### SMU's 2021 Football Schedule Set



IRVING, Texas (AAC/SMU) -- The American Athletic Conference has released the 2021 SMU Football schedule, a slate that includes games against AAC Champion Cincinnati, Championship game participant Tulsa, and perennial AAC power UCF, as well as in-state rivals Houston and TCU.

The previously announced non-conference schedule includes home games against Abilene Christian (Sept. 4) and North Texas (Sept. 11) to open the season, before the Mustangs hit the road for games at Louisiana Tech (Sept. 18) and TCU (Sept. 25) in the 100th Battle for the Iron Skillet. The 2020 edition of the Iron Skillet was canceled.

SMU opens conference play at home against USF on Oct. 2, while also hosting Tulane (Oct. 21), UCF (Nov. 13) and Tulsa (Nov. 26/27). Both USF and UCF return to the Mustangs' schedule in 2021.

The road slate includes trips to Navy (Oct. 9), Houston (Oct. 30), Memphis (Nov. 6) and Cincinnati (Nov. 20). As part of the conference's former West Division, the Mustangs traveled to Navy, Houston and Memphis in 2019, but it will be the first time SMU travels to Cincinnati since the 2017 season (W, 31-28 OT).

SMU finished 7-3 in 2020 and earned a bid to the Frisco Bowl. The seven wins were the first in back-to-back seasons (10-

3 in 2019) since the 2011-12 seasons, and the bowl bid was the second in three seasons under Head Coach Sonny Dykes. The Mustangs reached No. 16 in both the AP and Coaches Polls during the season and were ranked or receiving votes in at least one poll every week in 2020.



Frisco Roughriders 120-Game Schedule **Starts May 4** 

The Frisco RoughRiders announced

their schedule in full today for the 2021 season, which begins on Tuesday, May 4th at home against the Midland RockHounds.

The opening 12-game homestand includes 6 games against the RockHounds to kick things off and after an off-day on Monday, May 10th, the Riders welcome in the Corpus Christi Hooks for a 6-game series.

While the 2021 season may look and feel a little different, there is some familiarity returning in the form of the RoughRiders continued affiliation as the Texas Rangers' Double-A organization. The other teams in the Double-A Central League's Southern division include the Amarillo Sod Poodles, Corpus Christi Hooks, Midland Rock- Hounds and San Antonio Missions.

The Northern Division will be composed of The Arkansas Travelers, Northwest Arkansas Naturals, Springfield Cardinals, Tulsa Drillers, and Wichita Wind Surge.

The 2021 season offers plenty of chances to see the Riders on the weekend, with 30 of the 60 home dates falling on Friday, Saturday and Sunday including a Fourth of July celebration on July 4th.

While game times are yet to be determined, it is anticipated they will look very similar to those of years past, with 7:05pm starts during the week and 4:05pm on Sundays in May & June. During the Summer months, Sunday games will begin at 6:05pm.

The RoughRiders will play in the Double-A Central League's Southern Division and is scheduled to have every Monday as a scheduled off day during the year to assist in team travel.

# Rangers Spring Training begins



Next week will start the initial full workouts and games begin on the 27th

The Texas Rangers began reporting to their Surprise, Arizona training facility this week. Next week will have the initial full team workout and by the end of next week games will begin. It almost sounds like normal. So, while we locals dig out from a week of sub-zero temperatures and snow covered streets, the boys of summer will be preparing for a real summer of baseball like we haven't seen since the previous

The Rangers are admitting they are in a rebuild and warn fans not to expect a contender. 2023 is the best estimate of when that will happen, but that does not mean this is a lost year. It is actually a very important year of development to get to where the team wants to be two seasons from now. Here is a rundown of the Rangers' outlook on every position.

#### POSITION PLAYERS

There may be as few as two or three position players set to be the lineup at a specific position. Barring injury, fan favorite Joey Gallo, toting his Gold Glove Award for fielding excellence is the right fielder. Shortly after last season ended, the team announced that Isiah Kiner-Falefa will be this year's shortstop. To make sure everyone knew the Rangers meant business when they made this pronouncement, they proceeded to trade incumbent Elvis

Likely, the oft-injured Jose Trevino will be the starting catcher. That is not to say that three positions only have been set, and with a team that had the second worst record in baseball last year, there should not be many players feeling like they are tenured into a position.

The outfield offers the most possibilities. Leody Taveras finished last season as the starting centerfielder. There is no question that he's Major League ready defensively. He is the number four prospect in the Rangers' system and was named to Jim Callis's defensive All-prospect team. Good speed. Plus arm. He gets good reads and quick jumps on fly balls. The best defensive center fielder in the Rangers' system. The hit tool is the question. He hit 227 in 33 games last year, with four home runs and six RBIs. Had last year been a normal year with fully operating minor leagues, Taveras would have never seen the light of day in Arlington. The paradox is with the Pandemic killing the minor leagues last year and the shortened Major League season, Taveras got a look with Texas and showed a lot. He has a real chance to be the Rangers' regular center fielder and is at a point in his career though where he needs to play every day. If he doesn't win the regular center field job in spring training, he goes to the minors to get regular at bats to develop the hit tool he needs to become the All-Star caliber player he projects to be.

If he's not on the opening day roster, he will play in Arlington at some point this

The Rangers added David Dahl this off season, who became a free agent in December when he was non-tendered by the Colorado Rockies. Dahl, who was selected with the tenth pick in the 2012 draft, has hit .286 in four Major League seasons and made the National League All-Star team in 2019. He is considered a very good defensive outfielder. When acquired, it was generally thought that he would be the Rangers' regular left fielder. Clearly, an outfield of Dahl, Taveras and Gallo would be an elite defensive trio. If he takes over in left field, Willie Calhoun would slide into the regular DH spot. Calhoun has improved defensively in left field since Texas acquired him, but he's still considered to be a below average defender. There is also the possibility that Dahl takes over center field pushing Taveras to the minors and creating an opening for a better bat in the lineup. Texas manager Chris Woodward has shown a preference for spreading the DH at-bats out among several players to keep their bats in the lineup and giving rest at the same time. With his defensive role to be sorted out in spring training, Dahl may not have a definite defensive assignment going into spring training, but you can bet the Rangers are not paying him \$2.7 million to sit on the bench.

