42nd Annual Fall Scientific Paper Session First Call for Abstracts To: Members of the Academy and Science Community

The forty-second Annual Fall Scientific Paper Session of the Rochester Academy of Science will be hosted by Finger Lakes Community College on **Saturday, November 7, 2015**, from 8:30 AM to 2 PM.

This session provides a forum for Academy members, the collegiate community and others engaged in scientific research to present the results of their investigations in an atmosphere that promotes discussion and interaction.

Undergraduate students, graduate students, and faculty members are encouraged to attend and to present posters or oral reports. You do not have to be a member of the Rochester Academy of Sciences to participate.

The Academy covers the full scope of basic and applied sciences, including but not limited to anthropology, biology, botany, chemistry, computer science, ecology, environmental science, geography, geology, physics, physiology, science education, and zoology.

Presentations may be oral reports or posters. Oral reports are limited to 12 minutes in length. There will be 3 minutes for questions from the audience at the end of your presentation. Posters provide an excellent opportunity for author-audience interaction and students should consider this mode of presentation, particularly if this will be their first scientific meeting.

An abstract of your presentation must be received by Friday, October 16, 2015.

We cannot guarantee that late submissions will be included.

Directions for abstract preparation and mailing are included on the attached registration information (omitted in this Bulletin).

Abstract books will be available digitally and distributed at the Paper Session by request only. Registration will be held at the college's main entrance by the new Student Services Building at

8:30 AM. Oral presentations and poster sessions will begin at 9:30 AM. The luncheon is at 12:30 PM and will be followed by the Larry King Memorial Lecture. Refreshments will be provided throughout the morning. A map of the Finger Lakes Community College campus and luncheon information will be included in the second call, which will be distributed at the end of August.

RAS at Science Exploration Days

The Academy plays an important part in Science Exploration Days, a program organized by the Central Western Section of STANYS which has for the past 44 years to provided science enrichment for students and the community. On May 13 and 14, Academy members helped in this mission by sharing their expertise and passion for science by presenting seminars and interacting with visitors in the exhibit hall.

Carol Latta, Lee Tutt, and Jutta Dudley spent class time with students in grades 7 through 12. Carol brought to light old and new questions about the universe (Mysteries in Astronomy: Answering the Big Questions) while Lee described the journey of a pebble from mine to stonecutter's workshop (The Gemstone Journey), and Jutta explained how the story of Ice Age proboscideans is uncovered (Mastodonts in the Muck).

In the exhibit hall, our hands on and informative topic displays covering astronomy, minerals, fossils, botany, and anthropology taught and enlightened visitors of all ages. The RAS Section tables were hives of activity during the evening public event and the school program the next day. Students looked through a telescope and learned about cool things about the universe from Astronomy members Carol Latta, David Bishop and Frank Bov. The edible wild plants at the Life Sciences booth impressed those who never thought they'd be eating "weeds," which were gathered and shared by wild salad makers Karen Wolf, Larry Hirsch, Liz Pixley, Cindy Coupal, Sue Homsey, Angela Masters and Kathy Lu. Next door, bright fluorescent minerals awed viewers peering into a black box operated by Jerry Colyer while young collectors were challenged to identify their selected free sample by Mineral members Stephen Busshcaert, Carol Wonder, and Jutta Dudley. Visitors also saw, with Paul Dudley's help, that many familiar things are made from minerals. At the Fossil table, Dan Krisher and George Wonder showed off extinct critters from the Earth's past that captivated the attention of many.


We are repeating this column from the May Bulletin, so you can see the diagram that did not get printed.
