


Credit Card Debt?

FINALLY, Penn State is in the College Football Playoff.

Over the last ten years it's been among the top Power conference teams to not make the CFP, and now it gets its chance after a strong 11-2 season with the only losses coming to Ohio State and in the Big Ten Championship against Oregon.

The team is coming off a good offensive day in the loss to the Ducks, QB Drew Allar announced he's returning for next year, and not to be presumptive, but the bracket is relatively favorable with the winner of this getting Boise State next.

SMU has been a blast. It basically paid to get into the Power Four world of programs, and it was all a wild success with a wonderful season complete with a thriller of a loss to Clemson in the ACC Championship.

It's not like the program is playing with house money at this point, but ... it sort of is. The payoff for the investment in profile improvement totally worked.

Penn State and SMU Bowl History

- This is Penn State's first time in the College Football Playoff. It's 31-20-2 alltime in bowl games, but it's just 3-5 in its last eight games. Head coach James Franklin is 6-6 in bowl games, and 4-5 at Penn State.

- SMU hasn't won a bowl game since the 2012 over Fresno State in the Hawaii, going 0-4 since then. Overall, the program is 7-11-1 in bowls, and current head man Rhett Lashlee lost in each of his first two bowl attempts.

Penn State vs SMU Weather Forecast

It's going to be snowy. The temperature is expected to be in the mid-20s, with Northwest winds from 10-15 mph with gusts up to 25. Wind chills in the middle to upper teens. There is a slight chance of flurries but probably won't be all that bad. There should be enough precipitation to be a factor in the game.

Penn State vs SMU All-Time Record
Penn State is 1-0-1 vs SMU, winning 2621 in 1978. The two teams tied 13-13 in the 1948 Cotton Bowl - both teams finished undefeated.

Why SMU Will Win

Tempo, tempo, tempo. The Mustangs can't line up and blast away on the Nittany Lion fronts, and there won't be any power against this bunch on either side, but when everything clicks with this offense the production is frighteningly efficient.

Clemson had SMU all but dead and buried in the ACC Championship, the Mustangs and QB Kevin Jennings settled in, and the comeback was breathtaking. SMU has to take the fight to the Nittany Lion secondary right away and make Allar and the offense press.

On the other side, here comes the pres-

sure. SMU brings it from all sides, the tackles for loss will be there, and the run defense should hold up. The Mustangs allowed fewer than 100 yards eight times, but ...

Why Penn State Will Win

SMU has yet to face power. There wasn't anyone on the the schedule who could line up and bash away at a high level, and that included Clemson.

Penn State can't be slow and steady - it has to be aggressive - but that might just work if the weather conditions aren't perfect. The offensive line should generate a huge push for a ground game that averages

over five yards per carry.

That line is good in pass protection, it should give Allar enough time to get the midrange passing game going, and the defense should do the rest.

Oregon might have gone off for 466 yards, and USC went for 409 - both with the good-tempo passing attack SMU will bring - but both of those games were anomalies. The Nittany Lion D is sixth in the nation, allowed 16.4 points per game.

Penn State vs SMU: Who Will Win?

Takeaways. Penn State doesn't force a ton of them, but when it forces mistakes, forget it.

SMU's turnover number is skewed with six coming against Duke, but three came in the loss to BYU and two more against Clemson. There will be two turnovers along with way too many penalties against a Penn State team that doesn't make a slew of mistakes.

Just how jacked up will these two be right out of the gate? It's the first game of Smörgåsbord Saturday, it'll be early, and the crowd might need a little bit to get going in the cold and possible snow.

Penn State will blast its way to a score on the first drive, the defense will bend without breaking on SMU's first few drives, and then the home side will own the time of possession battle. SMU doesn't care about that. It scores fast, moves fast, flies fast, and ... it gets off the field fast when this doesn't work.

The Mustangs will come up with a few good scoring drives, but Penn State will be able to do what Clemson couldn't - take the air out of the ball in the fourth quarter. Pick: Penn State 34, SMU 20

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My lesson on taking a lesson

Back in the mid 1970's, after having quick success at the game of golf, my father thought it would be a good idea to get some professional help. Up to that point I had never taken a lesson except from my mother who was a low-handicap golfer. It was because of her that I took up the game in the first place. Sadly, she developed lung cancer and passed away.

Incredibly, I made the high school golf team which surprised everyone. I had gone from never playing to becoming the 6th man on the team. The coach only kept me on the team because he was a friend of my father.

High school matches back in those days were only 9 holes. My first match was a dismal 55. I quickly started to pick things up as my scores started going down into the low-mid 40's in the subsequent weeks. Then, after only 4 months playing, I broke par for the first time shooting a 35 (-1 under) and was medalist for the match.

My father intervened and arraigned a visit with a well-known pro named Jack Grout. I remembered reading about him as he was Jack Nicklaus' coach.

We drove over to Dublin, Ohio where I met Mr. Grout for the first time. After we visited for a bit, he asked me to hit some golf balls. He was patient and related things to me with good mental images. He was big on having sound fundamentals which I lacked at the time. Mr. Grout's valuable insights helped me a lot. I still use some of his teachings today.

One time after finishing my lesson with Mr. Grout, I saw Jack Nicklaus coming our way with his clubs. Mr. Grout introduced me to Nicklaus. They went over to another area to practice as I continued to hit balls. After Mr. Grout left, I decided to go over to Jack for a reason to this day I can't explain. Jack was very gracious. I asked him how he started his backswing? Nicklaus said that he takes the club back low and slow about 18 inches away. I thanked him and high-tailed it out of there

because I thought maybe I broke some kind of club protocol talking to him.


I went home and cut a piece of plywood 18 inches long. I placed it down as I hit balls to make sure It was exactly the distance Nicklaus told me. I figured if this is what the greatest player in golf does then I should practice like this too. I did this daily until my next lesson with Mr. Grout the following week. He watched in horror as my shots were spraying all over place. I was frustrated and disgusted when I finally fessed up to him that I spoke to Nicklaus after our last lesson. I told him about the 18 inches advice. Grout started laughing and then said

"Jack is a great golfer, but what works for him, doesn't always mean it will work for someone else."

Translation: Different words mean different things to different people. I should of just listened to what this great teacher was telling me instead of soliciting advice from another golfer no matter how great he

I learned my lesson that day and as painful as it was those many decades ago it showed me the importance of trusting and listening to only one person at a time.

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

Tiger Woods is back.

Tiger, along with son Charlie, are set to tee it up at the PNC Championship alongside 19 other impressive family duos as they look to break through for their first win as father-and-son at this event.

The start in Orlando comes after Tiger underwent his sixth back surgery in September, aimed to help alleviate back spasms and pain he experienced throughout the 2024 season.