Two other names have entered the outfield picture in recent weeks. The Rangers traded for Khris Davis and signed free agent and former Davis has been mainly a designated hitter in recent years. He has not been a good hitter the past two seasons, after hitting more than 40 home runs in each of the three prior seasons. If he returns to form, he supplies badly needed power to the Ranger lineup. If he does not show promise of returning to form, he may get released. The Rangers were apparently

willing to make the deal with Oakland to get two quality prospects for the \$2.0 million plus net cost of the money in the trade.

DeShields brings plus speed and had developed into a solid center fielder defensively before the Rangers dealt him to Cleveland in the trade that brought Corey Kluber to Texas. He could fit as the Rangers' regular center fielder or end up as the fourth outfielder. Nick Solack saw action in the outfield last year, though projects to be this year's second baseman. Eli White is also a solid defender that could find a role in this year's outfield. The theme of this year's spring training is competition. With Gallo, Taveras, Dahl, Calhoun, Davis, DeShields and White as the top contenders, there is certainly outfield competition.

The infield has a bit more clarity. Texas is committed to Kiner-Falefa at shortstop. It's a good move, even if it did cost the Rangers one of the team's all-time fan favorites, Elvis Andrus. If the Rangers are pointing to being a true contender in 2023, there are steps the team needs to take to reach that goal. Finding out if Kiner-Falefa is the shortstop for that 2023 team is one of them. There are several free agent shortstops coming available in the next off season. If Kiner-Falefa is not the man, then the Rangers can dip into free agency with a clear conscience.

Brock Holt was signed within the last few days to be the regular third baseman. Texas Tech alum Josh Jung is projected to be the third baseman of the future and likely sees time in Arlington this summer, but he needs more minor league seasoning, and Holt essentially is the bridge between now and the time Jung arrives.

The Rangers seem committed to Nick Solack at second base. Solack was a good contact hitter in 2019 after arriving in a mid-season trade. He fell off some last

season, but despite his offensive regression, the Rangers are ready to move on from Rougned Odor. Odor is owed \$27.667 million from the six year \$49.5 million contract extension he signed in 2017. With the money owed and the offensive falloff in the last two seasons, he has no trade value. He likely fits as a utility player and may even get a look in the outfield. However, Odor seems to play well in spring training, so it is still possible that he re-claims the second base job.

First base is another interesting competition. The Rangers patience with Ronald Guzman wore thin last year. Guzman was limited to just 25 games, hitting .241. He did have better at-bats after starting the year at the Rangers' alternate site, and he was the MVP of the Dominican Winter League. Guzman's one of the best defensive first basemen in Ranger history, and he was clearly missed last year when Todd Frazier manned the position.

However, the Rangers appear ready to move on. They traded for first baseman Nate Lowe this winter. Lowe and Guzman are both left-handed hitters, so a platoon doesn't look likely. Guzman has no options remaining, so must clear waivers to be sent to the minors. It should be a good competition. There is talk of looking at Khris Davis at first base, and Sherten Apostel is on the 40-man roster and saw action at first base last year. Lowe is clearly the front runner, after the Rangers sent two quality prospects to Tampa for Lowe, but there should be solid competition for first base in spring training.

Jose Trevino is the starting catcher. Jonah Heim and veteran Drew Butera are the top two contenders for the backup catching roster spot. Heim is a switch hitter, one of the jewels the Rangers received in the Elvis Andrus trade, while Butera brings a quality veteran presence. Sam Huff saw action last year and certainly showed solid power at the plate, but he needs more seasoning in the minors. However, Huff could easily find his way to Arlington later this summer.

#### **PITCHERS**

The fate of this year's team largely lies with the starting rotation. Last year, the Rangers looked like a solid playoff contender with Mike Minor, Lance Lynn and Corey Kluber heading up the rotation. In the end, Kluber pitched just one inning, while Minor was not very good; and the team finished with the second worst record in baseball.

This season, Woodward has all but officially named Kyle Gibson as the opening day starter. Kohei Arihara and Hyun-jong Yang were signed out of Japan and Korea, respectively. Both pitched more than 100 innings last year in regular seasons that were not shortened in deference to the Coronavirus. They appear to have the inside tract for starting rotation spots. The Rangers also seem high on Mike Foltynewicz for another. That leaves veteran Jordan Lyles, good prospect Dane

Dunning, and minor leaguers that have been knocking on the door the past couple of years – Kyle Cody, Kolby Allard, Taylor Hearn, Joe Palumbo, and Brock Burke - to fill out the rotation.

Woodward promises a lot of creativity in how he uses starters. The team plans to monitor closely the innings load on all their pitchers after last year's short season. A six man rotation is not out of the question. Perhaps piggy backing some of the younger starters with two of them getting three or four innings in games before turning it over to the bullpen. It will be an interesting competition, and it will be the key to this year's success.

The bullpen was actually good last year. Jose Leclerc is back and is the likely closer. Jonathan Hernandez was sensational last year and slots in as the eighth inning setup man if not the closer. Veteran Brett Martin figures to be the top lefty in the pen, while Joely Rodriguez looks to have a roster spot. The Rangers obtained Josh Sborz this week in a trade with the Dodgers, so he likely makes the opening day roster. Texas took Brett de Geus in the Rule 5 draft, so he must be on the roster or offered back to the Dodgers. John King was especially impressive in a short stint with the Rangers last season and would appear to have a good chance at a roster spot. Demarcus Evans is also a strong candidate, but he is not likely to be physically ready by opening day having been shut down from throwing off a mound until mid-March with a lat injury. Also, starting pitcher candidates above that don't make the rotation could end up in the bullpen.

