)

"Will you take me with you?" As Karen Castillo prepared to leave Playito Cerro Alto, a secluded village along Guatemala's Rio Chixoy, she heard this familiar request from a girl. Castillo, a Lutheran pastor, knew the situation: if the girl stayed, she'd soon marry and get pregnant, which would stunt her educational opportunities. Castillo also knew the girl couldn't accompany her to Guatemala City. She felt torn.



This girl's situation is common among the indigenous, rural communities served by the Augustinian Lutheran Church of Guatemala (ILAG in Spanish) as well as other poor countries. This was also common in the rural United States as recently as 100 years ago. Families are usually large. In Guatemala, girls get married as young as 12 to 14 years old, usually with men twice their age. There is little opportunity for education when they become wives and mothers at such a young age. This traps them in poverty, and reduces the economic potential of the entire culture.

But things are changing, said Castillo.

When Manuela was growing up, she wanted to attend school. As with most young girls, she married young. She gave birth to her first child at 15. She now has eight children. She wants more for her girls.

"I don't want my children to get married so early in life or to leave school," she said. "I want them to move forward." Now, her dream for her daughters for more education is becoming a reality. ELCA World Hunger is supporting community leaders along with ILAG. ILAG's MILAGRO (miracle) Women's Education Center in Guatemala City opened in 2018. It trains and educates girls from poor, rural areas so that they can improve their financial status and their lives.

"Some people were anxious about removing the girls from their context," Castillo said.

"Here with us, ... we tell them they have intelligence; they are worthy, valuable, capable; they have gifts that they can discover along with the other young ladies; they can also discover their abilities ... We think this is going to cause a positive impact on their lives and the community."

Changing long-standing traditions and norms will take time, but the MILAGRO center is already having an impact, not only on the young women, but also on their families and communities. "The moms are happy that their girls are here," Castillo said.

"We expect that the community—first the whole community of faith and then the extended community from the several villages—will be able to see this change in the long run," Castillo said.

Now, Castillo can say "yes" to girls longing for education and improving their lives.

Summary of Southern Ohio Synod Assembly actions and events...June 2019

Over 360 people of faith gathered in the Health, Physical Education and Recreation (HPER) Center on the campus of Wittenberg University, June 7-8, 2019. The Spirit was on the move and felt by all in various ways and at various times throughout our assembly. Read some of the highlights below:

Bishop Election:

The Rev. Suzanne Darcy Dillahunt was elected on the first ballot with 252 votes. 215 votes were needed for election on the first ballot.

Bishop Dillahunt's call to the Office of Bishop was affirmed during the Friday evening worship service at Weaver Chapel. The Rev. Elizabeth Eaton, Presiding Bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, presided during this portion of the worship service. To watch the service, please visit our Facebook page where Pr. Election of Synod Council and committee members
