Rochester Academy of Science Treasurer's Report of March 1, 2019

The Rochester Academy of Science has three categories of funds: The General Fund, the Endowment Funds and the Expendable Funds. The General Fund receives membership dues, monthly interest from the Life Fund (endowment) and the Memorial Fund (endowment). Expenses from the General Fund are outlined in the budget below. This financial report does not include income and expenses of the individual sections.

Endowment Funds: The Endowment funds are not spent but generate interest, which is entered as income into the three Expendable Funds. They are reported to the IRS as <u>restricted</u> assets.

Fairchild Fund Interest from this fund is deposited in the Publications Fund.

Life Fund Contains dues paid by those who joined at the Life Membership level.

Jensen Fund Interest from this fund is deposited in the Grants Fund.

Speakers Fund Interest from this fund is deposited in the Lecture Fund.

Grace Murray Fund Interest from this fund is deposited in the Grants Fund.

Memorial Fund This fund contains memorial gifts to honor named members.

Grants Program Endowment Interest from this fund is deposited in the Grants Fund.

Babette Coleman BequestThe interest from this fund is deposited in the Paper Session Fund to support
the expenses of the Fall Scientific Paper Session.

Expendable Funds: (reported to the IRS as <u>unrestricted</u> assets)

Publications Fund: This fund receives the interest from the Fairchild Fund as well as individual gifts. Since 1995 this fund has been totally self-supporting and does not receive funds from membership dues or from the General Fund. Money in this fund is used to publish the Proceedings and Academy booklets.

Undergraduate Student Research Grants Fund: This fund receives the interest from the Grace Murray Fund, the Jensen Fund, the Grants Endowment Fund and stock dividends (the T.F. and A.A. Murray Fund) as well as gifts from individuals or from sections of the Academy. Since 1995 this fund has been totally self-supporting in that it has not received any funds from membership dues or from the General Fund. Money in this fund is used to award annual research grants to undergraduate college students.

Lecture Fund: This fund receives the interest from the Speakers Fund as well as individual gifts. Since 1995 this fund has been totally self-supporting in that it has not received any funds from membership dues or from the General Fund. Money in this fund is used to pay the expenses and honoraria for invited speakers who give lectures at Academy events (at the Fall Scientific Paper Session and the Spring Lecture).

Paper Session Fund This fund receives funds from the endowment but primarily from registration fees at the paper session. It is used to pay for refreshments at the annual fall scientific paper session.

Assets and Liabilities:

The assets of the Rochester Academy include money held by each of the five sections, as well as the RAS funds in the Pittsford Federal Credit Union (checking, savings) plus investments held by Morgan Stanley/Smith Barney (which pay about 3%; this interest is deposited into the Expendable Funds accounts). The RAS owns stock in ConocoPhillips and Phillips 66 and the dividends received are deposited into the Grants Fund. In addition, the RAS has investment money in the UBS Putnam Diversified Income Trust, which was a bequest from the Babette Coleman estate. The RAS has no liabilities.