"Playing together is something we look forward to and it's always more special when you're surrounded by friends and family," Tiger said.

The duo finished tied for fifth last year. Tiger did not tee it up at the Hero World Challenge as he admitted he "wasn't tournament sharp," but that's not as much of a concern at the two-day PNC Championship, which allows competitors to use golf carts.

"Hopefully next year will be better, I'll be physically stronger and better," Tiger said. "I know the procedure helped and hopefully that I can then build upon that."

He's certainly hoping he can build upon some success alongside his son this week.

Here's everything else you need to know as plenty of the game's iconic names head to Orlando.

FIELD NOTES AND STORYLINES:

Tiger Woods and son Charlie are teeing it up for the fifth time as a pair. Their best finish is a solo second in 2021 ... Bernard Langer and son Jason will look to successfully defend their title from a year ago. It was an incredible 2024 for Langer, the elder, as he won the season-ending Charles Schwab Championship in dramatic fashion for his 47th career win on PGA TOUR Champions – coming after he ruptured his Achillies in February and missed seven events ... Fred Couples and Trevor Immelman are set to make their PNC Championship debuts. Couples will pair with his 16-year-old stepson Hunter Hannemann while Immelman will pair with his 18-year-old son Jacob Immelman, who plays on the Clemson golf team ... LPGA superstar Nelly Korda will once again be in the field along with her father, Petr. Korda had an all-time campaign on the LPGA Tour in 2024, winning seven times (including five in a row) and claiming Rolex Player of the Year honors ... Annika Sorenstam is also set to return to the PNC Championship field with her now 13-year-old son Will. This is her fifth appearance in the event for the 10-time major winner ... Lee Trevino, now 85, will continue his streak as the only golfer to play every iteration of the PNC Championship. He's back in action alongside his son Daniel ... Steve Stricker will once again tee it up alongside daughter Izzi, with the pair having made their debut in 2023. Izzi is a freshman on the golf team at the University of Wisconsin while Stricker recorded an impressive 10 top-10s in just 12 events on PGA TOUR Champions this season, including a win at the Sanford International ... Padraig Harrington will have a familiar face alongside him in 2024, as his son Paddy Harrington is back (for the sixth time) after sitting on the bench last year with younger brother Ciaran making his tournament debut. Harrington won three times on PGA TOUR Champions this season ... Other past-champion pairings in the field include 2022 winner Vijay Singh with son Qass and 2021 winner John Daly alongside son John Daly II ... The rest of the field is made up of major champions and icons of the game including David Duval (with son Brady), Nick Faldo (with son Matthew), Stewart Cink (with son Connor). Matt Kuchar (with son Carson), Tom Lehman (with son Sean), Justin Leonard (with son Luke), 89-year-old Gary Player (with grandson Alexander), Nick Price (with son Greg) and Mark O'Meara (with son Shaun), who announced in September he would be retiring after a combined 958 starts on the PGA TOUR and PGA TOUR Champions and an induction into the World Golf Hall of Fame.

COURSE: Ritz-Carlton Golf Club, par 72, 7,106 yards (yardage subject to change). The club in Orlando, Florida, has hosted the PNC Championship every year since 2002. Players will navigate a Floridian layout with generous landing areas and wide fairways but subtly contoured greens and strategically placed hazards.

36-HOLE RECORD: 117, John Daly/John Daly II (2021)

18-HOLE RECORD: 56, Davis Love III/Dru Love (Round 2, 2018)

LAST TIME: Langer and his son, Jason (who works for an investment bank in New York) made 10 birdies in 11 holes in the final round to make up a three-shot deficit. This marked Langer's fifth PNC Championship victory, tying the all-time record. He's won three times with Jason and twice with his older son. Stefan. The Langer's 13-under 59 was the round of the day by two shots. Duval and his son, Brady, finished runner up at 23 under, two shots back of the Langer duo's winning

Tiger Woods and his son Charlie fired an 11-under 61 in the second round to finish at 19 under and tied for fifth.

Lanto Griffin punches out of rough setting up birdie at PGA TOUR Q-School

It's a week that defines dozens of careers, the Final Stage of PGA TOUR Q-School presented by Korn Ferry. A finish inside the top five and ties guaranteed a PGA TOUR card, four rounds for a golfer to change their lives.

For some, Sunday's result meant a return to the big stage after failing to keep their card. For others, it's their first touchpoint to the TOUR and a lifelong goal realized. For all five, it means a full year on the PGA TOUR.

Lanto Griffin earned medalist honors, shooting a final-round 63 at TPC Sawgrass' Dye's Valley Course to win by three strokes. Griffin spent much of Sunday on cruise control after opening in 6-under 29, but that was a distinction he held alone. There was plenty of drama unfolding under him on the leaderboard, a tight finish that produced dramatic results.

Meet the six golfers who earned full status on TOUR for 2025.

Lanto Griffin

- Age: 36
- Career PGA TOUR starts: 148
- New PGA TOUR member: No

Griffin's not done yet. The one-time PGA TOUR winner was on the precipice of losing his card for the first time since 2019, but a revelatory week in northeast Florida will keep him on TOUR for another year. Griffin shot the round of Sunday, opening in 6-under 29 and adding another birdie on the back to shoot 63 and earn medalist honors. While he entered the day on the bubble, the drama was all but over by the time he made the turn, comfortably keep-

ing his card for 2025.

It was a needed week for the veteran, who missed just four cuts during the TOUR season, a career low. The winner of the 2019 Houston Open, Griffin has battled injuries in recent seasons. He injured his back in May 2020, rupturing his L5-S1 disc and then re-rupturing it in January 2022. He underwent a microdiscectomy surgery later that summer and battled other rib and back injuries into 2023 before finally returning during the FedExCup Fall healthy. He's struggled since, particularly with his putter which had been the best part of his game for much of his career. Griffin ranked 123rd in SG: Putting in 2024. It was no issue Sunday, pouring in five birdies, an eagle and no bogeys.

Hayden Buckley

- Age: 28
- Career PGA TOUR starts: 90
- New PGA TOUR member: No Another 2024 TOUR member who saved his card this week, Buckley notched backto-back rounds in the 60s over the weekend at Final Stage for the first time since the Barracuda Championship this summer.

A turn in form came just in time. Buckley showed his experience (90 TOUR career starts) when it mattered most, making birdie at the 10th and 16th holes and pouring in a testy mid-range par putt on the 17th hole to make the 18th hole all but a formality. For good measure, he poured in a birdie to finish solo second at 6-under.

Buckley comfortably kept his card in his first two seasons on TOUR (2021-22, 2023), but a loss of form over the second half of 2024 put his future at risk. The Tennessean had made just one cut since July to fall outside the top 150 of the FedExCup, leaving himself with no TOUR status entering this week.

