Additionally, in the State of Arizona, there is a local internet sensation who goes by the name of Chi Chi, a quadruple amputee who walks with four custom prosthetic legs. Chi Chi's story of courage, strength, and perseverance has earned her a phenomenal global online following.

Unfortunately, Chi Chi passed away a few years ago, but her inspirational story continues to push forth an effort toward the eventual ban of the inhumane practice of slaughtering dogs for human consumption.
