BURIALS and MEMORIAL MARKERS ON PROTESTANT KNOLL OF TIN CUP CEMETERY.
This knoll is the largest of four knolls and is north of the Catholic Knoll.

ARNEE (ARNELL), L.V., b. Sept. 25, 1885, d. Aug. 30, 1893.

BIGGS, ANDREW J., d. March, 1884.

COLLINS, JOHN, d. Aug. 27, 1902, found dead 100 yds. from his Tin Cup cabin, alcoholic; St. Elmo man.

COLVIN, J.G., 46 years, d. Nov. 10, 1890, "fine fellow."

CRAWFORD, J.L., 21 years, d. March 25, 1880.

DICKSON, ROBERT DEAN, b. Oct. 20, 1951, d. July 31, 1986, marble marker inscribed: "Our Son and Brother/In God's Care"; southeast corner, east row.

DUCAS, (?) FRANK

DUNCAN, NAOMI RACHEL, b. May 8, 1982, d. May 19, 1982, marble marker, northwest corner, west row.

DUNCAN, GEORGE, W., b. 1855, d. June 25, 1907, Duncan Flats named for him. "Good man." Marble marker near Lowry Englebright's grave, west row. Marble marker placed by Dr. and Mrs. Ray Duncan (son) in 1950's.

DUNNEY, (?) W.B.

ENGLEBRIGHT, LOWRY, b. June 17, 1865, d. April 14, 1965. Two months short of his 100th birthday. Wonderful gentleman, tall, straight. Lived on Grand Avenue, Tin Cup, in brown house with false front south of bridge. Marble marker, mid way on west row.

FISHER, KATE, 70 years, d. June, 1902. She was a black lady loved and respected by everyone in Tin Cup. She came to Tin Cup during the early boom (1879-1880). She ran a hotel/restaurant where red blooming geraniums graced her hotel windows through the winter months. Bearberries grow green on her grave. John Curtis indicated her grave is in the west row about 5 graves south of Englebright's grave.

GAINES, INFANT of P. and S. Gaines.

GARWIN, A CHILD (?)

G _____, Son of John G.

GOLLAGHER, SAMUEL P., b. Sept. 2, 1853, d. July 9, 1906. He owned a large mercantile store which may have been set on fire by an arsonist in Aug., 1906 (a month after Gollagher's death). The fire destroyed all the commercial buildings in Block 30 on the south side of Washington Ave. Gollagher left a wife and 7 young children. Marble marker with iron fence north end of east row. Marker placed by daughters Susan and Mary Gertrude.

HARRIS, WILLIAM, (SANDY), 61 years, 8 mos., d. May 5, 1911. A good

blacksmith. He lived in long cabin on east end of Gollagher property on Main St. (Originally the Alex Thomas property.)

HINMAN, CAROLINE JANE, b. March 12, 1857, d. Dec. 24, 1935.

HINMAN, FRANK A., b. Jan. 25, 1857, d. June 16, 1900. Graves originally marked with wooden markers "Mother" "Father". Replaced with marble markers in recent years. "We miss thee from our home dear/ We miss thee from thy place/ A shadow over our lives is cast/ We miss the sunshine of thy face." Graves enclosed with log fence kept in good repair by descendants.

IVEY, THOMAS, d. 1899, son of Thomas and Ida. Third grave south of Duncan baby, west row.

JESSOP, ASA, d. Sept., 1906.

KAUDY, WILLIAM, d. May 25, 1898. Masonic area--southeast corner.

KAUPIN, PAUL

LEES, MRS. JOHN LEES, Mrs. JOHN, Grave about midway in 2nd row. Grave once enclosed with wooden fence. Wooden marker was tall and narrow with depression for picture. Both gone now.

LUMLEY, GRACE, niece of George White. Buried next to White, Masonic area--southeast corner.

MARKWELL, CORA ALBERTA, b. Feb. 10, 1910, d. Aug. 3, 1989. Marble marker, east row, southeast corner. Long time summer resident of Tin Cup.

MAXWELL, MERRILL JUDITH, b. April 30, 1943, d. May 13, 1990. Summer resident of Tin Cup who loved to fish Italian Creek.