Takumi Kanaya

• Age: 26

- Career PGA TOUR starts: 25
- New PGA TOUR member: Yes

It's a TOUR card long in the making for Kanaya, a seven-time Japan Tour winner and former top-ranked amateur in the world.

He's no stranger to high-level golf. Kanaya, 26, has already appeared in 11 major championships despite never holding a PGA TOUR card and ranked as high as 49th in the Official World Golf Ranking. Most recently, he ranked No. 1 on the Japan Tour's 2024 money list.

He advanced through Second Stage in California, then registered four rock-solid rounds at Final Stage to earn his card. He was the only golfer with four rounds of even-par or better.

Kanaya joins a wave of Japanese players headed to the PGA TOUR. Along with Hideki Matsuyama and Ryo Histatsune, who retained their cards, Kaito Onishi earned his card through the Korn Ferry Tour and Rikuya Hoshino earned his through the DP World Tour.

Alejandro Tosti

- Age: 28
- Career PGA TOUR starts: 32
- New PGA TOUR member: No

A PGA TOUR rookie in 2024, Tosti wasn't ready to go back to the Korn Ferry Tour. The Argentine was 5-over through two rounds at Final Stage but shot 65-69 on the weekend to finish 4-under and sneak into the top five to retain his card.

It was anything but simple for Tosti, who found himself on either side of the bubble depending on when you refreshed your leaderboard. With his TOUR card at stake, Tosti carded seven birdies and three bogeys. He found the water at both the 11th and 13th holes, leading to two bogeys. In between he sandwiched a needed birdie at the 12th. By the end of the round, he was comfortably inside. He tapped in for par on the 18th to clinch.

His season followed a similar cadence, a year of incredible highs and lows. He very nearly won the Texas Children's Houston Open in March, losing to Stephan Jaeger by a shot. But he managed just one top-10 the rest of the season and missed five of seven cuts in the fall to finish No. 137 in the FedExCup. Known to run hot and cold, Tosti caught fire at the right time and earned himself another year on TOUR.

Will Chandler

- Age: 27
- Career PGA TOUR starts: 0
- New PGA TOUR member: Yes

It's a nine-hole stretch he won't soon forget. Chandler fired a back-nine 30 at Dye's Valley to rocket up the leaderboard

and improbably snag a TOUR card. Chandler birdied the 10th, 13th and 15th holes before pouring in an eagle putt from outside 50 feet at the 16th to move to 4-under. The University of Georgia alum narrowly missed another birdie at 17, then clinched it with another par on 18 to solidify the career breakthrough.

Chandler has only 19 TOUR-sanctioned starts to his name – 10 on the Korn Ferry Tour and nine on PGA TOUR Canada, all within the last two years. He hasn't had reliable status on either tour, though an out-of-nowhere runner-up at the 2024 Magnit Championship on the Korn Ferry Tour nearly secured his status on that tour for 2025 and beyond. He didn't do enough the rest of the season, though, finishing 85th on the Points List.

That left him with more than just TOUR status to chase. A finish inside the top 45 would have earned him Korn Ferry Tour status. But that's no matter now. The life on the mini-tours and Korn Ferry Tour Monday qualifiers is over. The 27-year-old is headed straight to the PGA TOUR.

Matthew Riedel

- Age: 24
- Career PGA TOUR starts: 0
- New PGA TOUR member: Yes
 From college to the PGA TOUR in a

matter of months.

Riedel finished T2 at the SEC

Riedel finished T2 at the SEC Championship in April, turned professional in June and earned his PGA TOUR card by December.

It was anything but a guarantee on Sunday. While the Vanderbilt alum began the day tied for the lead, he quickly dropped out of the top five after going 3-over through 10 holes. The starting cushion proved pivotal as Reidel needed only to play the final eight holes in 1-under. He got that crucial birdie on the par-5 16th. He laid up off the tee with iron, gave himself a full wedge in and stuck the approach to within 3 feet for the birdie. Riedel scrambled well on the 17th, recovering from a wayward drive to save par. He sunk a midrange par putt on the 18th to secure his card.

Riedel played five seasons at Vanderbilt (2019-24), where he was a two-time All-Southeastern Conference First Team selection (2023, 2024) and won his lone collegiate event at the 2022 SEC Match Play presented by Jerry Pate. He finished No. 77 on the 2024 Korn Ferry Tour Points List in just 13 starts after he joined the Tour via PGA TOUR University performance benefits in June.

He will aim to make it the only 13 starts he makes on the Korn Ferry Tour.

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College football bowl storylines



College football bowl preview: Storylines to know and players to watch

The 2024-25 bowl season is in full swing, kicking off with the Cricket Celebration Bowl (Jackson State vs. South Carolina State) on Dec. 14.

In a span of 19 days, 36 bowl games will be played -- on top of the College Football Playoff.

We will provide our thoughts on all 36 bowl matchups, including key storylines to follow and a player to keep an eye on in every game.

StaffDNA Cure Bowl Orlando, Florida Ohio (10-3) vs Jacksonville State (9-4) Dec. 20, 11 a.m. / (ESPN) Line: Ohop -5 / 56.5

Ohio

Season storyline: Ohio University won its first MAC championship since 1968 with a blowout 38-3 victory over rival Miami (Ohio) in the conference championship game last week, making it three straight seasons the Bobcats have won 10 games. But there will be a new look to the team in the bowl game after head coach Tim Albin left to take the Charlotte head-coaching job. Brian Smith, Ohio's associate head coach and offensive coordinator, will serve as interim head coach. Despite losing six all-conference players from year's team, including quarterback Kurtis Rourke to Indiana, Ohio (10-3) played its best football the second half of the season and won six straight, which included avenging an earlier loss to Miami in the conference title

Player to watch: The Bobcats replaced

Rourke at quarterback with a talented transfer of their own in Parker Navarro, who started his career at UCF. Navarro, a senior, played one of his best games of the season in the conference title game. He passed for two touchdowns and ran for two touchdowns. Both of the quarterbacks in this game are dual threats. Navarro has 2,169 passing yards and 12 touchdowns and 943 rushing yards and 15 more touchdowns on the ground. He has also thrown 10 interceptions. Injuries have slowed Navarro at times, where he was replaced at quarterback by Nick Poulos in the first Miami game after throwing two interceptions, but has accounted for 15 touchdowns in his past four games.

