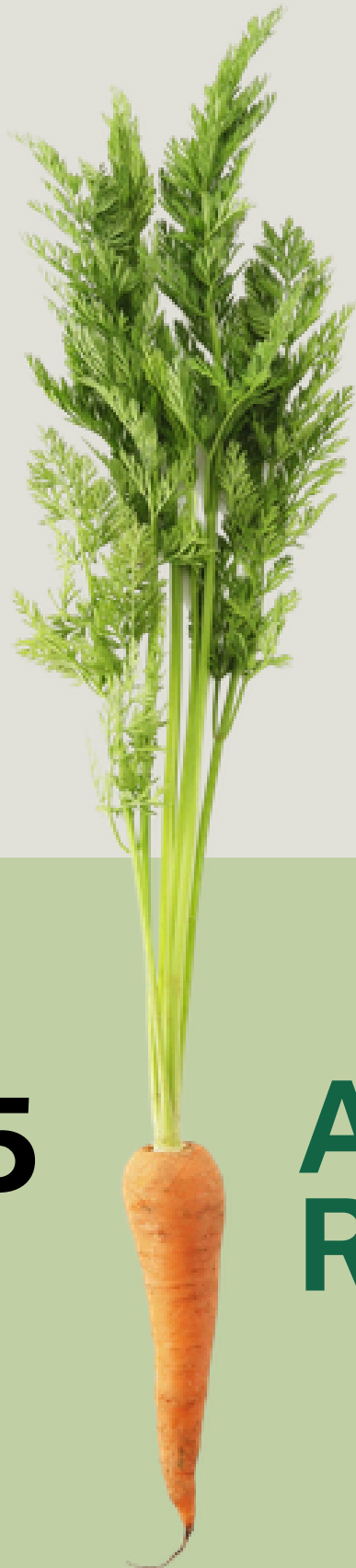

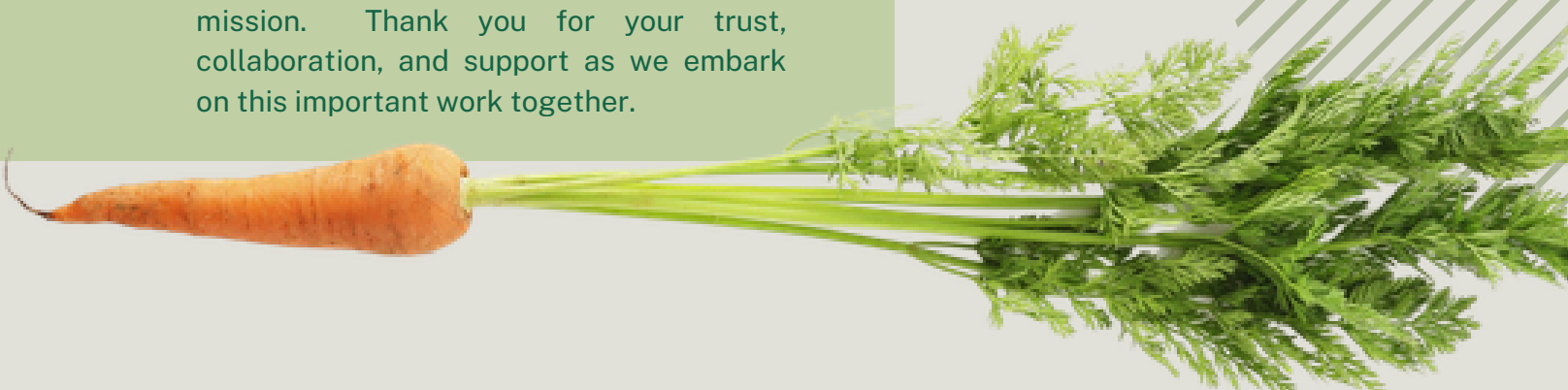

## 2025 HIGHLIGHTS

### Community Parades

### **Saskatoon Foodbank Groundbreaking**

After many years of dreaming about a new building for SFBLC, the shovels are hitting the ground! The old building has now been demolished, and the site is cleaned up and ready for the new building. The goal is to be move in ready by Spring of 2027. SFBLC's Board Chair Scott Masson says the build is long overdue: "Our current building has been bursting at the seams for many years, and the staff has really had to adapt to keep up with the needs of the community. This new facility means that offsite storage and programs will all be under one roof. This will help everything function more efficiently and expand programs that are aligned with community interests and priorities."

Laurie O'Connor, Executive Director of Saskatoon Food Bank & Learning Centre, says this project has been many years in the making: "We have been working towards this day for over thirteen years! It is hard to believe we are here. We looked at many places before landing on 425 Avenue P South but none of them seemed to be quite what we were looking for. We are confident that the location we found for food bank's new home is right where we want to be. We are really looking forward to becoming part of the Pleasant Hill community and welcoming everyone for a visit when we open in the Spring of 2027."

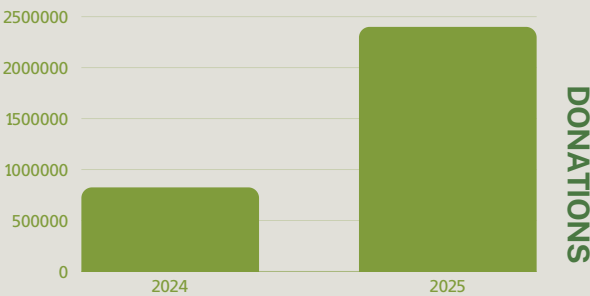
