



Big 12 to continue with fall sports



BIG 12 CONFERENCE

IRVING, Texas - The Big 12 Board of Directors agreed to proceed with plans for the fall sports' seasons.

"The Board continues to believe that the health and well-being of our student-athletes must guide all decisions" commented Board of Directors Chairman and TCU Chancellor Victor Boschini.

"To that end the Board has consistently relied on the advice and counsel of top medical experts to determine the viability of available options. Our student-athletes want to compete, and it is the Board's collective opinion that sports can be conducted safely and in concert with the best interests of their well-being. We remain vigilant in monitoring the trends and effects of COVID 19 as we learn more about it. If at any point our scientists and doctors conclude that our institutions cannot provide a safe and appropriate environment for our participants, we will change course."

Big 12 members have committed to enhanced COVID-19 testing that includes three tests per week in "high contact" sports, like Football, Volleyball and Soccer. Additionally, return to play protocols after positive occurrences will include an EKG, troponin blood test, echocardiogram, and cardiac MRI. Non-conference football opponents must also adhere to COVID-19 testing protocols that conform to Big 12 standards during the week leading up to competition.

"The virus continues to evolve and med-

ical professionals are learning more with each passing week," said Commissioner Bob Bowlsby. "Opinions vary regarding the best path forward, as we've seen throughout higher education and our society overall, but we are comfortable in our institutions' ability to provide a structured training environment, rigorous testing and surveillance, hospital quality sanitation and mitigation practices that optimize the health and safety of our student-athletes. We believe all of this combines to create an ideal learning and training situation during this time of COVID-19. Ultimately, our student-athletes have indicated their desire to compete in the sports they love this season and it is up to all of us to deliver a safe, medically sound, and structured academic and athletic environment for accomplishing that outcome."

In moving forward with planning the Conference is also releasing its revised 2020 conference football schedule. The "9+1" scheduling model features a Sept 26 start date for Conference play. Each team will have a minimum of two bye dates and potentially a third bye late in the season. The Dr Pepper Big 12 Championship Game is tentatively scheduled for Dec.12. All non-conference games must be completed before Sept. 26 and the match-ups will be announced by each individual conference member. Stadium capacities will be determined by each member institution in accordance with local and/or state health ordinances, and with government officials.

All Big 12 sports' competitions will commence after September 1. To ensure consistent health and safety protocols, Volleyball and Soccer matches will be limited to conference opponents only.



Rangers finish week three on a good note



Rougned Odor went 0-4 in Tuesday's game to bring his batting average down to .116

ARLINGTON, Texas – The Texas Rangers finished their second home stand and third week of the season on a good note. They won two games in their threegame series with the Seattle Mariners to finish with a 5-1 home stand.

Monday night, the series didn't start well. Ranger starter Kyle Gibson didn't last five innings and was hit hard. He gave up four runs on nine hits. The Mariners continued their onslaught scoring at least one run on each of the first three relievers in the game. The final carnage was 10 runs on 15 hits for Seattle. Willie Calhoun drove in a run in the first inning with a triple, and another run in the third inning on a sacrifice fly. That was all the scoring in the game for Texas....the final was 10-2.

Mike Minor struggled in his first three starts. He came into Tuesday's start with an 0-3 record and a 6.89 ERA. His velocity has been noticeably down from last season. The Rangers debated skipping his turn in the rotation, but finally decided to start him Tuesday, but limit his pitch count to around 75.

Tuesday's results were much better. He threw four scoreless innings on 76 pitches giving up just one hit. He did walk three

batters but struck out four. Minor had to plead his case to stay in the game after three innings, and he unsuccessfully pleaded again for the fifth inning. Minor was not pleased to come out of the game, he wanted to continue his success on the mound, not to mention qualify for the win.

"I felt better," he said after the game. "I wasn't happy with Woody (Ranger manager Chris Woodward) not letting me go out there for the fifth. I felt like I made some better pitches. We stuck with the fast ball more so than usual. (It) was something to build off of."

The Rangers supported Minor with two first inning runs and two more in the third inning. Nick Solak singled with the bases loaded to plate the first two runs, and Solak singled home another run in the third. Willie Calhoun followed Solak's hit with another run scoring single.

Nick Goody followed Minor to the mound in the fifth inning and was immediately in trouble. A walk and two singles put the Mariners on the scoreboard. A fielding error later in the inning allowed a second run to score, which was unearned.

Edinson Volquez came on to snuff out the Mariners' fifth inning rally. He was credited with the win. Joely Rodriguez, Jonathan Hernandez and Rafael Montero shut out the M's over the final four innings to secure the 4-2 win. Montero earned his third save in as many tries. (Per the scoring rules, the pitcher following Minor to the mound would qualify for the win. However, official scorers are given some latitude in deciding the winning pitcher when the pitcher that is otherwise the pitcher of record makes a "short, ineffective appearance" as Goody did Tuesday.