Jacksonville State

Season storyline: After starting the season 0-3, Jacksonville State won nine of its past 10 games and the Conference USA championship with a dominant 52-12 win over Western Kentucky in the title game. That win came a week after losing 19-17 to Western Kentucky, which snapped the Gamecocks' eight-game winning streak. Jacksonville State is ranked 12th nationally in scoring offense (36.7 points per game) and rolled up 562 yards of total offense and 26 first downs in the blowout win over Western Kentucky. It's Rich Rodriguez's third season at Jacksonville State, and he has won nine games all three seasons. But he has also been mentioned prominently in the West Virginia head-coaching search.

Player to watch: Senior running back Tre Stewart and Boise State's Ashton Jeanty are the only two players in the country to rush for more than 1,600 yards and average more than 6 yards per carry this season. Stewart is a great story. He played at

Division II Limestone University in Gaffney, South Carolina and rushed for more than 1,000 yards in each of his past two seasons there before transferring to Jacksonville State this year. He has 24 total touchdowns (23 rushing and one receiving) and teams with quarterback Tyler Huff to give the Gamecocks a potent one-two punch in the running game. Huff has rushed for 1,343 yards and 14 touchdowns.

Pick: Ohio 31 JSU 24

Union Home Mortgage Gasparilla Bowl Tampa, Florida Tulane (9-4) vs Florida (7-5) Dec. 20, 2:30 p.m. / (ESPN) Line: Florida -12 / 49.5

Tulane

Season storyline: Jon Sumrall picked up where Willie Fritz left off in his first year as Tulane head coach, guiding the Green Wave to their third straight AAC championship game appearance and third straight season with at least nine wins. Though it lost in the conference title game to Army, Tulane is making its third straight bowl appearance. Quarterback Darian Mensah (2,723 yards, 22 TDs, 6 INTs) and running back Makhi Hughes (1,372 yards rushing) led them offensively though Mensah entered the transfer portal Monday with three years of eligibility remaining.

Player to watch: RB Makhi Hughes. The sophomore running back has put together outstanding back-to-back seasons, rushing for more than 1,000 yards in each of his first two years and earning first-team All-AAC honors those two seasons as well. Hughes ranked second in the AAC in the regular season in rushing and third in rushing touchdowns (15). He ran for 100 or more yards on the ground in five of the team's eight regular-season conference games.

Florida

Season storyline: For most of the season, there was widespread speculation that coach Billy Napier might be done with the Gators, particularly after a 4-5 start. But following a dispiriting 49-17 loss at No. 3 Texas, athletic director Scott Stricklin announced Napier would return for 2025. Florida closed the season on a three-game winning streak, including big home wins against LSU and No. 14 Ole Miss, not only rewarding the patience that has been shown Napier but providing a measure of hope for the future -- considering the roster is filled with young players set to return. Add to that a top-tier recruiting class that Napier finished off with a bang, and there is finally optimism around the Florida program. Player to watch: DJ Lagway. Florida

turned to Lagway permanently after Graham Mertz went out for the season in early October. Lagway came into Florida as the No. 12-rated player in the ESPN 300 in the Class of 2024 and quickly showed why so many had such high expectations for him -- showing off his exceptional arm talent and his ability to run. Florida was beating Georgia until Lagway hurt his hamstring and missed the rest of the game. This season, Lagway threw for 1,610 yards, 11 touchdowns and seven interceptions and added 97 yards rushing on the ground as a true freshman.

Pick: Tulane 30 Florida 27

Myrtle Beach Bowl Conway, South Carolina Coastal Carolina (6-6) vs UTSA (6-6) Dec. 23, 10 a.m. / (ESPN) Line: UTSA -10 / 55.5

Coastal Carolina

Season storyline: It was an all-or-nothing season for Coastal -- the Chants scored 40 or more points five times and fewer than 20 three times, but November wins over App State and Georgia State secured bowl eligibility (and a bowl home game) in Tim Beck's second season. We'll see who suits up at QB, however: Their top two, including starter Ethan Vasko, have entered the transfer portal.

Player to watch: RB Braydon Bennett. The senior is one of the most explosive running backs in the Sun Belt; he averages 6.5 yards per carry, and among his 112 rushes are gains of 67, 49, 37 and 25 yards (plus receptions of 37 and 25 yards). He was responsible for a lot of the "alls" in the all-or-nothing year.

UTSA

Season storyline: A disappointing 2-4 start turned into a happier 4-2 finish as UTSA found its offense midseason and scored at least 38 points in five of its past six games. After going 32-9 from 2021-23, it's obviously a step backward to have to scrape out six wins, but Jeff Traylor's Roadrunners head toward the offseason with momentum, at least. That's doubly true if they can finish the season with a second straight bowl victory.

Player to watch: QB Owen McCown. Last year's bowl hero began the season in patchy form but caught fire late. Over his past six games, he averaged 310 passing yards per game -- five guys caught between 13-24 passes -- with a 2-to-1 TD-INT ratio. Not including sacks, he threw in over 50 rushing yards per game in that stretch as well. When he ignited, so did UTSA. --

Pick: UTSA 37 CCU 30

Northern Illinois

Season storyline: Thomas Hammock's sixth NIU team began the season with maybe the most momentous win in program history, a 16-14 shocker against a Notre Dame team that could make serious noise in the College Football Playoff. The season got bumpier from there as injuries took their toll on the Huskies' offense. But the defense remained sturdy, and NIU won three of its final four games to secure a third bowl bid in four seasons.

Player to watch: Safety Nate Valcarcel. NIU ranks third nationally in completion rate allowed and fifth in yards allowed per dropback, and while pass rushers like Devonte O'Malley played a role and corner Jacob Finley is an absolute star, Valcarcel runs the show. He's stellar in coverage but also a heck of a playmaker, picking off two passes, breaking up eight more and even tossing in a pair of sacks via the good-old safety blitz.

Fresno State

Season storyline: Following Jeff Tedford's awkwardly timed July resignation, Fresno State stumbled through an up-and-down season under interim coach Tim Skipper. The Bulldogs started the season 3-1 and reached 5-3 after a pummeling of rival San José State, but they lost three of four in a home stretch littered by tight games. The defense played its part, but with no semblance of a run game, the offense got bogged down quite a bit and went from averaging 35.5 points over the first four games to just 22.1 over the past eight. And since the season ended, seven starters, including quarterback Mikey Keene and star corner Al'zillion Hamilton, have entered the transfer portal.

Player to watch: CB Julian Neal. Fresno State was blessed with three excellent corners in 2024, and while Hamilton is in the portal and senior Cam Lockridge's status is uncertain, the Bulldogs still have Neal, a junior who had more interceptions (two) than TDs allowed (one) and allowed a team-low 15.4 QBR as its primary coverage guy. It will be a surprise if either NIU or Fresno State passes particularly well in Boise.