Ultimately, Jon Daniels has been able to put together a good bullpen in the past. This year's pen has some solid pieces in place, and some good arms coming from the minor leagues. On paper, the pen is probably the strongest area of the team.

By next weekend, we will have a look at the team in games. Amazingly while there is snow on the ground in the greater Dallas/Ft. Worth area and record low temperatures, there is baseball to be followed every day for Ranger fans. A touch of normalcy after suffering through a very abnormal 2020 season.

#### **NOTABLE:**

- The Rangers' radio and television announcing teams are essentially the same as last year. Dave Raymond and C. J. Nitkowski will do most of the television games as play-by-play and analyst, respectively. Tom Grieve and David Murphy will also be analysts for some games. Eric Nadel and Matt Hicks are the two main radio voices, though Nadel will miss more games as he eases into retirement.
- Former Ranger Mitch Moreland is rumored to have agreed to a one year deal with Oakland.
- 202 Rangers Derek Dietrich and Nick Goody signed with the Yankees this week.
- Jeff Mathis, a Ranger catcher the past two seasons signed with the Phillies.

# Gear your swing for cold and wet weather

We've been going through some brutally cold weather, of historic porportions, here in Dallas/Ft. Worth recently. Cold air is heavy and creates more resistance to the flight of the golf ball. Cold heavy air naturally encourages golfers to swing harder. Unfortunately, a harder, faster swing can produce more errors in the swing.

Since cold air is heavy, the player should gear their swing to produce a lower trajectory. To accomplish this, the plane swing of the golfer should be in a shallower arc. This will allow the club head to contact the ball on a more horizontal path and will start ball flight in a more forward, rather than upward, path.

The three parts of the body that are the most important to protect against the cold weather are:

- **1. The Hands.** A player cannot swing the club if they can't hold onto it. Warm hands are necessary for feel. There are several types available on he market that are effective.
- **2. Upper body and head.** For your head a golf cap with ear muffs to keep the head and ears warm. A lot of heat escapes through the head. A good rain suit that is waterproof and warm while it's lightweight is a good choice.
- **3. The Feet.** Keep your feet warm and dry while you're playing. Wearing an extra

pair of socks is a good idea too. I think it's a great idea to walk the course instead of taking a cart. Walking will keep your blood flowing and help you stay warmer and looser.

Wet greens can cause a lot of issues for golfers when putting. The ball must be hit more firmly. Many players make the mistake of lengthening their backstroke. This only increases the margin of error. For the best results, increase the speed of the stroke rather than taking a longer backstroke

Colder weather can mean frozen ground which can play havoc on your short game. When the ground on the golf course is firmer due to inclement weather conditions this calls for more of a chip and run or run-up shot. So where you would normally use a wedge, use a 6 or 7 iron to pull off the shot.

Usually in cold weather you'll have stronger winds and it's essential to hit the ball lower if you want to get maximum power and control. To stroke a ball lower than the normal loft of the club, widen your stance and play the ball the ball back and a little father from the body than usual. Keep the face of the club slightly closed. Make sure to establish a sturdy foundation with the stance. Use a more shallow plane swing and keep the club head low on the backswing. On your follow-through try to stay down as long as possible on the shot.

Because of the colder weather make sure to use more club than you would normally use as the ball won't travel as far. If it's too cold for you to play, then I recommend that you just proceed directly to the 19th hole to warm up.

# This week: The Genesis Invitational

The PGA TOUR returns to iconic Riviera Country Club for The Genesis Invitational. Tournament host Tiger Woods will be in attendance but won't play as he is still recovering from a back procedure last month. World No. 1 Dustin Johnson and defending champion Adam Scott are among the headliners.

FIELD NOTES: Notables in the invitation-only field include major champions Brooks Koepka, Bryson DeChambeau, Collin Morikawa, and Francesco Molinari, plus world No. 2 Jon Rahm. ... After deciding not to tee it up at the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am, Dustin Johnson, who won the 2017 Genesis, will be back in action at Riviera. ... Scott hasn't missed a cut this season and finished T10 in his last start at the Farmers Insurance Open... Other past winners at Riviera include J.B. Holmes, James Hahn, Charles Howell III, and Bubba Watson (twice a winner here). ... Tae Hoon Kim won The Genesis Championship in Korea last fall to secure a spot in The Genesis Invitational field for 2021... Two-time FedExCup winner Rory McIlroy looks to finally lift the trophy at Riviera after holding a piece of the lead Sunday a year ago only to fall to T5... The U.S. Amateur champion always gets a spot in The Genesis Invitational, so Tyler Strafaci will tee it up, as will the previous three U.S. Amateur winners: Andy Ogletree, Viktor Hovland, and Doc Redman. (Redman won the 2017 U.S. Amateur at Riviera.) ... In addition to

reigning champ Johnson, FedExCup winners in the field include Justin Thomas, Jordan Spieth, Brandt Snedeker, and Jim Furyk.

**FEDEXCUP:** Winner receives 550 FedExCup points.

**COURSE:** Designed by George C. Thomas Jr. and William P Bell, Riviera Country Club, par 71, 7,322 yards, has been a PGA TOUR staple for 57 years. A three-time major championship host (1948 U.S. Open and 1983/1995 PGA Championships), the club is perennially ranked in the top 100 in the world and is located just a block from Sunset Boulevard. It's a compact design with primary rough consisting of thick Kikuyu grass, a bunker in the middle of a green, and of course the iconic, driveable 10th. **STORYLINES:** Willie Mack III joins the list of Charlie Sifford Memorial Exemption recipients. Two other past Sifford Exemption recipients will be in the field: Harold Varner III and Cameron Champ. Mack III, an 11-time winner at Bethune-Cookman University, made his PGA TOUR debut at Torrey Pines when an exemption intended for Kamaiu Johnson opened up due to Johnson testing positive for COVID-19. The Sifford Exemption has been awarded yearly since 2009, with three recipients (Jeremiah Wooding, Varner III, and Joseph Bramlett) making the cut... There is one spot left in the field reserved for the winner of The Genesis Invitational Collegiate Showcase, Feb. 15. Three past collegiate showcase champions will be in the field for 2021: this year's winner plus Will Zalatoris (2015) and Scottie Scheffler

(2018). ... Anyone who moves into the top 10 of the FedExCup standings (and not otherwise in the field) after The Genesis Invitational will earn a spot in the following week's World Golf Championships at The Concession.

