Cost of Living in Tawas

A nursing home in Tawas City is one of many businesses that have many job openings. A CNA, the lowest of three levels of certification for health care providers, will likely be paid about \$18 an hour. This approaches \$38,000 per year.

I am struck by the relatively affordable cost of living, at least in terms of housing, in East Tawas and surrounding communities.

The newspaper classified section identifies a three bedroom house for rent for \$750 a month. A two bedroom apartment is \$800 a month. So, with housing costs under \$10,000 a year, a full time CNA can live in a home or an apartment and have sufficient funds for other necessities of life. This is not the case in so many other communities.

There is also a two bedroom home for sale in Oscoda for \$110,000.

Another Meaningful Obituary: William Neil Thornton

Neil was the editor of *The Tawas Herald* and of *The Iosco News Herald*. He was known as the "town historian" because he authored a number of books about the community. Impressive for good humor and a deep sense of community responsibility, he is the prototypical small town newspaper man. He was born in Tawas City and his ashes are interred in Tawas City. Neil was 94 years of age.

Local Politicians, Candidates

A candidate for the school board is a member of the Constitutionalist Party. This is a little known party that was originally known as the "Taxpayers Party."