Pick: Fresno State 30 NIU 28

Hawai'i Bowl Honolulu, Hawaii South Florida (6-6) vs San Jose St. (7-5) Dec. 24, 7 p.m. / (ESPN) Line: SJSU -3.5 / 60.5

South Florida

Season storyline: After a surprising sevenwin campaign in 2023, USF entered 2024 as a sleeper pick for the AAC title but faceplanted out of the gates, starting 2-4. Alex Golesh's Bulls rallied, however, winning four of their last six to clinch bowl eligibility. After averaging just 23.5 points per game in the first half of the season, they improved to 39.3 per game over the back half. They can still match last year's sevenwin tally, which, for a program that won just eight total games from 2019 to '22, is still a pretty big deal.

Player to watch: RB Kelley Joiner. When he thrives, USF wins. Joiner averaged 9.4 yards per carry with 11 touchdowns in the Bulls' six wins and 2.9 yards per carry with no scores in their losses. Quarterback Bryce Archie found a solid rhythm down the stretch, too, but Joiner is the team's X-factor.

San José State

Season storyline: Seven is becoming an awfully common number in San José. SJSU won seven games in three of Brent Brennan's past four years in charge and finished 7-5 in Ken Niumatalolo's first regular season succeeding Brennan. With a bowl victory, however, it would reach eight wins for the first time since 2012. That would be a deserved plaudit for a team that came achingly close to big things: The Spartans lost by nine combined points at Washington State and Colorado State and gave Boise State and UNLV fits at home before fading late. A 34-31 win over Stanford did salvage some late-season joy, and a bowl win would add to that.

Player to watch: LB Jordan Pollard. The junior from Los Angeles leads the team in tackles, tackles for loss and run stops. With tackles Soane Toia and Gafa Faga eating up blockers up front and Pollard roaming from sideline to sideline, the Spartans have put together one of the better run defenses in the Group of 5, allowing just 4.1 yards per carry (not including sacks), which ranks 18th nationally.

Pick: SJSU 32 USF 21

GameAbove Sports Bowl Detroit, Michigan Pittsburgh (7-5) vs Toledo (7-5) Dec. 26, 1 p.m. (ESPN) Line: Pittsburgh -7/51

Pittsburgh

Season storyline: The Panthers had a season of two halves. Behind quarterback Eli Holstein, Pitt won its first seven games, culminating with a 41-13 rout of Syracuse, to jump to 18th in the polls. But then Holstein suffered an ankle injury, and the Panthers remarkably didn't win again, dropping their final five games of the season in a late collapse. Overall, 7-5 was a solid year for Pitt, given the preseason expectations. But the way the season swooned down the stretch felt disappointing.

Player to watch: Senior Gavin
Bartholomew is set to play his 50th career
game, the most for a tight end in Pitt history. Bartholomew has 37 receptions for 303
yards and four touchdowns, all coming in
Pitt's final four games. He's one touchdown
away from tying Dorin Dickerson (200609) for the third-most touchdowns by a
tight end in Pitt history.

Toledo

Season storyline: The Rockets started the year hot, rolling past Mississippi State 41-17 in Starkville to start 3-0. But Toledo couldn't keep the momentum going. The Rockets, who at one point looked like the obvious MAC favorites, lost their final two conference games to fall out of contention for the MAC championship game, including an overtime defeat to rival Akron, which hadn't defeated Toledo since 2013. Player to watch: Both Jerjuan Newton and

Junior Vandeross III earned All-MAC honors at wide receiver after combining for 137 catches and 1,712 yards. Newton, however, led the MAC with 11 touchdowns. The senior from Florida enters bowl season with 32 career touchdown catches, a Toledo record.

Pick: Pitt 36 Toledo 24

Rate Bowl Phoenix, Arizona Rutgers (7-5) vs Kansas State (8-4) Dec. 26, 4:30 p.m. / (ESPN) Line: K-State -7.5 / 52

Rutger

Season storyline: The Scarlet Knights got off to a promising start, which included back-to-back, three-point victories over Virginia Tech (26-23) and Washington (21-18) in late September. But Rutgers couldn't sustain that momentum. The Scarlet Knights went three quarters without scoring in a 14-7 loss to Nebraska, which sparked a four-game losing streak. Rutgers bounced back, though, with consecutive wins over Minnesota (26-19) and Maryland (31-17) to reach bowl eligibility. The Scarlet Knights routed Michigan State (41-14) in the regular-season finale to win seven games for the first time in a decade. Capital One Bowl Mania

Player to watch: Kyle Monangai earned first-team All-Big Ten honors, becoming the fourth player in school history to rush for more than 1,000 yards in two straight seasons. Monangai finished his senior year with 1,279 yards and 14 touchdowns while averaging 5.0 yards per carry. Monangai could opt out of the bowl game to prepare for the NFL draft. That would create an opportunity for freshman Antwan Raymond, who rushed for 344 yards and five touchdowns while backing up Monangai.

Kansas State

Season storyline: The Wildcats opened the year as one of the co-favorites alongside Utah to make the Big 12 championship game, and potentially, advance to the playoff. But K-State dropped three of its final four games, including one to Arizona State (24-14) and another to Iowa State (29-21), both of which advanced to the Big 12 title game instead. The Wildcats tied West Virginia for eighth in the Big 12 standings. **Player to watch:** Defensive end Brendan Mott finished the regular season with a Big 12-high 8.5 sacks. He also had a fumble recovery and an interception on the way to earning Big 12 Defensive Lineman of the Year honors. Mott was a former walk-on

from Iowa City, Iowa. Mott's father, Joe, was an All-Big Ten defensive end at Iowa and a third-round pick of the New York Jets in 1989.

Pick: Kansas State 38 Rutgers 27

68 Ventures Bowl Mobile, Alabama Arkansas St. (7-5) vs. Bowling Green (7-5) Dec. 26, 8 p.m. / (ESPN)

Arkansas State

Season storyline: Arkansas State extended coach Butch Jones' contract through 2029 after he became the third FBS coach to lead at least four programs to bowl appearances (Jones previously coached at Tennessee, Cincinnati and Central Michigan). The Red Wolves won four of five games, beginning on Oct. 19 with a 44-28 victory over Southern Miss.

Line: BGU -7 / 50.5

Player to watch: Trevian Thomas was Arkansas State's lone first-team All-Sun Belt selection. The senior safety finished the regular season with 73 tackles and five interceptions, which tied for most in the league. He ensured Arkansas State's first winning season since 2019 with an acrobatic interception to seal a 28-21 victory over Louisiana-Monroe on Nov. 24.