The OS awarded the win to Volquez. Volquez was placed on the 45-day Injured List on Thursday with a "right oblique strain." It's very possible that Tuesday's appearance will be Volquez's final one in the Major Leagues.)

The Rangers signed Derek Dietrich, a veteran infielder that has played for four teams before signing with Texas. He started at second base in Wednesday's series finale and made quite an impression. Dietrich reached base all four times at bat by getting hit by a pitch and stroking three hits. The third hit sparked an eighth inning, five run rally that overcame a 4-2 Mariners' lead.

Jordan Lyles was the Ranger starting pitcher, giving up all four Mariners runs in the second inning. He completed five innings, allowing six hits, walking four, and striking out four.

Jonathan Hernandez pitched the scoreless eighth inning to qualify for the win. He's 3-0.

Rafael Montero was again rock solid in the closer's role. He put the Mariners down in order in the ninth inning to record his fourth save, all on this home stand. The final score was 7-4.

The move to insert Dietrich into the lineup at second base is indicative of the Rangers' growing impatience with Rougned Odor. He went 0-4 in Tuesday's game to bring his batting average down to .116. There were six base runners on base over those four at-bats. Woodward has backed Odor as the questions about his status has grown and contends that Odor is putting in the effort to turn around his offensive season. However, has indicated that at some point, there must be positive results

Clearly, Odor has gotten more chances than he probably deserved largely because of the six-year, \$49.5 million contract he signed after the 2016 season. The Rangers

look to be getting near the point of writing off the investment and going a different direction this season since they have a reasonable chance to make the playoffs. Odor is owed about \$27.6 million after this year.

The season looked to be on the brink of disaster last Friday when the Rangers returned from a 1-5 road trip to San Francisco and Oakland. This 5-1 home stand has pushed the Rangers solidly back into playoff contention.

One positive is that the A. L. West is not very good this year. The Athletics put together a nine-game winning streak and goes into the weekend having won 10 of their last 12 games. They are the clear leader of the pack, the only team in the West above .500. Houston and Los Angeles have significant pitching problems. The young Mariners have some talent, but really won't be a playoff contender. It's basically the Rangers, Angels and Astros fighting over second place and a playoff berth in the division.

The Rangers travel to Denver this weekend for three games against the Rockies. Lance Lynn (2-0), Kyle Gibson (0-2), and Kolby Allard (0-0) will be the starting pitchers for Texas.

RANGER NOTES:

- The start time of several Ranger home games against West Coast teams has been changed from 8:05 PM to the usual 7:05 PM (Both times CDT). The dates are August 24-26 against Oakland, August 28 verses L. A. Dodgers, September 8 & 9 against the Los Angeles Angels, and September 11 verses Oakland.
- Nick Solak appears to be the regular centerfielder with Danny Santana on the injured list. He has started in center field for the last seven games, and his average is up to .281. Santana is close to returning from the Injured List, but he likely won't be back in center field until his throwing arm is back to full strength.

Billy Bob's Texas set to re-open

Located in the historic Fort Worth Stockyard district the iconic Billy Bob's Texas for nearly the past 40 years has hosted the biggest stars in country music and classic rock from entertainers like Garth Brooks, George Strait, Alabama to ZZ Top, Styx and the Beach Boys. The legendary venue has been named "Country Music Club of the Year" 12 times by the Academy of Country Music and the Country Music Association.

Billy Bob's Texas opened April 1, 1981 gaining national attention by featuring a massive 100,000 square foot entertainment center, more than 30 bar stations, country music's biggest stars, real Pro Bull Riding, and a Texas size dance floor. It became known as "The World's Largest Honky Tonk", where more than 6,000 fun loving folks of all ages could enjoy entertainment every day and night.

Billy Bob's Texas re-opened for day time admission this past Thursday, August 13. Billy Bob's Texas has taken a voluntary commitment to re-open Fort Worth responsibly by following best practices in preventing the spread of COVID-19. The commitment created by Visit Fort Worth in partnership with the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce, Fort Worth Metropolitan Black Chamber of Commerce, Fort Worth Hispanic Chamber of Commerce and the City of Fort Worth encourages restaurants, hotels, cultural institutions and businesses of any kind to take preventive steps to help stop the spread of the disease to the best of their ability. These steps reflect guidelines set forth by Governor Greg Abbott and the City of Fort Worth Committee on Re-Opening.

I reached out to my old friend Marty Travis after hearing the news about Billy Bob's re-opening. Travis has had a long association with the club starting back in 1995. He has played an integral role at Billy Bob's where he began his career there as a manager and now is the general manager who goes by the moniker 'Ambassador of Fun."

Marty was gracious enough to fill me in on the details as the club moves forward dealing with the pandemic is a responsible way to ensure safety to both his employees and guests.

TW: With bars closed down because of the covid-19 virus I understand Billy Bob's has received designation as a restaurant now. Tell me how that happened?