MEBOROL (NEBORAL), F. B., d. Nov. 26, 1907.

MORRIS, AMARET, daughter of Elizabeth and Harry.

MORRIS, BURTONA LUCY, b. June 8, 1901. Daughter of Elizabeth and Harry. Buried next to Amaret. Their graves once had granite markers fashioned by their mother and father.

NEAL, MAGGIE, infant, d. Aug. 18, 1888.

PARENT (WILEY), MARY B., b. Nov. 22, 1869, d. March 31, 1901, wife of Alex Parent. She operated a successful restaurant in her Tin Cup home until she married Alex. Her son, Dean Wiley, was 10 years old 10 years old when Mary died. He lived with Alex and the Harrington family (when Alex was away on his mail route) until he left for California as a young man. Dean visited Tin Cup in the 1960's and looked unsuccessfully for Alex's grave. Alex died in Feb., 1930. He wished to be buried next to Mary and near his brother, Peter. Be cause of the severe winter conditions at the time of his death, he was buried in the Gunnison Cemetery. The caretaker knows the location. Mary's grave has a tall, marble marker, east row, southeast corner--Masonic area.

PARENT, MRS. PETER, d. late 1880's.

PARENT, PETER, d. 1897. Mrs. and Peter Parent are buried side by

side in the east row near Mary Parent.

ROOF, MAUDIE, her wooden marker was tall and narrow, inscribed:
"Maudie Only Daughter of Mary and William Roof Departed This Life Nov. 6, 1880,
Aged 5 years,
2 mths, 16 dys." Marker now gone. Grave in Masonic area next grave north of Abbie Weston.

ROOF, WILLIAM, of Farley, Missouri. Next to Maudie.

SEETON, ROSS V. JR., b. Feb. 7, 1920, d. March 12, 1992, interment June 20, 1992. Marble marker next to Lowry Englebright.

SHORT, _____, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Short.

STORMES, T.L., d. April 30, 1879. First man buried in Tin Cup Cemetery. From New York.

SUTTON, SHELDON SIM, b. 1845, d. Aug., 1900. Grandfather of Sarah Tomney Jeffries of Las Vegas, Nev. who was 85 years young in 1988. Father of Sallie Sutton Tomney. Father and daughter had a ranch ranch north area of present Taylor Reservoir, known as the Tomney Ranch.

WALSH, MRS. C., 36 years, d. Oct. _____.

WESTON, ABBIE, 55 years, 6 months, 28 days, d. June 5, 1888. Wife of John Weston who operated Pacific Hotel. Daughter buried in Iron City Cemetery near St. Elmo.

WHIG, GEORGE W.

WHITE, GEORGE, d. Jan. 2, 1883. Of Hampton, Iowa. Married to Rose Lumley. First Mason buried in Masonic area of Protestant Knoll, Tin Cup Cemetery. Buried next to niece, Grace Lumley.

WHITE, MIRIAM S. b. July 20, 1921, d. April 28, 1983. Iron fence, marble marker, east row, south end. Summer resident of Tin Cup.

WOLFE, CHARLIE, d. before his brother, Oscar.

WOLFE, OSCAR, d. April 1916. Oscar dug his own grave. He dug a grave for Billie Pryor who accidentally shot himself while unloading a bedstead from a wagon. Pryor family changed burial plans after grave was dug and had body sent to St. Louis. A year later Oscar died and the grave he had prepared for Pryor was used for him. Oscar was dead in his cabin a week before body was discovered. Oscar and his brother, Charlie, owned the Wolfe Placer.

WOODWARD, MURRELL T. b. Aug. 17, 1898, d. Dec. 10, 1980.

WOODWARD, MONTA B., b. Nov. 22, 1899, d. June 21, 1980. Marble marker, new west row on south end. The Woodwards were long-time summer residents of Tin Cup. Murrell loved to fish and Monta was generous with her delicious fried pies.

BURIALS IN BOOT HILL, TIN CUP CEMETERY. THIS KNOLL IS EAST OF THE CATHOLIC KNOLL.

BOWMAN, E., 68 years, d. Feb. _____.