18-HOLE RECORD: 61, George Archer (3rd round, 1983 at Rancho Park GC), Ted Tryba (3rd round, 1999 at Riviera CC). LAST TIME: On a difficult day for the overnight leaders, Scott - whose victory at Riviera 15 years ago was deemed unofficial as rain shortened the tournament to 36 holes – shot a 1-under 70 to top Sung Kang, Scott Brown, and Matt Kuchar by two shots. It was the Australian's 14th TOUR victory and 29th win worldwide. Five players had a share of the lead at some point Sunday, including McIlroy, who shot 2 over to finish T5 alongside Hideki Matsuyama, Bryson DeChambeau, Max Homa, and Joel Dahmen. Tournament host Woods finished 68th, last among those who made the cut.

# Remembering record setting playoff

It remains the largest playoff to end a 72-hole PGA TOUR event, another bit of history created at the iconic Riviera Country Club.

There also was a six-man playoff at the 1994 Byron Nelson but that tournament was just two rounds because of persistent rain. Seven years later, six men braved the elements to decide a champion at Riviera in the tournament now known as the Genesis Invitational.

It rained so hard that a delay never seemed far away. The 18th hole, reachable with short-irons earlier in the week, now required players to use fairway woods for their approach shots. To celebrate the 20th anniversary of this unique finish, PGA-TOUR.COM caught up with some of the participants to hear their recollections.

On the broadcast, Jim Nantz tried to draw a connection to CBS' Sunday night movie, The Mask of Zorro, by declaring "it would take a little swash-buckling birdie here to win this tournament." Riviera's finishing hole had allowed just one all day but then Robert Allenby delivered a shot that one competitor called "the greatest shot I've ever seen."

Allenby choked down on a 3-wood and hit it to 5 feet to walk away with the title. It was his third TOUR win – all of them came in playoffs – and moved him to 7-0 in playoffs worldwide. Brandel Chamblee, Dennis Paulson, Jeff Sluman, Bob Tway

and Toshi Izawa were the other participants.

The playoff was brief, but the unique ending and miserable conditions were fodder for some entertaining stories. PGA-TOUR.COM caught up with some of the participants, and recently-retired rules official Mark Russell, to hear their recollections. Read below about the ball hit into a hot dog stand, Chamblee's wardrobe malfunction (and how he forgot one of the playoff's participants when working for Golf Channel later that year) and the award that Tiger Woods robbed from Allenby later that year.

CHAMBLEE: "I had a deal with a clothing company where if I finished in the top three, I got a \$75,000 bonus, something like that. I had their rain suit on as I played the first hole and I could hardly swing. I had it on as I was coming up the second hole and I said to my caddie, 'Can you run up to the clubhouse and get my other rain suit. I can't swing in this thing.' So he ran up and got my other rain suit, which did not have the company's logo on it. I was six back going into Sunday. I didn't really think about it. I put the new rain suit on and I was warm and I played great. I shot 67, which was the (second-lowest) round of the day (behind Izawa's 66). And I didn't even think about the implications of not having the right rain suit on.

"Later on, as soon as I got in, there was kind of a nasty note from the company saying, 'We're not paying you the bonus because you didn't have on our rain suit.' That was the first note I saw. They were quite obviously upset. I called them and I said, 'I totally get it. You did not get the advertisement you paid for. But if I had worn your rain suit, I wouldn't have been in that playoff."

SLUMAN: "Somebody in the group ahead of me hit it in the hot dog stand and it took at least 10 minutes to get a ruling. It wasn't the most opportune timing.

[Laughs] There was a big slope to the right of the green, with a hot dog stand with nachos and all that stuff. It was Tiger's group, I don't know who it was who needed the ruling, but it was easy, with the ball being wet and everything, to hit one out there. It was like Animal House hitting the ball into the cafeteria; you wonder if someone got a hot dog with a golf ball on it. It was really a bad place to put a hot dog stand."

ALLENBY: "I missed around a 10-footer for a par that would have won the tournament. My attitude in playoffs was always positive. I always treated it as a second chance and didn't dwell on the negatives of the fact I hadn't won in regulation."

RUSSELL: "I'm thinking the whole time, these greens could go down any moment (continued on page 9)





and we can't finish. We kept playing. We're trying to get done and it turns into a sixman playoff. Worst-case scenario! I'm amazed we got it in to tell you the truth. The next playoff hole was 10 and I'd already received the call that the 10th hole was unplayable."

PAULSON: "It was so cold that I dressed to wear rain pants all day. I had a great pair of rain pants. They had pockets and everything else. They had belt loops. They were basically a pair of Gore-Tex pants. I knew it was going to be cold so I wore Long Johns under those pants. Whether it rained or not, I was going to wear those all day long."

**SLUMAN:** "It was like the Sunday scramble at the club going back out there. Each player gets in a cart driven by someone; everybody got a cart, caddies on the back getting driven out, plus an official to pick straws or numbers, and you're off and away."

PAULSON: "When we got done, I had to go to the bathroom really bad because it had been raining all day. I told the guys, 'I'll get out there but I have to use the restroom.' Instead of one minute, it took three because you have all your rain gear on. I get on a cart and arrive at the tee and they say, 'Dennis, you're hitting (fourth). Good luck.' I wasn't even part of the draw to determine what order we hit. No one shook my hand. It wasn't unfriendly, but it was raining and everyone was huddled under their umbrellas."