MT: At this time bars cannot open. We just changed our permit with the TABC (Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission). They offered us a different kind of permit that allowed us to open up as a restaurant. We have a restaurant and a full kitchen staff and structure. The difference with us is our restaurant has a dance floor and a retail store, pool tables and a concert hall. We are just happy to be open again and our partners at TABC have worked with us to help us get to this point. The TABC needed the tax revenue and we all need people working.

TW: Billy Bob's has been known for decades as "The World's largest Honky Tonk". Does that designation change now? MT: We are now the "World's largest Honky Tonk Themed Restaurant".

TW: What are the hours of operation now?

MT: We are daytime only, except for Fridays and Saturdays. Friday and Saturday we will have concerts starting at 10:00 pm. There is no bull riding now. It will be a couple more weeks before we do bull riding again. No valet either at this time.

TW: What are some of the safety protocols you will be implementing at the club? MT: As long as we can provide a safe atmosphere where we have protocols on top of protocols in place to keep the covid-19 virus out of the building. The virus is not in our building because we have been closed for 6 months. Our job now is to keep the virus out. So we have hand sanitizers on every table, hand sanitizer when you walk in the door. We temperature check everyone that comes through the door. Every staff member, guest and artists has their temperature checked. We have a new thermal camera that is awesome. If people have high readings we give them their money back and ask them to come back another day. There has been so much negative press about people doing it the wrong way so we are trying to be the beacon of light of doing it the right way. If we don't do it right they are going to shut us back down again.

TW: *Tell me about your menu and the types of food you'll be serving?*

MT: I have to have my restaurant open as long as I'm serving alcohol. I can't close my restaurant at 6 pm and keep serving booze all night. So our restaurant will be open all night. When the Bellamy brothers perform this weekend the restaurant will be



open. We have waitresses who can take orders from people or guests can take the food themselves to their tables for the show and we've got really good food. We have some great barbeque and bar fare from hamburgers and hot dogs, nachos, chicken fried steak and chili. We just won an award for our chili. It's a full restaurant menu.

TW: You've always had a large staff. How many people are you bringing back now?

MT: However many bartenders, waitresses and security we need. I initially furloughed it down to 10 people at one point. Now we are slowly building our staff back to handle operations. After week one we will kind of retool things to see if we can handle 1,200 people or even more. Legally, I can do 3,000 people, but that would be foolish for us to do as we aren't even thinking about that. I think at 1,200 people we can control ourselves. Our Saturday show this weekend featuring Flatland Calvary is already sold out. Performing Friday night is the Bellamy brothers and we will end up doing 600 to 700 people on that show.

TW: So what would you like to tell people about why they should come out to Billy Bob's Texas?

MT: Just come out and drink some beer. You can come into our restaurant and not

eat food. You can come into our place and look at our great memorabilia or watch our concerts. We have a limited dance floor. We will have 30 people at a time on the dance floor. There will a line for social distancing of course. We will have a dance cop so every time a couple leaves the floor he will click them off and click two more on. We've pulled all the pool balls and pool sticks off the table. If you want to play pool you have to go to the store and give them your driver's license and they will give you balls and sticks. We are only charging \$5 an hour to play. When you finish you bring the balls and sticks back and we will clean every ball and stick as well as the table. It's only every other table as well. We have a dedicated clean team that will be cleaning all the time to let the guest know we are dedicated to sanitation. We are trying to get back open to help people get back to work, get the entertainers working and my staff working and give people something fun to do. 2024 Presidents Cup returns to Canada

PGA TOUR Commissioner Jay Monahan has announced that the Presidents Cup will return to The Royal Montreal Golf Club in Montreal, Quebec, Canada, when the Presidents Cup shifts internationally in 2024. As host of the 2007 Presidents Cup, The Royal Montreal Golf Club will become the second international venue to host the Presidents Cup more than once, joining The Royal Melbourne Golf Club in Melbourne, Australia.

The 2007 Presidents Cup at The Royal Montreal Golf Club saw two legendary captains lead their respective teams for the final time, with four-time captain Jack Nicklaus guiding the U.S. Team to victory over three-time captain Gary Player and the International Team by a score of 19 1/2 - 14 1/2. Despite falling short, the highlight for the week for International Team fans was a Sunday Singles victory by Mike Weir over World No. 1 Tiger Woods, with the Canadian being supported by a massive and supercharged gallery of spectators.

"The people of Canada are some of the most loyal and passionate sports fans in the world, and given the overwhelming success of the Presidents Cup in 2007, it was a natural next step for the event to return to The Royal Montreal in 2024," said PGA TOUR Commissioner Jay Monahan. "Our thanks go out to our global partners, Citi and Rolex, for making the Presidents Cup possible and to the leadership and membership of The Royal Montreal Golf Club, a venue that has already shown it can challenge and highlight the best players in the world. The Presidents Cup continues to grow and expand along with the global growth of our sport while leaving an indelible legacy of giving back throughout the world. I have no doubt that with the support of our fans, the corporate community and governments

of Quebec and Canada and the City of Montreal, the Presidents Cup 2024 will continue to the positive trajectory of this event"

As part of the news, Monahan announced a partnership between First Tee, Golf Canada and Golf Canada Foundation to launch First Tee - Canada. With plans to expand across the nation, the partnership will add First Tee's youth development program to Golf Canada's already impressive platform that reaches kids in schools and at golf facilities, helping to empower kids through a lifetime of new challenges and personal growth.