Bowling Green

Season storyline: The Falcons emerged out of a rugged nonconference slate, which included narrow losses at Penn State (34-27) and Texas A&M (26-20), as a legitimate MAC title contender. But Bowling Green couldn't get going offensively in a loss to Miami (Ohio) in the regular-season finale, which sent the RedHawks to the MAC title game, and the Falcons home. Player to watch: Harold Fannin Jr. has emerged as one of the top playmakers in college football. He leads all FBS tight ends with 100 receptions for 1,342 yards to go along with nine touchdowns. Fannin topped 100 yards receiving in seven games this season. He also had a game-winning, 31-yard touchdown run late in the fourth quarter against Akron on Oct. 5. Fannin became just the second tight end to be named any league's Offensive Player of the Year. He is rising up draft boards, but if he plays in the bowl game, he'll be the best player on the field.

Pick: BGU 33 ASU 20

Lockheed Martin Armed Forces Bowl Fort Worth, Texas Oklahoma (6-6) vs Navy (9-3) Dec. 27, 11 a.m / (ESPN) Line: Oklahoma -5 / 43.5

Oklahoma

Season storyline: Not a lot went right for the Sooners this season. They were beset with injuries, especially at receiver, and went back and forth at quarterback between Jackson Arnold and true freshman Michael Hawkins Jr. Arnold, a former fivestar prospect, finished the season as the starter but has since entered the transfer portal. Oklahoma struggled on offense most of the season, and Brent Venables fired Seth Littrell as his offensive coordinator. Co-offensive coordinator Joe Jon Finley is expected to call plays in the bowl game. The Sooners (6-6) were held to 17 or fewer points in five of their eight SEC games.

Player to watch: With Arnold in the portal, Hawkins is in line to get another shot at quarterback. He started three games after replacing Arnold in the first half of the Tennessee game and led Oklahoma to a 27-21 win over Auburn on the road in his first career start. But a few weeks later, in a blowout 35-9 home loss to South Carolina, Hawkins turned the ball over on the Sooners' first three possessions and was benched in favor of Arnold for the rest of the season. Hawkins has passed for 536 yards and a touchdown and thrown two interceptions.

Navy

Season storyline: Navy (9-3) comes in on a high after beating 11-win Army, snapping a two-game losing streak in the storied rivalry. Navy reeled off six straight wins to open the season and moved into the AP poll. The Midshipmen won all six of those games by double digits, but then lost their next two games to Notre Dame and Rice. Navy scored 14 or fewer points in all three of its losses. Navy finished third in th AAC after being picked 11th in the preseason. Player to watch: One of the best comeback stories of the season, Navy quarterback Blake Horvath bounced back with a vengeance in 2024 after missing the final seven games of the 2023 season with an injured thumb. Horvath, a junior, became the first Navy quarterback to pass for more than 1,000 yards in a season since 2019. In Navy's biggest game of the season, Horvath outplayed Army QB Bryson Daily, who finished sixth in the Heisman voting, with 107 yards passing, 204 yards passing and four touchdowns. For the season, he has 1,261 passing yards and 13 touchdowns and has rushed for 1,099 yards and 15 more TDs.

Pick: Navy 30 OU 20

Birmingham Bowl Birmingham, Alabama Georgia Tech (7-5) vs Vanderbilt (6-6) Dec. 27, 2:30 p.m. / (ESPN) Line: Georgia Tech -2.5 / 41.5 Georgia Tech

Season storyline: Georgia Tech (7-5) faced a difficult schedule with three of its final five games coming against top-12 teams, and the Yellow Jackets came painfully close to pulling off one of the upsets of the year in college football. After upsetting No. 4 Miami and then beating NC State the next week, both at home, Georgia Tech lost 44-42 in eight overtimes at No. 7 Georgia in the regular-season finale. The Yellow Jackets had a chance to win it in regulation but fumbled on third down with a minute to play, leaving Georgia enough time to drive for a touchdown and force overtime.

Player to watch: Quarterback Haynes

King's toughness was on full display all season, but never more than in the eight-overtime loss to Georgia. He became the first FBS player in history to pass for 300 yards, rush for 100 yards and have three rushing touchdowns against an AP top-10 opponent. His fumble late in regulation was a killer, but the Yellow Jackets would have never been in the game without him. King, a transfer from Texas A&M, will be without his top receiver Eric Singleton Jr., who recently entered the transfer portal Vanderbilt

Season storyline: Clark Lea engineered an incredible turnaround this season at Vanderbilt, which has a chance to have its first winning season since 2013 if it can take down Georgia Tech in the bowl game. The Commodores lost 10 straight games to close the 2023 season, and Clark completely overhauled the program in the offseason. The results were immediate, as Vanderbilt started out 5-2 and made an appearance in the top 25 rankings. Along the way, Vanderbilt upset then-No. 1 Alabama 40-35 on Oct. 5, which was Vandy's first win in the series in 40 years. The Commodores (6-6) seemed to run out of gas to end the season and lost their past three games. Player to watch: Few players were more entertaining this season than quarterback Diego Pavia, whose ability to scramble and make big plays added a new dynamic to Vanderbilt's offense. Pavia started his career in junior college at New Mexico Military Institute, then went to New Mexico State and transferred to Vanderbilt, where he led the Commodores in passing and rushing. He accounted for 23 touch-

downs (17 passing and six rushing).

Pick: Vanderbilt 28 Georgia Tech 27

Texas Tech

Season storyline: Texas Tech entered the month of November still holding onto hopes of playing in the Big 12 championship game, but those hopes were dashed by a 41-27 home loss to Colorado on Nov. 9. The Red Raiders (8-4) had several big moments and wound up beating both of the teams that did play for the Big 12 title --Arizona State and Iowa State. But in losing three of four games from Oct. 19 through Nov. 9, Texas Tech gave up a total of 135 points. Coach Joey McGuire grew up in Texarkana on the Texas-Arkansas border and was a big Arkansas fan as a kid. Player to watch: Redshirt senior Tahi Brooks broke the school's career rushing record this season previously held by Byron Hanspard. After rushing 1,538 yards a year ago, the bruising 5-foot-10, 230pound Brooks has 1,505 yards in 11 games this season. He has rushed for 17 touchdowns and is ranked third nationally with 286 rushing attempts. He has been the centerpiece of the Texas Tech offense, and the

Red Raiders are hopeful he will opt to play in the bowl game.

Arkansas

Season storyline: The Hogs (6-6) need a win in the bowl game to avoid their second straight losing season. The high point was upsetting playoff-bound Tennessee 19-14 at home on Oct. 5, but the Hogs could never find any rhythm as the season progressed. They won just two more games the rest of the way against Mississippi State and Louisiana Tech. Three of their six losses were by a touchdown or less, and with some questions swirling about coach Sam Pittman's future, he's set to be back in '25. Player to watch: Quarterback Taylen Green's best football is ahead of him as he tutors under offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach Bobby Petrino, but Green showed flashes this season after transferring to Arkansas from Boise State. Green passed for 2,813 yards and 13 touchdowns, but also threw nine interceptions. He is great at keeping the play alive and tough to tackle. He rushed for 521 yards and seven touchdowns.

