A Tale of Redemption from Pastor Jim

This past Sunday the scripture lesson from the Gospel of John was about Nicodemus, a leader of the Pharisees who came to Jesus by night so his peers wouldn't find out. But as soon as Nicodemus greets him, Jesus goes into a discourse starting with a word which has a double meaning in Greek which confuses Nicodemus, and then a few verses later Nicodemus completely disappears from the story. But there is redemption in Nicodemus's future! He will stand up for Jesus before his arrest, asking the Sanhedrin to let Jesus tell his side of the story, and then after his death Nicodemus will bring a mixture of myrrh and aloes to anoint Jesus' body in the tomb. So, he's with Jesus at the beginning, the middle and the end of his story. And isn't that what true discipleship is all about?

I thought a lot about the redemption of Nicodemus the previous week when I happened to notice a full-page obituary in the *New York Times* for a man who wasn't known as a saint but as a sinner. He was Ivan F. Boesky, the brash financier who was arrested for insider trading and who became the symbol of Wall Street greed in the 1980's. He was the man Michael Douglas quotes in the movie *Wall Street* when his character exclaims, "Greed is good!" And when his picture appeared on the cover of every newspaper in September of 1986, I suddenly realized that I had a connection to this man.

Six years earlier I waited on a woman named Helen five days a week, in a wealthy suburb of Detroit. Helen was what you might call "a pill," or "a piece of work," or "very high maintenance." She demanded all of my attention even when I had six other tables, and she always insisted on sitting in a booth "where she could see and be seen." But Helen and I became good friends, and we had something in common that connected us: we both loved New York City! I planned to save up enough money to move there, and she visited NYC twice a year because her son lived there. "He's a millionaire," she would say, "and he does something called arbitrage." "I call him 'Ivan the Terrible!" I wondered what kind of mother would call her son 'Ivan the Terrible,' but according to his obituary everyone who knew him called him that. Apparently, he inherited his mother's fussy eating habits because he was known for going into fancy restaurants and ordering every dish on the menu, tasting them, and then nibbling on one dish while ignoring the rest.

So, when Ivan Boesky's picture was plastered in every newspaper six years later it hit me like a ton of bricks. Helen Boesky was Ivan Boesky's mother! It all made total sense. They even looked alike! All those crazy stories she told me about Ivan driving an ice cream truck without a driver's license at the age of thirteen, and his dropping out of three colleges, and his becoming the half owner of the Beverly Hills Hotel through his marriage. And I waited on his mother for three years!

After he was arrested, Ivan Boesky pleaded guilty to insider trading charges in November 1986, and in December 1987 was sentenced to a three-year prison term. But while he was in prison, he studied the Talmud, the body of Jewish civil and ceremonial law and legend which includes the Mishnah and the Gemara. He was 53 years old when he emerged from prison in 1990, and a year later his wife of 30 years divorced him. In a settlement, he was given \$20 million of her \$100 million fortune. For many years, Ivan Boesky lived quietly in La Jolla, where he remarried and became a father again.

So, kind of like Nicodemus in John's Gospel, Ivan F. Boesky found redemption. He lived another thirty-five years, was never in the news, and found happiness. If there's hope for Nicodemus and Ivan F. Boesky, there's hope for all of us!

TRUSTEES NOTE:

"Nothing is on the level at Level, and it's not very plumb or square, either!" (George Stout, former member.) Thanks to the suggestion of a parishioner, I set out to cut a piece of wire screen to fit below the heavy grates at the drain box at the bottom of the ramp down into the basement to screen out larger debris and make it easier to clean out the drain box. The box now communicates with a drainpipe running across the driveway and out at the surface of the bank to the east. (It was just a stub into the clay soil before!) However, when getting started, I found the grates jammed in place and had to use a crowbar to pry them out. As with everything else at Webster Church, the drain box and grates had been a custom job and the box or grates or both were not square. Lacking a way to grind off a lot of metal from the grates (the preferred solution), I tried various orientations and found one where the two grate panels dropped in without jamming. If you endeavor to clean out the drain box, note the orientation of the two grates so that you can replace them as is, making it easier to remove them the next time.

Did you Know:

Did you know that just as Webster Church is experiencing a face lift for the 100th Anniversary, there were updates occurring in the 1950s?

- 1955 Acoustical tiles were added to the sanctuary ceiling, the interior walls painted, and new drapes were added to the windows.
- 1956 A new heating system was installed with the financial help of Conference.
- 1958 Painting and renovation of the parsonage occurred.
- 1959 The exterior of the church was painted. A new Baldwin electronic organ replaced the Moeller pipe organ.