Founded in 1873, The Royal Montreal Golf Club is the oldest golf club in North America. Its Blue Course was designed by Dick Wilson and updated by Rees Jones in 2004 and 2005. In addition to hosting the Presidents Cup, The Royal Montreal has also held the RBC Canadian Open on 10 occasions, most recently in 2014.

"We are excited and more than pleased that we have been selected to host the Presidents Cup again, and we are thrilled that we will be welcoming the world's best golfers to our club in 2024," said Michael Richards, Chair of The Royal Montreal Golf Club's bid committee. "Our club has experienced leadership and great members, and our goal is to make the 2024 Presidents Cup the best ever. With widespread support from leaders of the golf and business communities and from various levels of government and with the help of Tourisme Montreal.we're confident we will succeed."

Graham DeLaet, Adam Hadwin and Mike Weir are the three Canadians who have competed in the Presidents Cup. Weir, a five-time Presidents Cup participant, amassed a 13-9-2 record before spending the 2017 and 2019 Presidents Cup serving in the role of a captain's assistant. Weir was famously drawn against

Woods in his Sunday Singles match in 2007, which concluded with Weir winning the final two holes capture the match,1-up.

"I was very proud to be part of the Presidents Cup as a player in 2007, and to see it come back after being so well-supported the first time just speaks to how passionate we are in Canada about golf," Weir said. "The fan turnout was tremendous, and as a Canadian I am very proud to have the Presidents Cup come back."

Weir, the first Canadian to compete in the Presidents Cup, was later followed by DeLaet, who made his debut for Captain Nick Price in 2013. DeLaet, 31 years old at the time, delivered an inspiring 3-1-1 performance at Muirfield Village Golf Club, which included a Singles match victory over Jordan Spieth.

Hadwin became the third Canadian to participate in the Presidents Cup after qualifying for the 2017 International Team at Liberty National Golf Club. He then returned for the 2019 team thanks to one of four captain's picks from Ernie Els, which he converted into a 1-1-1 record at The Royal Melbourne Golf Club.

"This is huge for Canadian golf,"

Hadwin said. "The state of Canadian golf could not be better and I think it is such an appropriate time to bring it back into Canada. There's a good chance that a few of us could end up representing the International Team there at Royal Montreal so that adds to the excitement as well.

"I feel like we have some of the best golf fans in the world in Canada, and to bring a world-class event up to Canada is big for them and I know they'll be excited to have it back."

Tournament dates for the 2024 Presidents Cup will be announced at later date.

About the Presidents Cup

The Presidents Cup is a unique golf event in that there is no purse or prize money. Players are not paid for their participation, but each competitor allocates an equal portion of the funds generated to charities of his choice. Since the event's inception, more than \$49.1 million has been raised for charity from event proceeds, as well as contributions made on behalf of the Presidents Cup, including a record charitable donation of \$10.7 million from the 2017 event alone.

Former FedExCup champions Justin Rose and Jordan Spieth, as well as Brooks Koepka, winner of the inaugural Wyndham Rewards Top 10, highlight the field at the Wyndham Championship. J.T. Poston will be there to defend his title in the final event before the FedExCup Playoffs.

FIELD NOTES: Koepka, who held the top spot in the FedExCup entering last year's Playoffs, will look to build on the progress he showed at the WGC-FedEx St. Jude Invitational and PGA Championship. He was outside the top 125 in the standings before his runner-up in Memphis... Spieth and Patrick Reed, who had a thrilling playoff duel in 2013, are both back in the

LAST TIME: J.T. Poston, who grew up just 90 minutes from Greensboro, North Carolina, fired a sizzling 8-under-par 62 on Sunday at the Wyndham Championship a year ago to win his first PGA TOUR title. In the process, Poston became the first golfer on TOUR since Lee Trevino in 1974 to capture a 72-hole tournament without making any bogeys or worse. Poston also

matched Henrik Stenson's tournament record 22-under 258. Poston nipped fellow North Carolinian Webb Simpson by one shot. Simpson finished runner-up while Byeong Hun An (who matched Poston's 8-under 62 as the round of the week in the first round), Viktor Hovland, and Si Woo Kim rounded out the top five.

The end of the line is a familiar one as Sedgefield has hosted the final Regular Season event annually since 2008. Eligibility for the 2020-2021 season is not on the line, but only the top 125 players will advance to THE NORTHERN TRUST next week.

THE FLYOVER

Entering this week, there have been 477 par-4 holes played on the PGA TOUR this season – and just 22 have been 500 yards or longer. You can add two more this week, with the 501-yard 14th and the 507-yard 18th at Sedgefield. The closing hole is the most difficult on the course, playing to a stroke average of 4.248 last season. Just 50 birdies were made against 108 bogeys and 26 others.