Pick Texas Tech 44 Arkansas 42

DirecTV Holiday Bowl San Diego, California Syracuse (9-3) vs Washington State (8-4) Dec. 27, 7 p.m. / (Fox) Line: Syracuse -14 / 54.5

Syracuse

Season storyline: Coach Fran Brown's first regular season at Syracuse was an overwhelming success, leading the program to its first nine-win season since 2018 and just second since 2001 (both of those were 10-win seasons). Had it not been for a puzzling home loss to Stanford early in the season, Syracuse would have had a chance to tie the single-season school wins record in this game. It was ranked No. 21 in the final College Football Playoff rankings and had two wins against top 25 teams: No. 13 Miami and No. 24 UNLV.

Player to watch: After transferring from Ohio State, quarterback Kyle McCord led the nation in passing yards (4,326) and threw 29 touchdown passes to 12 interceptions. He was held to less than 300 yards in only one game all season -- an overtime win against Virginia Tech -- and was particularly good down the stretch, throwing for 850 yards over the final two games of the season -- wins against UConn and Miami -- with five touchdowns and no picks. McCord was named second-team All-ACC.

Washington State

Season storyline: Wazzu's season almost needs to be evaluated in two parts: The first nine games and the past three games.

Because after starting 8-1, the Cougars rose to No. 18 in the playoff rankings -- with New Mexico, Oregon State and Wyoming left on their schedule -- and were chasing the school's first 12-win season. Then disaster struck. WSU was upset in all three games to limp to the finish line, eroding much of the positive momentum it had

built along the way. Coach Jake Dickert fired defensive coordinator Jeff Schmedding and offensive coordinator Ben Arbuckle was hired away by Oklahoma at season's end.

Player to watch: QB John Mateer was one of the most entertaining quarterbacks in college football, throwing for 3,139 yards with 29 touchdown passes and rushing for 826 yards with 15 touchdowns in the regular season. But with that success -- in this new era of college football -- comes questions about his future at Washington State. As former WSU starter Cam Ward was last offseason, Mateer would surely be a sought-after player in the transfer portal and if he chooses that route, it would likely mean he would not play in San Diego.

Pick: Syracuse 32 Washington State 28

Texas A&M

Season storyline: After a 7-1 start, Texas A&M looked as if it had a chance to do something special -- and even after losing two of its next three games -- against South Carolina and Auburn -- still could have played its way into the College Football Playoff. But a 17-7 loss to Texas in the regular-season finale ended that dream, relegating the Aggies to Las Vegas. Still, Mike Elko's first season in College Station represented a step forward following Jimbo Fisher's ouster.

Player to watch: DE Nic Scourton.
Assuming he plays, Scourton will be one of the best pass rushers USC has seen all year. He finished the regular season with 14 tackles for loss and five sacks, leading the team in both categories. In ESPN NFL draft analyst Matt Miller's November mock draft, Scourton was projected as the No. 20 pick.

USC

Season storyline: USC's third season under Lincoln Riley was such a disaster that he was forced to address reports that he was a candidate for the vacancy at UCF. Riley quickly dismissed them, but the possibility that that was even slightly plausible speaks volumes. The Trojans went from 11-3 in Riley's first season to 8-5 last year to 6-6 in 2024 and finished with a losing record (4-5) in the Big Ten. If not for a buyout reportedly in the neighborhood of \$90 million, it's fair to question whether Riley would still be the coach.

Player to watch: RB Woody Marks. A transfer from Mississippi State, Marks was a seamless addition for USC, rushing for 1,133 yards and nine touchdowns -- by far the most productive season of his college career. He was one of two USC offensive or defensive players named second-team All-Big Ten, alongside offensive guard Emmanuel Pregnon.

NFL picks, predictions for Week 16



Eagles keep rolling vs. Commanders, Bucs knock out Cowboys on 'SNF'

The NFL front-loaded the Week 16 schedule with AFC showdowns, starting with a Thursday Night Football matchup between the Broncos and Chargers. Then, the league went directly against the College Football Playoff with a Saturday doubleheader featuring the Chiefs and Texans and the Steelers and Ravens.

What's left for Sunday?

Keep an eye on the three-way race for home-field advantage in the NFC. Detroit, Philadelphia, and Minnesota all have road games. The Lions travel to Chicago in a rematch of the 23-20 Thanksgiving nailbiter that led to the firing of Matt Eberflus. Philadelphia travels to Washington in a NFC East matchup, and Minnesota heads to Seattle. The NFC playoff picture is starting to solidify around those three teams and Green Bay — the other team with at least 10 wins with three weeks left to play. It's anybody's guess who gets No. 1. A loss here likely would knock a team out.

Denver (9-5) at L.A Chargers (8-6) Thursday, 7:15 p.m. / Prime Video Line: Chargers -3 / 41.5

The Chargers are 1-3 S/U in their past four games, and the season-ending knee injury to JK Dobbins continues to loom large. Los Angeles has averaged just 66.2 rushing yards per game through this

stretch. Denver averages 86.5 rushing yards through a four-game win streak, but the defense is creating more turnovers. That could key an upset here.

Pick: Broncos 24, Chargers 21

Houston (9-5) at Kansas City (13-1) Saturday, 12 p.m. / NBC Line: Chiefs -3.5 / 41.5

Will Patrick Mahomes (ankle) play in this game? The Texans are favored, which means the oddsmakers believe Carson Wentz will get the start. Houston is 4-3 S/U on the road, and C.J. Stroud has an 83.8 passer rating on the road. We reserve the right to change this pick based on Mahomes' status, and right now, we assume he plays through the injury with Kansas City still looking for home-field advantage.

Pick: Chiefs 20, Texans 16

Pittsburgh (10-4) at Baltimore (9-5) Saturday, 3:30 p.m. / Fox Line: Ravens -6.5 / 45.5

When will the Ravens figure out the Steelers? Baltimore has lost to Pittsburgh in each of Lamar Jackson's past four starts, including an 18-16 loss in Week 11 where Jackson was limited to 253 total yards. The Steelers have a minus-9 turnover ratio in their past five games, and that includes road losses at Cleveland and Philadelphia. The Steelers will be the popular pick to cover, but the Ravens are due here.