CAMERON, BLACK JACK, "He drew 5 acres." Southeast corner.

CHADWICK, FRED, d. 1908, an assayer and chemist, educated English gentleman.

CHRISTOPHER, BUD, d. _____, 1879. Killed by T. Lahey.

CONLEY, WILLIAM R., d. spring of 1903. Shot and killed by John Lynch. Considered self-defense killing. Lynch died about a year later in a horse and buggy accident.

EMERSON, FRANK, d. July 7, 1882. Town marshal shot and killed by Tom Leahy 100-200 feet east of present townhall door. Leahy sentenced to 12 years in Colorado State Penitentiary.

GREGG, CLANSON, d. 1886. Shot and killed by Charley Wahl in a Tin Cup store on Washington Ave. Wahl exonerated. His attorney was Thomas Patterson.

HARBURT, A., d. 1906. Killed in Robert E. Lee #2 mining shaft accident.

HOGAN, FRANK

HUGHES, JOHN, (JACK) H.

JAMISON, ANDREW, 27 years, d. May 5, 1883. Town marshal who was shot and killed by William Taylor. Taylor was convicted and served 4 years in the Colorado State Penitentiary.

JAMISON, JAMES, 52 years, d. March 1890. Killed in a mining accident while inebriated. Uncle of Andrew; buried next to Andrew.

JONES, DEACON, d. Sept. 8, 1903. Reported to have been the "peeping tom" of Tin Cup. Also, a good judge of whiskey.

MAXIMER, SHANG, d. 1880. Shot and killed by James Dempsey.

"PASS OUT", a dance hall girl who lived out her life in Tin Cup and is buried on Boot Hill.

RIVERS, HARRY, d. March 7, 1882. Shot and killed by Charles LaTourette, saloonkeeper. Rivers was the town marshal at the time of his death. There are several conflicting stories as to how he was killed. LaTourette appeared before a "kangaroo court" in Tin Cup. Case was dismissed - - LaTourette acted in self-defense. Rivers' grave is located in the center of Boot Hill.

BURIALS ON JEWISH KNOLL IN TIN CUP, COLORADO CEMETERY. THIS KNOLL IS WEST OF THE CATHOLIC KNOLL

HARRIS, _____, infant, 1 month old, d. Nov. 10, 1882. Son of Isaac and Leah.

HARRIS, _____, infant, b. Sept. 23, 1883, d. Oct. 4, 1883. Son

of Isaac and Leah.

HARRIS, _____, b. October 5, 1884, d. Nov. 23, 1884. Twin sons of Isaac and Leah. The Harrises owned and operated a tailor shop and store on Washington Ave.

KLAUBER, J.J., 2 years old, b. _____ 29, 1886, d. 1888.

KLAUBER, SIDNEY, b. Sept. 2, 1881, d. Oct. 1, 1886. Mr. Klauber owned a store in Tin Cup on the southwest corner of Grande and Washington Aves.

BURIALS ON CATHOLIC KNOLL. THIS KNOLL IS THE CENTER KNOLL

DOBBS. This name was inscribed on a long board placed on the Catholic Knoll with the dates: 1965 and 1983.

HARRINGTON, ROBERT, b. May 17, 1907, d. May 17, 1907, twin of John, son of Daniel C. and Julia. West end of knoll near remains of a dead tree.

This knoll has 6-8 graves, one with a wooden fence.

KEYES, A.A., 67 years. d. April 11, 1908. A rancher north of Tin Cup. Very tall, finest team of horses in Tin Cup.

MACGRAGOR, S. KANG, d. 1899

MITCHELL, FRANK, no dates. Had a small cabin just south of Phil Korn home on Grand Ave.

N_____NES, W. (?)

NORWOOD, infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Norwood.

RUTHERFORD, (?)

SCHUP, JIM, (from Gunnison County Courthouse records, 6-8-88.)
May be on Catholic Knoll.

SMALL, MRS., not sure she is buried in Tin Cup Cemetery. She

operated the Tin Cup Hotel.

WINSHEIMER, LAWRENCE, d. 1905. An English Jew.

WINSHEIMER, d. 1880's, infant twin sons of Lawrence.