SCATTERSHOTS

SPIETH'S BACK: Jordan Spieth's only pro start at Sedgefield prior to this week came in his rookie season of 2013 when he lost in a playoff to Patrick Reed on the second hole. But he also played Sedgefield as a junior, finishing fourth and sixth in a couple of AJGA events. At 67th in the FedEx Cup standings, Spieth added Wyndham to his schedule at the last minute in hopes of strengthening his position, even though it creates the possibility of six consecutive starts if he makes it to The TOUR Championship. "I thought this would be a good one to add and kind of come and maybe create a little momentum into the Playoffs and also build on what happened six years ago," Spieth said.

CASEY LETTING LOOSE: In a threestretch between 2011-13, Paul Casey arrived at Wyndham outside the top 125 in FedExCup points and was not able to play his way in. In 2014, he was barely inside (at 118th) and moved up 29 spots after a T-8. Now he enters this week with significantly less FedExCup pressure, as he's eighth in points and essentially has a spot secured all the way through to East Lake. No wonder he has a different - and more relaxed - mindset. "I'm totally freewheeling it," he said. "Yeah, like this week for me is like claw another few points closer to Brooks (Koepka, No. 1 in points) and Rory (McIlroy, No. 2) and those guys. They're so far ahead. Yeah, there's no pressure on me, I can freewheel it."

SUB-260: In the previous three seasons, there have been six winning scores of 259 or better on the PGA TOUR ... and three of those were shot at Sedgefield (258-Henrik Stenson/2017, 259-Si Woo Kim/2016, 259-Brandt Snedeker/2018). So far this season, two winners have shot below 260 – Matt Kuchar's 258 at the Sony Open in Hawaii and Rory McIlroy's 258 at the RBC Canadian Open.

NBA Playoffs 2020: Clippers vs. Mavs



Now we get to see what Doncic is capable of in the playoffs

Led by Kawhi Leonard, the Clippers swept the Mavericks in the regular season. Will LA's success against Dallas carry over into the playoffs or will Luka Doncic and Kristaps Porzingis make magic happen in their postseason debuts?

The LA Clippers begin their title pursuit with a first-round matchup with the Dallas Mayericks.

The regular season series was a clean sweep for the Clippers.

The Clippers dominated the first matchup, with Leonard and Paul George proving to be too much for the Mavericks to handle. The duo combined for 54 points while Luka Doncic and Kristaps Porzingis struggled, leading to a 114-99 victory for the Clippers.

The Clippers were without George in the second meeting, and the Mavericks were able to make things interesting. Down double digits at halftime, Luka Doncic sparked a second-half comeback with 24 points, five assists and three rebounds in the final two quarters alone. The game came down to the wire, with Tim Hardaway Jr. missing the game-tying 3-point with 16.0 seconds remaining in regulation.

Leonard was the star of the show for the Clippers, finishing with 36 points and 11 rebounds. It marked his sixth straight 30-point game, which tied a career-high at the time.

The last time the Clippers and Mavs faced each other was in the bubble.

Leonard (29 points) and George (24 points) once again led the way, but the Clippers received a big boost from Ivica Zubac. The big man recorded a 21-point, 15-rebound double-double and shot a perfect 10-for-10 from the field, making for a record-setting performance

In three games, Leonard averaged 31.0 points, 8.3 rebounds and 3.7 assists on 45.2 percent shooting from the field against the Mavericks in the regular season. Doncic averaged 29.0 points, 7.0 rebounds and 7.0 assists but shot only 42.6 percent from the field.

Key Storyline: What does Luka Doncic have in store in his first postseason?

What a season it's been for Doncic. Doncic isn't a finalist for MVP, but he proved to be a legitimate MVP candidate in only his second season in leading the Mavericks to the No. 7 seed in the Western Conference. His averages of 29.0 points, 9.5 rebounds and 9.0 assists per game? Only two players have ever posted them before: Russell Westbrook when he won MVP in 2016-17 and Oscar Robertson, who did it three times in the early 1960s.

While he's only 21, Doncic seems to do something historic every time he takes the court. He's leading the league with 17 triple-doubles this season and isn't far removed from becoming the youngest player in NBA history to record a 30-20-10 game.

Doncic is the youngest player in NBA history to have a 30 PTS, 20 REB, 10 AST game.

Now we get to see what Doncic is capable of in the playoffs.

Doncic will have his hands full against a Clippers team that has two of the best perimeter defenders in the league in Leonard and George, plus Patrick Beverley, who is one of the peskiest defenders at the point guard position. Doncic was still able to put up big numbers against the Clippers in the regular season, but the three of them helped LA make life difficult for him,

holding him to 42.6 percent shooting from the field and 27.3 percent from 3-point range.

