#### A Mother's Day Message from Pastor Jim

At the April meeting of the SCCW, Ann asked our Webster ladies to conjure up one or two of their cherished Easter memories. There were many fond memories of wearing new clothes, hats, and shoes, the smell of the kitchen as hair was being permed the night before, dyeing Easter eggs, and favorite Easter candy. So, I decided that even though Mike and I have no children of our own, I would conjure up a Mother's Day memory for the May Webster Word. But every time I started to write something my mind would go completely blank. And that's what working in a restaurant off and on for twenty years will do to you. I only have Mother's Day nightmares! I always got the unhappy meal! Mother's Day is decidedly the worst day of the year for restaurant workers, with Easter Sunday coming in a close second. Fortunately, space does not permit me to elaborate, but just know that anyone working on Mother's Day has probably not achieved seniority status and a restaurant filled with diners who only eat out once a year are no match for them. So let me try to conjure up my earliest Mother's Day memory.

Flint, Michigan had only two family restaurants that my Dad was willing to take his six kids to on any given Sunday after church. The first was the ballroom at the Albert Pick Durant Hotel which was my five siblings' favorite. They loved the "all you can eat" buffet with the chef that carved your prime rib while you watched, and the old-fashioned stodgy atmosphere. And my parents loved the big round tables that were reasonably set far apart from one another. And I think they also liked the price. But I hated it! I preferred their second choice, the Howard Johnson's on Dort Highway. Give me a bowl of New England Clam Chowder, a buttered clam roll, and a slice of coconut cake a la mode with coconut ice cream, and to this very day, I'm still in heaven!

When we were fortunate to eat out after church I was almost always out-voted by my siblings. And I would sit at the big round table and pick at my food at the Albert Pick wondering what all the fuss was about. But one Mother's Day I somehow talked my Dad into taking us to Howard Johnson's, which was a colossal mistake. The restaurant was swamped, the wait was long, the service was slow, and our waitress was totally "in the weeds." It didn't take us long to figure out that she was new, and this was probably her first day. That she had the "jitters" was an understatement. As she was bringing out our entrees she dropped the tray of food, and my

delicious Ipswich clams went flying across the dining room. And carved in my memory even now is the image of our poor waitress trying to scoop up the fallen green peas on the carpet with a teaspoon.

I remember falling backwards in front of the kitchen door at the University Club of Flint with a tray of four salad dressing caddies each filled with French, Blue Cheese, and Russian dressing without anyone noticing. And I remember the maître'd wondering why the carpet in front of that kitchen door was so slick and treacherous. I remember asking my parents not to leave their table for another five minutes until I could get myself "out of the weeds." I remember spilling two glasses of red wine down the back of a lady's white blouse and the owner never finding out. And I remember taking Madonna's especially made cold antipasto to the wrong table while she dined with Randy Newman. To err is human. And to be human is to be misunderstood.

Martha, the sister of Mary and Lazarus knew a lot about "being in the weeds." And when she came to Jesus complaining that her sister was too preoccupied with his teaching and not helping her serve, he basically told her to "be more chill." Jesus said, "Mary had chosen the better part, which will not be taken away from her." And according to Luke, Jesus ate out a lot!

So this Mother's Day when you take Meme, and Grand Zizi, and Great Grand Gigi out to dinner please remember Jesus' wise words to Martha and "try not to be distracted by the service." Restaurant workers are human beings, and you will never know what's really going on in that kitchen. And remember that your waitress may be a mother herself, working on a day that was meant to celebrate her. May God bless our mothers, grandmothers and great grandmothers this Mother's Day and may we have the courage to pick ourselves off the floor like my Howard Johnson's waitress did, during the times we also get the "Unhappy Meal."

Thank you!! Thank you!! Thank you to the congregation of Webster Church for your generous support during this Lenten season by supporting Blessings in a Backpack with a special campaign – Feed a Child. During Lent you put your lose change in a special bank, The funds that were collected will go towards feeding at least 6 children at Havre de Grace Elementary School on the weekends.

Children at Havre de Grace Elementary School receive food during the school day, but many may have little or no food on the weekends. In April 2014, Webster Church provided food on weekends for 20 students out of a possible 250 students through Blessings in a Backpack. Students who participate in the Blessings in a Backpack Program have better test scores, improved reading skills, positive behavior, improved health, and increased attendance all attribute to the success of this program. Food is an essential building block, and in this case truly is a blessing, especially to a hungry child.
