The Wonders of Local Festivals: Perchville Turns 73 Years Old

The first weekend of February witnesses Perchville USA festivities that include the coronation of royalty at the Coronation Breakfast, and ice fishing!

To fish, they venture onto the ice on Tawas Bay, cut a hole in the ice, and construct a small shelter. In distant, past days, it was a shanty primarily constructed of wood. Here is a photo of current shanties used this year by a number of anglers.



The fact is that the ice seems thinner than it was 70 years ago. Folks have to be careful. A hole in the ice is cut, typically using a spud, which has a shank and a chisel-like end used to chip a hole in the ice. An auger is used to actually drill the hole in the ice. "The hole must be big enough that you can get a fish out, but not too large of a hole that it might endanger someone's life." There have been stories, in years gone by, of individuals – or their equipment – breaking through the ice and having to be rescued.

The weekend also featured a Polar Bear Plunge into the lake. Not many participants!

The first Perchville, in 1950, featured almost 30 shanties. Perchville captured national attention at the time, including coverage from NBC.

Oscoda Takes Care of Rattlesnakes and Bats

The town engineer reported that work has begun to extend the losco Exploration Trail. Trees need to be cut down by April 15 "for the bats" and other work must be done "for the rattlesnakes."