While the Mavericks aren't a one-man team - Porzingis is back to looking like the All-Star he was in New York - it all begins with Doncic. (He's creating 52.2 points per game with his scoring and assists this season, making him responsible for close to half of the Mavericks' scoring). When he's at his best, Dallas has proven it can beat anyone.

Three Players to Watch Kristaps Porzingis

Like Doncic, this will be Porzingis' playoff debut.

There isn't quite as much pressure on Porzingis as there is on Doncic, but the Mavericks will need him to play well to have any chance against the Clippers. A good sign for the Mavericks: Porzingis has been one of the breakout stars of the bubble. He's scored 30 or more points in three of Dallas' games, including a 36-point showing against the Portland Trail Blazers in which he went 7-for-9 from 3-point range.

The Mavericks can only hope there's more of that to come.

Kawhi Leonard

We all saw what Leonard did in the playoffs last season, leading the Toronto Raptors to their first championship in franchise history.

Is this the start of another historic run? While he isn't a finalist for MVP either, Leonard was fantastic in the regular season, averaging career highs of 27.1 points and 4.9 assists to go along with 7.1 rebounds per game. The Mavericks didn't have much of an answer for him in their head-to-head matchups, with Dorian Finney-Smith drawing the tough task of trying to slow him down.

Should Leonard lead the Clippers to a championship and win Finals MVP this season, he'll become the first player in NBA history to win the award on three teams. He'll have to get through four different teams to get there, starting with the Mavericks.

Luka Doncic

Hopefully the reasons why are clear. There simply aren't many more players who are more exciting to watch in the league right now. Fingers crossed we get more between the legs assists.

Honourable mention: Paul George. The Clippers will need him to be the Robin to Leonard's Batman to win it all this season. This just might not be the series they need him to be at his very best to advance.

NBA playoff picture: Play-in series scenarios for the No. 8 seed in the West Here's every scenario for how the NBA's new play-in series can unfold as four teams fight for two spots in the West.

The Grizzlies won, which means they're guaranteed to reach the play-in series. Memphis will be the No. 9 seed if the Blazers beat the Nets on Thursday night. If the Blazers lose, Memphis will be the No. 8 seed.

The Suns also beat the Dallas Mavericks, which means Phoenix needs the Blazers to lose to Brooklyn to reach the play-in series. The Spurs have been officially eliminated.

The NBA announced a new change to its playoff format in the run-up to its season restart at the Disney bubble: the No. 8 seed in each conference would be determined by a play-in series, as long as the ninth team in the playoff picture was within four games of the team in front of them.

This won't be an issue in the Eastern Conference, where the Orlando Magic are clear ahead of the Washington Wizards for the No. 8 seed. It is happening in the Western Conference, and as the seeding games reach their final day, four teams still have a chance to ultimately face the Lakers in the playoffs as the eighth and final seed in the West.

The Memphis Grizzlies, Portland Trail Blazers, Phoenix Suns, and San Antonio Spurs are all still alive in the Western Conference playoff race. The play-in series between the No. 8 and No. 9 seed will be set after each team plays their final seeding game on Thursday, Aug. 13.

Here is everything you need to know about the play-in series and the teams that

could be in it.

How will the play-in series work?
The play-in series is limited to only two

The play-in series is limited to only two teams: the No. 8 and No. 9 seed in each conference's playoff picture, provided those teams are separated by four or fewer games in the standings.

If the team that enters the play-in series as the No. 8 seed wins the first game of the play-in series, they are officially in the playoffs. If the No. 9 seed wins the first game of the play-in series, there's a winner-take-all second game.

Essentially: the play-in series has two games maximum. The No. 8 seed has to win one game to lock down the final play-off spot. The No. 9 seed would have to beat them in two straight games to make the playoffs.

Here's how the Western Conference play-in picture looks entering the final day of seeding games

- No. 8 Portland Trail Blazers 34-39
- No. 9 Memphis Grizzlies 33-39
- No. 10 Phoenix Suns 33-39
- No. 11 San Antonio Spurs 32-38 Here's how each team can make the play-in series

This was the scenario for the four teams at the start of the day.

Portland Trail Blazers

The Blazers are in as the No. 8 seed if they beat the Nets on Thursday. They also get the No. 8 seed if the Grizzlies, Suns, and Spurs all lose. The Blazers can still get the No. 9 seed if lose to Brooklyn so long as two of the aforementioned teams also lose on Thursday.

Memphis Grizzlies

To get the No. 8 seed, Memphis needs to beat Bucks and have the Blazers lose to the Nets. The Grizzlies can still make the play-in series as the No. 9 seed if they lose

to Milwaukee as long as the Suns and Spurs both lose as well

Phoenix Suns

The Suns have been the best story in the bubble at 7-0 so far. They can still get the No. 8 seed if they beat the Mavericks on

Thursday combined with a Blazers and Grizzlies loss. Phoenix can get the No. 9 seed if they win and either the Blazers or Grizzlies lose.

