Have Yourself a Merry Little Advent: A Message from Paster Jim

Every year I always remember where I was when I heard my first Christmas song of the season. If you don't believe me, this year I was with Mike and Shelley at the Charcoal Pit on Rt. 202 in Wilmington. It was Saturday, November 13, at 6:30 and the song was "Jingle Bell Rock." Two years ago, I would have said that was too early to play Christmas music, but after everything we have been through and are still going through with this unending health crisis, I say, "If Christmas music be the food of love, play on! Give me excess of it."

And I am beginning to feel that way about Advent music in worship. I come from a long hard line somber tradition where not a note of a Christmas Carol was to be heard in the sanctuary until Christmas Eve. So, the two-and-a-half-hour Christmas Concert on the third Sunday of Advent was usually a program consisting of two Bach Cantata's sung entirely in German. And Christmas Carols were only sung on Christmas Eve and the Sunday after Christmas. Meanwhile, the secular Christmas crowd got to enjoy all kinds of Christmas music while they celebrated the season while we church goers felt like we were in time out during our Advent worship.

And it's partly because of our church pastors. In her book, "Breathing Space," Lutheran pastor, Heidi Neumark, who writes about this holy season amid her ministry in the roughest part of the Bronx writes, "Probably the reason I love Advent so much is that it reflects how I feel most of the time. I might not feel sorry during Lent, when the liturgical calendar begs repentance. I might not feel victorious, even though it is Easter morning. I might not feel full of the Spirit, even though it is Pentecost, and the liturgy spins out fiery gusts of ecstasy. But during Advent, I am always in sync with the season.

Advent unfailingly embraces and comprehends my reality. And what is that? I think of the Spanish word anhelo, or longing. Advent is when the church can no longer contain its unfulfilled desire and the cry of anhelo bursts forth: Marantha! Come Lord Jesus! O Come, O Come, Emmanuel!"

But after twenty-one months of this pandemic, I think we all are feeling that longing, that sense of an unfulfilled desire to have Covid finally gone. And yet it lingers. But I don't think pastors should take it out on our congregations in worship. To get a better perspective, let's go to the Webster Hymnal. There are twenty-seven Advent Hymns in our Webster Hymnal, and most of them are not familiar. But there are fifty-five Christmas Carols in our Webster Hymnal, and all are remarkably familiar. So how do we fit them all into worship? When do we get to sing these beautiful and familiar Christmas Carols?

Advent is already such a somber, penitent season. And it's a little hard to wrap our heads around. We look for a baby to be born while we know that the baby has already been born and is still being born in us---this Emmanuel who came and is coming and is among us right now. But the Revised Common Lectionary will continue to do its job to help us understand this theological concept through scripture and keep us longing for the birth of the Christ child and the joy he will bring on Christmas Eve. But we have waited long enough. We need a little Christmas right this very minute.

MODERATOR

I think it is time to chronicle the herculean effort that goes into the Fall Bazaar. Because I am always overwhelmed by the effort this event takes, I wish all of you reading this and even the community-at-large could recognize and realize how it comes together.

The first and most important thing to know is that about twenty members of our Church volunteer to bring it off. the elements of their work include-

- * Publicizing the event and accepting pre-sales
- *Ordering and picking up the apples (only Winesaps!)
- *Buying all the cooking supplies over a period of months so that the best prices can be realized, i.e. On sale
- *Assembling the White Elephant sale items that are donated, pricing these items
- *Setting up the Social Hall for eating and display
- *Assembling the pie boxes
- *Peeling, coring, and peeling 4 bushels of apples
- *Assembling and baking about 100 pies, crisps and cobblers
- *Baking over a period of 4-5 hours
- *Arranging for outside vendors/crafters to create sales space
- *Preparing a large Covid-safe breakfast buffet for over 80 people
- *Preparing cash boxes for event day sales
- *Boxing all pre-sales pies for easy pickup
- *Preparing over 40 quarts of chicken corn soup, jarring for refrigeration.

 This means cooking chickens, removing the meat and broth, freezing local corn and assembling the day before the event
- *Cleaning up the myriad of cooking utensils, baking trays, and Social Hall after baking day and the event
- *Preparing a final report of costs and revenue,

For volunteers who help make the Bazaar possible, they have to want to serve their Church and make our fund-raising succeed. They also must be inspired to help assure we are a continuing place of worship. We are inspired by the leadership of Gary and Doris Lyttle who really led this effort. No one can fully appreciate how hard they work and what strong organizational skills they bring to the table. Thank them when you have a chance.
