This edition of the newspaper includes a number of photos of the AuSable river from the Michigan-famous Lumberman's Monument and from the High Banks. The High Banks is a steep but climbable 200 foot slope of sand where beer parties abounded in my high school days. Our drink of the day, remarkably, was Pabst Blue Ribbon. My guess is that each small city in the county will have two or three outlets.

Here is an insight from California: the black market continues to abound because legal outlets have to charge extremely high taxes.

County Commissioner Arrested for "Impersonating an Officer"

The arrested individual has many legitimate links to police and fire departments, but took it upon himself to say that he was a deputy with the sheriff's office when a minor incident on a school bus took place. The sheriff busted him.

Increased Taxes (Millage) for Police is not Getting Popular Support

Apparently, there will be a fourth effort to raise property taxes to support the county sheriff's office and the county prosecutor's office. Voters shot down similar proposals twice in 2020 and again in August 2022. The county is experiencing staff shortages, as well as budget shortcomings, as are police departments all over the nation. In losco County, however, it is much less an anti-police motivation than anti tax.

High School Creates a Girl's Golf Team; Wherefor Academics

As every issue of the newspaper illustrates, girls sports are highlighted, encouraged, and honored with stories, photos, and personality highlights in every issue.

The second section of the newspaper is entitled "losco's High School Sports." Typical of small town newspapers, sports is featured. Sports coverage sells newspapers because so many high school students have their photos in the newspaper as members of a volleyball, basketball, football, or other sports team.

For an educationally ideal world, similar focus would be placed on academic achievements. The local high school has a 92% graduation rate, which is very good, and a high percentage go off to good colleges.

Okay, I admit it: it's hard to get attention with a photo of a couple of straight A students studying or somehow exhibiting their success. This is a perennial problem all over the nation with no end in sight.

Local Veterans Obtain Grave Markers and American Flags

The county Veteran's Affairs Service Officer obtained a grant to purchase 1,100 new American flags and 600 brass grave marker/flag holders to be placed on graves of veterans in the county. The article stresses that the flags and the holders were made in the United States. "I could have paid less for [other] American flags but they were made in China."

There is ongoing, visible support for veterans and serving in the military in this community, as is the case, perhaps disproportionately, in small towns as well as in the south. This compares with attitudes in so many urban communities where military service is disfavored.

\$5,000 for 24 Hour Police Protection

The deal between the Tawas City Police Department (TCPD) and Alabaster Township is now cemented. The officers will now have 22 additional square miles to patrol. This seems like a great deal for the Alabaster Township -24/7 police coverage for \$5,000 a year. Interestingly, the police chief sees this "as a very positive step for the TCPD, as well as employee morale".

Local Politics

The Sunrise Side Republicans Women's Club met at the pizzeria in Oscoda on October 25. A full page ad solicits votes for Democrats locally and throughout the state. The last issue of the newspaper had an even larger ad for Republican candidates. And remember: the newspaper cut off any letters to the editor about politics or candidates until after the election.

US Gypsum Food Drive in Alabaster – 9th Annual; My once-employer

Hunger is very real in the community. About half of the kids in high school qualify for free lunches, based on economic status. This is one of many local, volunteer steps taken to address the problem.

One of my many jobs as a teenager was working in the lab at US Gypsum in Alabaster. I had the midnight/All-night shift where I took samples of gypsum ore off the conveyer belt