San Antonio Spurs


The Spurs only have a 22-year playoff streak on the line, no biggie. To get the No. 8 seed, the Spurs have to beat the Jazz on Thursday and see all three of the other teams lose. To get the No. 9 seed, the Spurs have to win and need two of the three teams in front of them to lose.

The rest of the NBA playoff picture is locked in.

The No. 8 seed in the West is the only thing yet to be determined in the NBA's playoff picture. The East is already totally set, and seeds No. 1 through No. 7 are set in the West.

College Football News and Notes

A quick glance at the 1918 college football season in the middle of the Spanish Flu pandemic reveals several quick and pertinent facts as colleges make 2020 plans around the COVID-19 pandemic:

As was the case for that time, the Rose Bowl was the only postseason contest and fittingly pitted Great Lakes Navy (Chicago - featuring future NFL legend George Halas who intercepted a pass and returned it 77 yards for a touchdown in the victory) (6-0-2) in a 25-6 victory over previously undefeated Mare Island Marines (Calif.) (10-1 overall).

Most colleges played abbreviated schedules with some examples of final records – Texas A&M (6-1 while allowing 19 total points), Mississippi State (3-2), California (6-2), Michigan (5-0 and only undefeated record among 72 "major colleges"), Nebraska (2-3-1 with a 20-7 loss to Washington-Sr. Louis and 0-0 tie with Notre Dame), and Harvard (2-1 with a 14-7 win over crosstown rival Boston College). Winners of the existing (future) power conferences (NCAA Division I began in 1982) were Southwest (Oklahoma), Missouri

Valley (Washington-St. Louis), Western-Big Ten (Illinois, Michigan and Purdue), Pacific Coast (California), Rocky Mountain (Colorado Mines), and Southern Intercollegiate (Georgia Tech).

Georgia Tech football archives show several games depicted where everyone in the crowd is wearing a facemask, and the Yellow Jackets (6-1 overall) rewarded these brace souls with three wins with 100-plus points.

The Spanish Flu pandemic also was heightened after the World War I Armistice Nov. 11, 1918, as millions attended victory parades throughout the United States for returning service personnel. An estimated 675,000 citizens of the U.S. perished from the Spanish Flu, and 50 million people worldwide passed away from this outbreak. An estimated 500 million-plus people of the 1917-19 world population of approximately 1.5 billion actually caught the Spanish Flu.

In related world event football scheduling history, amazingly 76 schools competed in major college football with three postseason bowl games during the deepest throes of World War II in autumn 1943. There were 30-plus "majors" who played informal schedules or cancelled football due to travel restrictions, shortages of players and food and gas rationing.

The NCAA Board of Governors has cancelled all Division II and Division III fall championships and, like Vanderbilt in 2019 NCAA Division I baseball, DII national champion West Florida and DIII gridiron winner North Central (Ill.) will defend their 2019 crowns without playing a contest. The NCAA FCS also will move its playoffs to spring 2021. Dates for the 2020 FCS postseason are to be determined, but the FCS Championship will be played at

Toyota Stadium in Frisco, Texas, for the 11th consecutive season. The Big Sky Conference postponed its football campaign until the spring to bring a total of 70 of the 127 NCAA FBS schools not competing in fall gridiron activity.

Former NFF Board member and Rutgers AD Bob Mulcahy will be inducted into New Jersey Hall of Fame in a virtual ceremony Oct. 18. He was inducted into the 2017 Rutgers Athletics Hall of Fame inductee after helping lead a resurgence in RU athletics from 1998-2008 and was on the NFF Board of Directors from 1990 into the second decade of the 21st Century.



Lincoln Navigator Expert Review

The Lincoln Navigator is the flagship SUV of Ford's luxury brand. Reborn last year, the Navigator went from being a commendable full-size premium sport-utility vehicle to one of the finest available. With an extravagant exterior and dazzling interior, the Navigator 3-row SUV now matches the grandeur of rivals like the Mercedes-Benz GLS, new BMW X7 and Cadillac Escalade. The Navigator also boasts more interior room, and if you need additional space, more can be had in a longer version called the Navigator L. All models are available with 7- or 8-passenger seating, and 4-wheel drive (4/4) is optional over the standard rear-wheel drive (4/2). The Navigator boasts a twin-turbo V6 that, despite having two fewer cylinders than some rivals is stronger with 450 horsepower.

Even the standard Navigator is huge, so by nature it's a lot to manage in parking lots and even tighter city roads. That just comes with the territory of a full-size SUV, and even among full-size SUVs, the Navigator stands out. The Navigator L is larger still. Once on the open road, however, the new Navigator comes into its own. This big Lincoln SUV's standard 3.5-liter twin-turbo V6 engine puts out 450 horsepower and prodigious torque — 510 lb-ft. That's plenty to move this big SUV, and the 10-speed automatic transmission shifts smoothly and quickly; we suggest leaving it in Drive and skipping the paddles. The suspension offers active shocks for a smooth ride, and in our testing the large Lincoln had little issue with the kinds of beat-up roads in the Los Angeles region. Inside it's quiet, with very little wind noise despite the blocky shape, an exception

being the constant growl of the exhaust.