**ALLENBY:** "That shot was probably the greatest 3-wood I ever hit in my life. It is the greatest. And I still have the club. It's up in my house and I have the original grip on it and everything, it's such a little beauty.

"I remember Fred Couples and myself seemed to be the last two to have it in play before we finally gave it up. Every tournament we would go to we would both find each other on the range and check to see if the other still had it in play. Then finally one tournament he came along and he saw that I had switched it out and I was like, 'Oh man it's just too small, I just switched it out.' Then he starts laughing and says, 'I did the same thing.' So we both hung on for ages but had to let it go. It was a dinosaur by then."

PAULSON: "Robert's is still the best shot I've seen in my life. It was just flush out of the middle of the club. It started three yards right of the hole and turned over three yards. It was a laser right at the flag. I remember that shot more than any shot I saw on the PGA TOUR, or hit. It was that special."

RUSSELL: "We're walking up to the green and I'm thinking, 'I hope we can keep going.' Then I see a ball about 4 feet from the hole and I'm thinking, 'Damn, who hit that shot?' I had been over in the left rough, helping Toshi with a drop. Thank goodness someone birdied it." **CHAMBLEE:** "I had never heard of or seen Toshi Izawa before (This was just Izawa's fourth TOUR start in the States). He hooked it up on the hill and with all the people and caddies and cameras I never really saw him again in the playoff. Later on that year, I was asked to come in and work for Golf Channel during the Masters. Tiger was going for his fourth major in a row and all that. Toshi was either leading or close to the lead after round one and I asked one of my coworkers who he was and they laughed and said, 'Yeah right,' and I said, 'No really, who is it?' They

said, 'You really don't know?' and I said, 'No, I've never heard of him.' 'He was in the six-man playoff with you at Riviera,'

they said incredulously. And I said, 'Well, it was so chaotic with six players, their caddies, TOUR officials, cameras and media and so many people running around, you could've been in that playoff with me and I might never of known it.'"

**ALLENBY:** "It's up there but here's what's funny: I hit that shot and then later in the year Tiger Woods had the 'Better Than Most' putt at TPC Sawgrass on the 17th green in the PLAYERS Championship and that ended up being voted the shot of the year. But I remember (former PGA TOUR Commissioner) Tim Finchem saying to me that he thought my shot in L.A. was the best shot of the year. He also remembered that at TPC that same year, he saw me make a putt from off the wood of the walkway on the 17th green that was about an hour ahead of Tiger and from farther away. But hey, Tiger Woods got all the accolades because at the end of the day, he's Tiger Woods.

"I came back (to Riviera) the next year as defending champion and my picture is on the wall behind the staff at registration with me holding the trophy. I walk in and sat down and the three ladies looked at me and asked, "OK, who are you?" I said, "I'm the guy behind you on the wall". They all turned around and looked and were like, 'Oh no. Sorry. I remember having a good giggle about that."

# College baseball 2021 season preview



#1 Florida is the clear cut favorite to win the SEC

#### Preseason rankings, key dates, players to know and more

Let's have a look at the season to come, which, unlike last year's edition, should crown a national champion

#### By Dayn Perry

Last year, the NCAA awarded no Division I national championship in baseball for the first time since the title was forged back in 1947. That's of course because of the still ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, which caused college baseball to shut down in March and cancel all spring and winter championships. That, among other things, meant no 2020 College World Series.

Given that the pandemic is ongoing, nothing is to be assumed with regard to the 2021 college baseball season. However, as things stand now -- and as more and more people get vaccinated -- the intention is to crown a champion at the College World Series in Omaha, Nebraska which gets underway on June 19. Here's hoping.

Powered by such optimistic assumptions regarding college baseball in 2021, we're here to preview the season that begins very soon. We'll commence doing just that following the conclusion of this unnecessary sentence.

#### Composite 2021 preseason rankings

To get started, let's take a look at some composite rankings. What we've done is taken each of the six major preseason polls (Baseball America, Perfect Game, USA Today coaches' poll, D1Baseball.com,

Collegiate Baseball, and the National Collegiate Baseball Writers' Association) and assigned "poll points" to each team ranked in the top 25 of each poll. No. 1-ranked teams get 25 points, No. 2-ranked teams get 24 points, all the way down to the No. 25-ranked teams, which get one point. So we add all the points up -- across, again, all six major polls -- and arrive at our composite preseason rankings.

#### Here's a look at what comes out of the wash for 2021

So Florida topped all six polls, which accounts for their maxed-out total of 150 poll points. That's not surprising given that the Gators return almost every core contributor from last year's squad and complement that core with a top-tier recruiting class. Vanderbilt, who won the last national championship in 2019, checks in at fourth. The most recent College World Series runner-up, Michigan, is tied for 23rd and the only Big Ten team in the top 25 composite rankings. The last "Cinderella" to win it all -- depending upon how you define the somewhat imprecise term -- was Coastal Carolina in 2016, and if the preseason polls are any guide then UC-Santa Barbara would seem to have the best shot of becoming the next.

#### Conference rankings

Let's widen our scope a bit and cobble together some preseason conference rankings by adding up all the poll points conference by conference (we'll also include the "others receiving poll points" teams in our tabulations).

#### The digits:

Not surprisingly, the SEC lords over all it surveys. Down yonder the conference boasts five of the top 10 teams in the composite rankings, and overall 11 of the conference's 14 teams received poll points (!).

That's fully in keeping with recent history, as the SEC has claimed six of the last 11 national championships. The conference tied a record by placing four teams in the 2019 College World Series, and multiple SEC teams have made the eight-team College World Series in each of the last three seasons (2020 excepted, obviously).

As is typically the case, you see a significant drop-off in conference depth after the big four (SEC, ACC, Big 12, and Pac-10). In terms of building programs, baseball is a tough sport for cold-weather conferences, which explains why the Big Ten, unlike in football and basketball, isn't among the giants and hasn't been for a very long time. The conference has enjoyed a bit of a resurgence in recent years, which is largely explained by increased investment in the sport.

