<u>Input from a reader re Veteran's Day</u>: It is wonderful that we have received many comments, suggestions, and questions from readers. One extensive comment reacted to my updates about Veteran's Day and how it was so openly celebrated in Tawas schools and on the streets. The comment pointed out that, in some states, the schools are not closed like they are in California. The benefit in that (rather red) state is that the schools have organized programs and presentations about Veteran's Day, veterans, and what it means to be of service to your country.

Speaking for myself, I was "reluctant" to serve in the military during the Vietnam war. I became a Volunteer In Service to America (VISTA), which was the domestic Peace Corp, after college at Stanford to get a one year deferment. I lived in and focused on community organizing in an African American community in Houston, Texas. Then, in 1969 or 1970 came the draft lottery. I was fortunate because my number was 334, which meant that I was not going to be drafted. Those with very low numbers were drafted and faced difficult decisions.

I have come to thoroughly understand the need for smart, competent individuals to be in our military. The experience in Israel and the Ukraine demonstrate that conflict is always on the horizon and that a strong military is an unfortunate necessity.

And think about this, from English philosopher G.K. Chesterton:

"The true soldier fights not because he hates what is in front of him, but because he loves what is behind him."

If our nation needs to fight and needs soldiers, will we have enough trained soldiers who love what is behind them?

Real parking issues exist in neighborhoods like mine in Palo Alto where a resident permit is now required to keep our streets available for resident parking. It is all relative.