While the Lincoln Navigator continues to share mechanical bits with the Ford Expedition on which it's based (and is built at the same plant in Kentucky), the Navigator has style all its own. From its massive and opulent grille with illuminated Lincoln logo to one of the plushest interiors in the industry, the Navigator is distinctive.

This ultra-high-end audio system by Harman is a treat for ears. The system, available in Navigator Reserve and Black Label models, builds upon the standard Revel with 20 speakers. For traditionalists who still enjoy compact discs, a CD player is also part of the system.

Far and away the most distinctive part of the Navigator, the large cabin of this fullsize luxury SUV looks and feels even more high-end than the Lincoln's price demands. The dash is dominated by a 10-inch touch screen with enormous, easy-to-see-and-use icons, especially when using Apple Car Play or Android Auto. The dash itself is classy and elegant, and we like the center console "island" that doesn't quite reach the dash. The interior is functional, too. All Navigators have three rows of seats, with seating for seven passengers when equipped with 2nd-row bucket seats, or eight passengers if you opt for the no-cost 2nd-row bench. Standard Navigator models have decent room behind the last row -19.3 cubic feet — but if you regularly plan to use all three rows and transport gear, you're a prime candidate for the longwheelbase Navigator L, which has the same passenger dimensions but more cargo space — over 34 cubic feet behind the

impression beginning at the front: The grille is enormous and inescapable. If you don't like it, then this luxury SUV isn't for you. Get past that and there are cool touches, like the aforementioned optional LED-lit Lincoln badge in the middle of the grille, or the cool way the dual LED accents under the headlights scroll on and off. In back, there's Lincoln's signature LED taillights spanning the hatch, and "LINCOLN" spelled out in giant letters. The silhouette may be the same as a Ford Expedition, but the Navigator has enough detail work to make it distinctive.

The Navigator is offered in four trims: Standard, Select, Reserve and Black Label. Even in base form, the Navigator brings plenty of premium amenities. Highlights include leather upholstery for the first two rows, power-folding 2nd- and 3rd-row seats, tri-zone climate control, hands-free power tailgate, universal garage remote and power-adjustable steering wheel and pedals. The robust infotainment system bundles a 10-inch screen with navigation, Apple CarPlay and Android Auto compatibility, and a 16-speaker Revel high-end audio system. The Navigator's safety features include parking sensors and blindspot monitoring with rear cross-traffic alert. Be aware that automatic emergency braking, which is becoming standard on even mainstream vehicles like Toyotas, costs extra here. You'll have to step up to at least a Navigator Select, then pay extra for the Technology Package.

If you're going to spend as much as it takes to buy a Navigator, we'd suggest stepping up to at least the Select trim, which adds adaptive suspension, 360-degree camera, power-deployable running boards, heated steering wheel and wireless

phone charger. Adding the recommendable Technology Package also brings the important automatic emergency braking feature along with other active safety and driving features like lane-keeping assist, adaptive cruise control, and parallel-parking aid. Reserve models include the Tech Package, plus standard 4-wheel drive, the illuminated Lincoln logo in the grille, and 24-way front seats. Black Label Navigator models boast the Revel Ultima audio system, headup display, 30-way front seats, and the option for your Navigator to have a theme, such as "Yacht Club."

The Navigator has only one engine available, but it's a good one: a 450-horsepower version of Ford's excellent 3.5-liter twin-turbocharged EcoBoost V6. It's a lot of muscle, significantly more than is found in the Expedition, and the Lincoln puts it to good use through a 10-speed automatic transmission. While not exactly sports-car quick, the powerful V6 makes short work of acceleration from a dead stop, or hustling around slower traffic on the freeway. It can even tow up to 8,700 pounds when properly equipped. Unlike a lot of high-end engines, this one doesn't require premium unleaded fuel. For a full-size SUV, fuel economy is pretty solid, ranging from 21-23 mpg on the highway, depending on model.

The Navigator has a Manufacturer's Suggested Retail Price (MSRP) starting at \$73,205 for a base model, plus a \$1,295 destination charge. That figure only increases as you climb trims and add features. The more recommendable Select model begins at \$77,555, while the Reserve starts over \$85,000, but does come with 4-wheel drive, which costs \$2,655 extra on the two lower trims. At the top, a Lincoln Navigator Black Label starts over \$96,000. If you want the larger Navigator L, you'll have to opt for at least a Select trim, then spend an extra \$3,200. All-in, a loaded Navigator can hover around the \$100,000 mark. At its base price, this flagship Lincoln SUV starts just below the Cadillac Escalade, is nearly in line with the BMW X7, and above smaller luxury haulers like the Mercedes-Benz GLS, Range Rover Sport and Infiniti QX80. The super-rugged Lexus LX 570 starts at nearly \$86,000. And in case you're wondering, the Navigator's mainstream cousin, the Ford Expedition, starts around \$52,000.