At the conference level, though, the headline remains the ongoing dominance of the SEC.

#### **Key dates**

How's about a brief walking tour of the college baseball calendar for 2021? How's about indeed.

**February 19-21:** Opening weekend for Division I is highlighted by the 2021 State Farm College Baseball Showdown at Globe Life Field, home of the Texas Rangers. The showdown will feature No. 3 Texas Tech, No. 5 Ole Miss, No. 7 Mississippi State, No. 12 Arkansas, No. 13 Texas, and No. 15 TCU.

May 25-30: The SEC Tournament goes down in Hoover, Ala. The ACC Tournament also covers these dates.

**May 26-30:** The Big 12 Tournament takes place in Oklahoma City.

May 31: It's Memorial Day and also Selection Monday, as the NCAA Tournament field of 64 is announced. June 19: The College World Series in Omaha begins.

**July 11-13:** The 2021 MLB Draft takes place.

#### How the NCAA Tournament and College World Series work

Given that college baseball isn't as widely followed as the football and basketball collegiate variants, perhaps a brief postseason explainer is in order. Here's how it all works, in bullet-point format for today's harried sales professional ...

- The first round of play is known as the regional, and it's a round-robin, double-elimination format featuring four teams. Each of the 16 one-seeds hosts its respective regional, when possible. Only one team out of four survives each regional.
- The winner of each regional advances to the super regional, which a best-of-three series between two regional winnes.

- The winner of each super regional -- eight teams in all -- advances to the College World Series in Omaha.
- The College World Series is a doubleelimination format until the final two teams are left standing. At that point, the slates are wiped clean, and it's a best-of-three series to determine the national champion. - The field of 64 also includes eight national national seeds, which you may consider the pre-tourney favorites to reach Omaha. National seeds get to host super regionals should they advance that far.

So, yes, it's quite different from the more familiar March Madness format, but it typically entails similar levels of, you know, madness.

#### Players to watch

Top draft-eligible D1 collegians -- i.e., juniors, seniors, or sophomores who will turn 21 before the draft -- include Vanderbilt right-handers Kumar Rocker and Jack Leiter, UCLA shortstop Matt McLain, Miami-FL catcher Adrian Del Castillo, Florida outfielder Jud Fabian, LSU right-hander Jaden Hill, Louisville third baseman Alex Binelas, Texas righthander Ty Madden, Sam Houston outfielder Colton Cowser, Wake Forest shortstop Kahlil Watson, and Kansas State lefty Jordan Wicks. That's of course a partial listing, as the season to come could drastically change draft stock up and down the board.

#### A bit of history

In conclusion, let's run down all the past college baseball national champions and runners-up. Soon enough, we'll be adding another champ to this list (one hopes, anyway). In the meantime, enjoy the presumed baseball!

# SMU Men's Basketball in disarray

UNIVERSITY PARK, Texas - The SMU basketball season is in disarray with more postponements this week due to weather related problems in the Dallas/Ft. Worth area and COVID-19.

The Ponies have had four games postponed since they last played on February 8. This week's scheduled games against Wichita State last Sunday and Tulane were postponed, both for the second time. This Saturday's game against South Florida and next Tuesday's game against Central Florida have also been postponed because of Coronavirus situations on the SMU team. A make-up game of an earlier postponement is still on the schedule this Thursday at Wichita State, but there is no certainty that it will be played. The Mustangs are also scheduled to play Wichita State at home this Sunday.

Head Coach Tim Jankovich is back with the team. He has not coached a game since January 11 with postponements and his bout with the Coronavirus. At this point, the team is likely to be rusty having not played since February 8 plus they are short handed at practice.

The Mustangs are currently 11-4 on the season which includes a 7-4 American Athletic Conference record. That puts them fourth in conference play behind 8-3 Memphis, 11-3 Houston, and 9-2 Wichita State. Cincinnati is tied with SMU in the loss column with four losses but has played two fewer games. It is unlikely that the

Mustangs will be able to play all 20 conference games. SMU has met the NCAA required minimum of 13 games to qualify for the NCAA Tournament.

However, the Mustangs chances for an NCAA bid are slim. Winning the Conference post season tournament would earn the AAC's automatic bid, but chances for an at large bid are not good. One problem is the conference. It is just not very good this year. Houston has consistently been ranked in the top 10, but no other AAC team has been ranked in weeks. Wichita State received one vote in this week's AP poll, and that is the only team besides Houston to even receive a vote in the past three weeks. Central Florida beat then number 16 Florida State on December 19. That's the only non-conference win for the AAC over a ranked team this season! ESPN bracketologist Joe Lunardi currently has the AAC projected to be a one bid con-

Some of the mathematical rankings of SMU offer hope. The Sagarin ratings rank SMU 48th. Even Lunardi's projection earlier this week has SMU among the "next four out" after the "first four out". Interesting that he would put SMU ahead of Wichita State and Memphis, which lead the Mustangs in the conference standings.

The Mustangs only good win in nonconference play was against Dayton. That is another problem for the Mustangs. They lost both games to Houston this season. Wichita State may be their only chance for another good win.

The NCAA is requiring teams invited to

the tournament to have team's travelling parties to have seven consecutive days of negative COVID-19 testing prior to arriving in Indiana. This leads to some interesting ramifications. Gonzaga and Baylor have been the two leading teams in the nation for the most of this season. Such a team that is a shoo-in record-wise might not receive an invite if several players are diagnosed with the virus as the Tournament approaches. One thought is for such shooin teams to avoid their conference tournaments to lessen the chances of a COVID-19 outbreak. In the case of Gonzaga, that could mean a West Coast Conference team could win the conference tournament and claim a bid it would other-wise not qualify for, effectively taking a bid away from another more deserving team. This could happen in the AAC if Houston elects to avoid the conference tournament.