Pick: Ravens 24, Steelers 17

N.Y Giants (2-12) at Atlanta (7-7) Sunday, 12 p.m. / Fox Line: Falcons -8.5 / 42.5

The Giants' nine-game losing skid continues, and they failed to cover a 17-point spread against Baltimore last week. Atlanta is coming off a short week, and the Falcons are 1-3 S/U as a favorite. That translates into an ugly football game, but Atlanta still has something to play for in the NFC South. New York is 2-4 S/U on the road, and all four losses are by one score. A backdoor cover is possible, but who is the quarterback for the Giants?

Pick: Falcons 21, Giants 12

New England (3-11) at Buffalo (11-3) **Sunday, 3:25 p.m. / CBS** Line: Bills -14 / 46.5

This is a huge line, but the Bills' offense is clicking. Buffalo is averaging 41.7 points per game over its past three, and Josh Allen is making a run at the NFL MVP award. The Patriots have lost four games by 14 points or more this season, and the Pats have allowed 30-plus points in two of their past three games. Buffalo has won the past

two home meetings by an average of nine

Pick: Bills 31, Patriots 13

Detroit (12-2) at Chicago (4-10) Sunday, 12 p.m. / Fox Line: Lions -6.5 / 47.5

Injuries are piling up on the Lions' defense, but the offense remains in top form. Jared Goff averages 332.7 passing yards with 10 TDs and one interception in his past three starts. This might be an audition of sorts for Lions offensive coordinator Ben Johnson, too. Look for Detroit to re-assert its place atop the NFC standings after a tough loss with Buffalo. This won't be as close as the first meeting.

Pick: Lions 31, Bears 17

Cleveland (3-11) at Cincinnati (6-8) Sunday, 12 p.m. / Fox Line: Bengals7.5 / 46.5

The Browns have averaged 10.5 points per game in losses to the Steelers and





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Chiefs, and Dorian Thompson-Robinson could get the start against Cincinnati. The Browns also are without Nick Chubb, who suffered a broken foot. The Bengals are looking to make a playoff push, and Joe Burrow has at least three TD passes in six straight games. Cincinnati has won the past two home meetings by an average of 15 points per game.

Pick: Bengals 30, Browns 20

Tennessee (3-11) at Indianapolis (6-8) Sunday, 12 p.m. / CBS Line: Colts -3.5 / 42.5

These teams combined for 11 turnovers last week. Will Levis committed four turnovers in Week 15, and Mason Rudolph was not much better. The Colts committed five turnovers in their loss to Denver. Anthony Richardson had two interceptions. This one literally comes down to who protects the football, and it feels like a one-score game either way.

Pick: Colts 21, Titans 18

L.A Rams (8-6) at New York Jets (4-10) Sunday, 12 p.m. / CBS Line: Rams -3 / 46.5

The Rams lead the NFC West after a three-game winning streak. Los Angeles has not committed a turnover in that stretch, and Matthew Stafford has taken just two sacks. The Jets are 0-4 S/U and 1-3 ATS as an underdog this season. Aaron Rodgers is coming off his best game of the season, and the connection with Davante Adams finally resurfaced. That won't be enough against a better defense.

Pick: Rams 27, Jets 17

Philadelphia (12-2) at Washington (9-5) Sunday, 12 p.m. / Fox Line: Eagles -3.5 / 45.5

The Eagles still have a shot at the No. 1 seed, and the defense has quietly allowed less than 20 points in five of its past six games. Saquon Barkley had 146 yards and two TDs in the last meeting with the Commanders, but he's dealing with some soreness after the Week 15 matchup against Pittsburgh. Will Nick Sirianni lighten that workload ahead of the postseason? This is a possible first-round preview, albeit on the road for Philadelphia.

Pick: Eagles 28, Commanders 20

Arizona (7-7) at Carolina (3-11) Sunday, 12 p.m. / Fox Line: Cardinals -5 / 47.5

The Cardinals are still in the mix in the NFC West race, but they must avoid a hiccup against the Panthers. Carolina has given up 200-plus rushing yards in its past three losses. That means 20-plus carries for James Conner, who's averaged 89.3 yards per game over the past three weeks. Kyler Murray edges Bryce Young in a duel between Heisman Trophy winners and No. 1 picks, showing why patience is required. Pick: Cardinals 32, Panthers 23

Minnesota (12-2) at Seattle (8-6)

Sunday, 3:05 p.m. / Fox Line: Vikings -3 / 43.5

Geno Smith (knee) left the Week 15 loss to the Packers, and if he cannot go, then Sam Howell will face the Vikings, one of eight NFL teams with 40-plus sacks. Minnesota is 3-1 ATS when favored by four points or more, and Sam Darnold continues to be the hot hand.

Pick: Vikings 31, Seahawks 19

Jacksonville (3-11) at Las Vegas (2-12) Sunday, 3:25 p.m. / CBS Line: Raiders -1.5 / 47.5

This is a draft-positioning game. Mac Jones has thrown seven interceptions in his past five starts, and the Raiders continue to shuffle quarterbacks in and out each week. It's two bad teams, and Las Vegas is working on a short week. Jacksonville is 2-0 ATS as an underdog of three points or less. Why not?

Pick: Jaguars 18, Raiders 15

San Francisco (6-8) at Miami (6-8) Sunday, 3:25 p.m. / CBS Line: Dolphins -1 / 44.5

A pair of 6-8 teams fighting to keep their slim playoff hopes alive. The 49ers continue to battle injuries, and the lack of a running game showed in the Thursday Night Football loss to the Rams in Week 15. The Dolphins are 4-3 S/U at home, and they have just five turnovers in those games. That could be a difference in a tossup game, but the 49ers show that last bit of fight as an underdog.

Pick: 49ers 27, Dolphins 22

Tampa Bay (8-6) at Dallas (6-8) Sunday, 7:20 p.m. / NBC/Peacock Line: Bucs -4 / 48.5

The Buccaneers can end the Cowboys' last-ditch playoff push here. Dallas running back Rico Dowdle has averaged 130.7 rushing yards per game over the past three weeks, and Cooper Rush has just one interception in his past four starts. Is there an upset in the works here? Dallas has one victory at home this season and is 4-7 ATS as an underdog. Baker Mayfield has led the Bucs to four straight victories. The playoff push continues.

Pick: Buccaneers 28, Cowboys 21

New Orleans (5-9) at Green Bay (10-4) Monday, 7:30 p.m. / ESPN Line: Packers -14.5 / 42.5

The Packers can clinch a playoff spot with a win, and Green Bay has covered in its past four games. New Orleans has allowed 135 rushing yards per game in its past three games, and that's not good news when facing Josh Jacobs, who has scored eight rushing TDs in his past four outings. There is potential for a blowout here if Jordan Love does not turn the ball over at home. Love has seven interceptions in six home games, but he has not thrown an interception in his past four starts.
