And I'm really excited about it because we haven't marched in this parade as a congregation since before, I was called to Webster Church. At this writing I don't have all the specific details, but we will send out a special email early next week with the particulars, like where to meet and what time to get there.

"Before the parade passes by, I've gotta go and taste Saturday's high life. Before the parade passes by

I've gotta get some life back into my life. I'm ready to move out in front, I've had enough of just passing by life. With the rest of them, with the best of them, I can hold my head up high. It is my great pleasure to participate in the music ministry of Webster Church. I have been a member of church choirs since I was 8 years old, starting that long run at Christ Evangelical and Reformed Church in Hagerstown MD. Under the leadership of Ruth Dorman, I began my life-long interest in music and began private vocal lessons in high school. My voice coach was Mary Paulhamus and she also taught me at Hood College after I enrolled there.

Under the talented Angie Jones our church is most blessed to offer regular weekly anthems, special event music and even cantatas with Hopewell Church. It is hard to express what this means to a small church such as Webster! Many churches are struggling to have a regular music director and an organist. Very few students are even in the pipeline to become organists. She adds in the extra hours we work on at least two cantatas a year that are very time-consuming. I hope she feels the deep appreciation we have for her, and I hope you will individually thank her, too.

I must mention that the organ and keyboard we use in the delivery of music are vital to the enjoyment of our regular services. In the past year we have had our pipe organ repaired, which was badly needed. Some of you may not know that the Yamaha keyboard was gifted to the Church by Gwen Stolzenbach a few years ago. Her generosity makes it possible to supplement the organ with other sounds of praise.

Reflecting on the music of this Church reminds me to be grateful and thankful. I hope you feel the same!

Anniversary Reminiscences

Rev. Jerry and Alice Foltz Webster Church – 1969-1974

We came to Webster Congregational Christian Church (UCC) in the summer of 1969, after Jerry graduated from Eden Seminary (St. Louis, MO) and was ordained at his home church, Christ Reformed UCC in Hagerstown, MD.

Webster Church members quickly became our new family, and we have fond memories of the covered dish dinners with rolls made by Florence Cooley; cooking in the kitchen with Anna Evans instructing on the fine points of making parslied potatoes and delicious vegetable soup; and helping with the regular church cleaning schedule, rotated among church families. Miss Elizabeth Anderson, president of the WCCF (Women's Congregational Christian Fellowship), fed raisins to the mockingbirds, and generally kept the ladies organized.

There were funerals, including the funeral of Ben Keyes, dairy farmer and poet, whose sudden loss was hard for all of us to bear. Jerry's first funeral was for Bessie Bowman's sister, whose funeral was led by the local Catholic priest with Jerry assisting. Later there was the funeral for church mother, Florence Cooley. In all of these times, we learned to know families well, and shared in good memories as well as grief.

The choir was a highlight of our time at Webster. Carol Chidsey was organist, and Anne Reinhart directed the choir, and together were a supportive team for worship planning with Jerry. We were told that Miss Ida Green, a former pastor who helped save the church after the Depression, always jumped over the railing to both sing and preach, so Jerry did the same! Choir members included Ron and Jean Simmons, Irv Chidsey, Fred Reinhart, and Dorothy Eddington. Alice learned to play guitar during these years, with lessons from Patsy Wachter. (Alice still plays guitar occasionally!)

Youth activities were definitely a highlight of these years. Levin Heath was moderator of the church, and Levin and Grace's teenagers (Debbie, David and Christy) all took part in the growing youth group, with the Snodgrasses, the Cohens, and many others. Lloyd Walstrum was teacher of the youth class and youth advisor, and with his encouragement the youth decorated the furnace room as their own space. When our son Jon arrived from Korea, he was quickly adopted by the youth, and loved participating in the Halloween haunted house, and even joined in the big production of "Jesus Christ Superstar." "Superstar" was a joint production with youth from Darlington Methodist Church, and performed at Webster....an extravagant production, with costumes, makeup, choreography and much excitement. Irving Chidsey rigged up the lighting.

Jon also loved playing with special friends Michael Luethy, Wesley Cohen, and Scott Walker. We remember the exciting day that Scott's goat appeared on the picnic table in the parsonage yard! Leon Thompson had built this sturdy table. We also adopted our first cat from a farm where Leon and Lib Thompson's daughter worked.

And we remember weddings! Charlotte Ann Simmons' marriage was beautiful, and the Simmons' family's good planning and thoughtfulness set the standard for all of the weddings Jerry would do in the future.

We remember Bible School, including joint Bible School with friends from Gravel Hill AME Church. This was a new venture for the community and said much about the love that opened doors at Webster. There were also joint Lenten services with Gravel Hill and Chapel, and the beginnings of a joint Sunday School for handicapped children, led by Elizabeth Walstrum.

The church bell had been removed from the church tower because of its size. Graham Silsby designed the welded steel pipe frame we sunk in the ground with concrete on which to mount the bell, which we rang on special occasions. Col. D.C. Jackson painted the bell bronze.

Our daughter Maria was born in Havre de Grace hospital in July 1972, and so much of our family life began here. Thanks to Cheryl Walstrum for helping with house chores when Alice was on doctor-ordered bed rest, during that pregnancy. We will always be grateful for the many wonderful memories and the generous love and support of friends at Webster! God blessed us at Webster, and as John Cooley predicted, Webster Church helped to prepare us for everything that came later.

Did you Know:

Did you know that before 1962 the area that is now the kitchen was a stage where the show "Jesus Christ Superstar" was presented.

January 22, 1965 – The congregation approved a merger with the Evangelical and Reformed Church and became associated with the newly organized Chesapeake Association of the Central Atlantic Conference of the United Church of Christ.