Clearly, the conference has suffered from good coaches moving on. Temple and Cincinnati are down after losing Fran Duffy and Mick Cronin. Connecticut is a traditional basketball power and the only AAC to win a national championship, and they have moved out of the conference altogether.

If Lunardi is wrong and the AAC gets a second NCAA bid, it is really a four team fight for second place. Time is short though, there are just two more weeks in the regular season. SMU probably needs to win all four remaining games on the schedule and hope the chips fall their way. Those four are two with Wichita State, on the road at Cincinnati and at home against Tulsa. Perhaps a previously postponed game or two will get squeezed in. FOOTBALL:

SMU announced their 2021 football schedule this week. The non-conference schedule is disappointing after two seasons of being ranked in the Top 25 at some


point. TCU, in Ft. Worth, is the only 'name" non-conference opponent. Louisiana Tech has been a little known good team in recent years, and the Mustangs also face them on the road. Abilene Christian and North Texas are the two home non-conference games.

The conference schedule is tough. Cincinnati and Memphis have won the last two conference championships and the Mustangs face both on the road. Houston looks to be a team on the rise, and SMU plays them on the road, as well as Navy, which is always a difficult win in Annapolis. The home games feature Central Florida with new coach Gus Malzahn, South Florida, Tulane, and Tulsa. The Tulane game is scheduled for October 21, a Thursday night national telecast.

The conference, with just 11 teams, is still allowed a conference championship game this season, which is scheduled for December 4.

#### **NOTABLE:**


- The NCAA is expecting to be allowed to sell tickets to tournament games at 25% of capacity, which is the figure government authorities have allowed for the NBA's Indiana Pacers. Travelling parties for teams including players, coaches, trainers and school officials are limited to 34, and each member of the travelling party will be allocated six tickets to games their teams
- In college basketball home teams are winning fewer games this season. Traditionally, home teams win about 65% of their games. This year, it is down to around 56%. One factor in the decline is surely the reduced crowds because of COVID-19 protocols. In the Sagarin ratings, the home court advantage has traditionally been close to three points per game but is down to 2.10 points this season.



# College Football News and Notes

The NFF and College Football Hall of Fame in partnership with state high coaches associations from nine states, with Nebraska and Texas leading the initial effort, are creating the NFF National High School Academic Excellence Award, the first nationwide recognition honoring individual high school football teams for excellence in the classroom.

"Academic and athletic success go hand-in-hand, and we are proud to partner with the high school coaches associations on this award" said NFF Chairman Archie Manning. "By honoring team achievement in the classroom, we hope to provide high school coaches nationwide a powerful new tool for instilling a culture on their teams that recognizes the chance of winning on the field significantly increases when student-athletes also excel in the classroom. We hope by inspiring teams to compete in the classroom with the same competitive spirit that it takes to win on the field we will better prepare high school football

players for success later in life."

Launching in the fall for the 2021 season, the award currently has nine high school coaches associations from Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Indiana, Louisiana, Nebraska, Oregon, Mississippi, and Texas partnering with the NFF, and the expectation is for coaches associations from the rest of the country to also participate. The initiative will recognize team winners from each state as well as one overall national winner.

The NFF College Hall of Fame will be featuring dozens of exhibits and special seminars in honor of Black History Month in February and how Black student-athletes, coaches and administrators have had positive effects on college football since the first intercollegiate game between Princeton and Rutgers in 1869.

Currently at the Hall of Fame in Atlanta, a new specially curated exhibit opened, remaining on display through May 2021. The Blood, Sweat and Tears exhibit tells the story of integration in college football and dives into the journey of African American trailblazers that changed the landscape of the sport.

Further, more episodes of the Hall's Not Your Average Hero web series can be found on YouTube featuring interviews with other college football pioneers including Kentucky's Nate Northington (Feb. 1), Mississippi's James Reed (Feb. 8), Kentucky's Wilbur Hackett (Feb. 15), Florida A&M's Albert Chester (Feb. 18), and College Football Hall of Fame inductee and Michigan State's Gene Washington (Feb. 22). All episodes will air live initially at noon (EST) and will be archived for additional viewing on

YouTube and the NFF website.

African-Americans in the College Football Hall of Fame currently number 231 players and 13 coaches, and many of them used their exceptional skills to help integrate the game.

NCAA Division I football spring-style began last Saturday as McNeese State of the Southland Conference played a frostbite encounter at current independent Tarleton State (becoming a football playing member of the Western Athletic Conference in August). McNeese State was paced in a 40-37 double overtime win (shades of a great FCS season ahead) by QB Cody Orgeron, the son of LSU head coach Ed Orgeron. Cody Orgeron was 14of-34 passing for 170 yards and three TDs and rushed 19 times for 108 yards and two TDs, including the game winner from 19 yards out in the second OT. Tarleton State head coach Todd Whitten quipped before the game that it was the first time in his coaching career that preseason practice was interrupted by an eight-inch snowstorm in January. It was also the debut at MSU of former UTSA head coach Frank Wilson. whose team had most of its stadium and other facilities in Lake Charles, La., damaged heavily by a hurricane last year. Most of the FCS squads will start the spring regulation Saturday on the road to the NCAA Division I Football Championship May 16 in Frisco, Texas, at Toyota Stadium.

Fan Controlled Football, with national television and internet partner Twitch, play its inaugural games on Feb. 13. In a great multi-tasking feat, former Houston head coach and Arkansas Razorback playing standout John Jenkins is coaching all four teams. Fans get the opportunity to select



# The seven passenger Dodge Durango

In the Dodge Durango SUV, you'll find room for seven passengers, a phalanx of high-tech infotainment and driver assists, and a set of engine options no Subaru, Honda or Toyota can match. As midsize SUVs go, the Durango is the most American of the set, offering aggressive styling and muscle-car-like performance with admirable abilities like an 8,600-pound max tow rating and 8.1 inches of ground clearance.

