Charles P. Spoelhof

It is with great sadness that we report the passing of long time RAS member and Fellow Chuck Spoelhof. During his long and storied career at Eastman Kodak, Chuck led major initiatives that contributed abundantly to fields of space exploration, national security, optics and astronomy. He also contributed his many talents and wisdom to the benefit of the Astronomy Section during the reorganization in the early 1990's and many fascinating presentations over the decades. He contributed greatly to the Corona spy satellite program and the Hubble Space Telescope. He was ASRAS Chairperson from 1960-1961, and he and his wife Kay hosted many ASRAS winter gatherings at their home. Chuck was named an RAS Fellow in 1994. He will be greatly missed.

I got to know Chuck starting back in the 70's as a member of the ASRAS and then later worked in his area at Kodak in the late 80's. To say that Chuck was intelligent is an understatement. In addition he was a very skilled manager as illustrated by his success at Kodak. He was always interesting and informative and

one could learn a lot from him. I got to know him best during the ASRAS reorganization in the early 90's. Chuck was very involved in the reorganization effort and his experience and wisdom had a very positive influence on the outcome. It felt a little strange to be the chairman of the group and have Chuck in the planning meetings. He had so much more wisdom than I as to how things should go, he should have been in the lead. And yet in his gentle way he was very helpful and supportive and that gave me some comfort to know he was there. It's rare that one person posses so much knowledge, skill and wisdom and uses it for so much good.

Chuck has had a positive influence on many of the good things that have happened early on in ASRAS. He will be missed on many levels.

Mr. Charles Peter Spoelhof, aged 80, of Grand Rapids formerly of Rochester, NY, went to be with his Lord on Saturday, December 18, 2010. He was preceded in death by his sister, Carolyn (Harold) Veldkamp. He is survived by his wife, Cornelia "Kay" Spoelhof; children, Beth

(Stephen) DeVries, Philip (Patricia) Spoelhof, Gordon (Colleen Lynch) Spoelhof, Ronald (Renee) Spoelhof, his brother John (Jo Mae) Spoelhof, and sister Roberta (Benjamin, deceased) Bruinooge. He is also survived by his sisters-in-law and brother-in-law, Pearl Bloemendaal, Jeanette Miedema, Trudy (Ken) Split, Gary (Delores) Maliepaard; nine grandchildren, two (plus a third expected) great grandchildren and numerous nieces, nephews, and cousins. Charles worked for Eastman Kodak from 1954-1986 as an optical engineer and retired as a Vice President. He was recognized as a National Reconnaissance Pioneer in 2000 by the National Reconnaissance Office for his work at Eastman Kodak. In 1981 he was elected to the National Academy of Engineers. After he retired, he worked on the commission to repair the Hubble Space Telescope. He then taught and consulted at several colleges, especially Calvin College in the engineering department, where he was recognized as a distinguished Alumnus in 2006. He traveled the world with Kay to all 50 states and seven continents. He also enjoyed astronomy. He moved to Grand Rapids in 2008 from Rochester, N.Y. The funeral service will be held Wednesday at 11:00 AM at Raybrook Manor Chapel, with visitation from 9:30 AM until the time of the service. It is with great sadness that I report of the recent passing of Stephen Weber. Steve passed away on December 22 after a short illness. Steve had been a very active member of several organizations. Among them he had served as treasurer for the Burroughs Audubon Nature Club for the past several years, right up until December.

A native of New Jersey, Steve came to Rochester to work at Kodak, where he had a long career as an engineer.

Both Steve and his late wife,
Margaret, shared a lifelong
interest in nature. They loved to
camp in the Adirondacks and in
the great western parks. Locally
that translated into membership in
the Rochester Academy of
Science where Steve served as
Chairman of both the Astronomy
and Botany Sections and was
selected a Fellow and President.
He had also been a long-time
Trustee of the Bergen Swamp
Society. He served as President

of the Burroughs Audubon Nature Club in 1997 – 1998.

Steve had worked extensively on the trails at the Railroad Mills Sanctuary, including installing gutters to drain the Woodland Trail. He particularly enjoyed flowers and bird songs.

In his later years Steve lived at the Village in Greece where he led walking groups to both urban and natural settings such as Genesee Valley, Durand-Eastman, Black Creek and Oatka Creek Parks.

Steve was a very caring and active man and he will be greatly missed. A memorial service to honor Steve is planned for May near Lilac Festival time.

Steve Weber served as Vice-President of the RAS from 1963-65, President from 1965-67, and Treasurer from 1970-75. He was named a Fellow of the Academy in 1962. During the 1970's Steve and his wife Margaret graciously hosted monthly RAS Board meetings at their home. I especially remember the maps on the wall with pins identifying the many places Steve and Margaret visited in their travels. Steve also served as editor of the monthly RAS Bulletin for a number of years (especially in the pre-computer days!). Steve had a quick wit, was interested in a wide range of topics and was unfailingly gracious. He will be missed.