Unlike the Subaru Ascent and Toyota Highlander, the Durango's advanced driver assists are optional, not standard, although some buyers might appreciate the ability to decide for themselves if they want these features. And while the Durango's design is getting up there in years, it still offers all the things families look for in an SUV, like comfort, style and safety. Just don't look for stellar resale value.

#### **Driving the Dodge Durango**

Although the V8 engines in the Durango are arguably more newsworthy, the entry-level-yet-refined V6 works well, delivering 293 horsepower and is capable of towing 6,400 pounds. It's complemented by an 8-speed automatic transmission that only occasionally "hunts" for the right gear.

On the other hand, these V8 engines do distinguish the Durango. The 5.7-liter unit generates 360 horsepower, for superb acceleration with a resonant rumble and a tow rating of 7,400 pounds. The 6.4-liter in the SRT trim develops 475 horsepower, good enough to sprint from standstill to 60 mph in a fleeting 4.4 seconds or tow 8,600 pounds. Ease off the throttle, though, and every version of the Durango can be quiet and comfortable.

#### **DURANGO SRT**

While not as practical as one of the V6

models, the 6-passenger SRT version is still accommodating of people and cargo, but its crazy fast acceleration times, sharp handling and glorious-sounding exhaust note know no equal from Honda, Nissan or Toyota.

#### **UCONNECT 4**

Still one of the most complete and easy-to-use infotainment systems around, the Dodge Durango's Uconnect 4 system features a large touch screen, easy-to-figure-out controls and is Apple CarPlay and Android Auto compatible. Controls for the heated seats and steering wheel, as well as optional navigation and climate are also incorporated into the touch screen.

#### **Dodge Durango Interior**

It's a pleasant place inside the Durango 7-passenger crossover SUV, with an air about it that seems higher in quality than most rivals, the deluxe Citadel trim in particular. This is the version with heated /ventilated front seats and heated 2nd-row seats

Most trim levels offer captain's chairs to replace the bench in the second row, which also make it easier to access the third row and use booster seats. Cargo space when all three rows are in place is useful at 17 cubic feet, expanding to 43.3 and then 85.1. The front-passenger seat also folds down, so the Durango can take quite long items. Citadel and SRT versions may also be specified with headliners of simulated suede.

#### **Dodge Durango Exterior**

Beginning with the most basic Durango SXT, the look is bold, decisive and certainly not easily mistaken for any other midsize SUV. Move up the line to the GT and the look gets a bit meaner, the Citadel more upscale and the R/T looks like a Charger on steroids, offering an SRT-style hood with a large air scoop. Step into an SRT, and you'll have an American-made

SUV that can run with the likes of BMW, Porsche and Audi, at least on the track. Dodge never shies away from making bold statements and we appreciate the numerous statements made by the Durango, from its "racetrack"- shaped taillight, to the massive wheel-and-tire combos, to the bold paint colors and graphic decals. The Durango really is one of a kind.

#### **Dodge Durango Standard Features**

The SXT entry-level trim has seating for five, tri-zone automatic climate control, 18-inch alloy wheels, V6 engine (with a Sport mode to spice up the driving experience), load-leveling rear shock absorbers, heated side mirrors, keyless entry/ignition, and an infotainment system that includes AM/FM radio, Bluetooth, auxiliary audio input, six speakers and a 7-inch touch screen.

Moving up the Durango's trim levels brings more equipment, such as auto high beams, a power tailgate, sunroof, navigation, Nappa leather seats, and more. Versions with V8 engines receive beefier brakes, while the SRT also has a sporttuned adaptive suspension.

#### **Dodge Durango Options**

Some options are available in the base Durango SXT for, such as a sunroof, allwheel drive with low-range gearing, roof rails, cosmetic additions, 20-inch alloy wheels, satellite radio, trailer-prep package, and rear parking sensors.

But the higher trims are eligible for more extras, including an 825-watt/19-speaker Harman Kardon audio system, 8.4-inch infotainment system with navigation, Blu-ray/DVD rear-seat entertainment system, adaptive cruise control, forward-collision mitigation, and lane-keeping assistance. Blind-spot monitoring with rear cross-traffic alert is optional throughout the range. For towing, choose the 220-amp alternator, heavy-duty engine oil cooler and Class IV hitch receiver.

#### **Dodge Durango Engine**

While many newer midsize SUVs have moved to turbocharged 4-cylinder engines as the base offering, the Dodge Durango starts off with the powerful Pentastar 3.6-liter V6. This engine provides excellent response, can tow up to 6,400 pounds and returns the best fuel economy of the three choices.

Up next is one of two Hemi V8s. Standard in the R/T and available on Citadel, the 5.7-liter V8 produces a classleading 360 horsepower and is the ideal choice for those needing power and performance without breaking the bank. Last up is the massive 6.4-liter Hemi V8 offered only in the all-wheel-drive SRT. With 475 horsepower on hand, this engine makes the Durango one of the most powerful SUVs in its class.

All but the SRT Durango are powered by their rear wheels (RWD) with the option of three different all-wheel-drive (AWD) systems. V8 models with AWD also feature a low-range transfer case with a neutral position. An 8-speed automatic transmission handles gear changes for all three engines.

The Dodge Durango range kicks off with a Manufacturer's Suggested Retail Price (MSRP) of \$30,495, plus a destination charge of \$1,495, making a total of \$31,990 for a rear-drive SXT. An all-wheel drive SXT starts at \$34,590. Next are the GT from \$36,140; Citadel from \$44,490; R/T from \$45,490, and the hot-rodded SRT from \$64,490.

It's easy to spend money on options, but a V8-powered Durango can still be obtained in the low-\$50,000 range. Decide against the V8 extravagance, though, and the Durango V6 is in the same pricing ballpark as the Honda Pilot and Ford Explorer. Check out the Fair Purchase Price on KBB.com to learn what buyers in your area are paying for their new Durango SUV.

From a resale-value perspective, the Durango won't perform as well as a Honda Pilot or Toyota Highlander, is on par with the Ford Explorer, and, over time, slightly better than the Chevrolet Traverse.
