# 1 About Sister Shack:

# Sister Shack is led by:



- Black and People of colour
- Queer people (QTIBIPOC+ and LGBTQIA+)
- Intersectional Feminists

#### We work for:



- Justice for people
- Inclusion
- Support for people who are treated unfairly in society

# We are a Community Interest Company (CIC):

This means we do our work for our community, not to make money.

#### Who We Are

We are a 'by and for' group.

#### This means:



- •We are part of the communities we work with.
- •We have lived through similar experiences.
- •We understand what people in our communities need

#### We believe in:



- Safer spaces
- · Fair treatment for everyone
- Belonging and inclusion

# Who We Support

We support people who often don't get the support they need.

#### This includes:



• QTIBIPOC+ (Queer, Trans, Intersex, Black, Indigenous, and People of Colour)



• LGBTQIA+ people from the global majority (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Intersex, Asexual+ people).



•Women



People seeking safety and refugees (asylum or sanctuary)



Disabled people



 People who are part of more than one of these groups

## What We Do



- Some are open to everyone
- Some are just for certain groups

We do this because:

• Different people need different support

You are welcome



# 2 What is a Safer Space Policy?

A **safer space policy** is a set of rules that helps make a space:



- Welcoming
- Inclusive (open to everyone we support)



- Respectful
- A place where people feel safe to join in

#### Who is not welcome?

We do **not** welcome people who:



- Support violence or hate (such as genocide)
- Push oppressive ideas



Come with **harmful or cruel goals** 



Our events are for people who want to care for and support each other.

## What does "safer" mean?

We say "safer space" - not "safe space" - because:



- No space can be 100% safe
- There are still unfair systems in the world

But we **do our best** to make our spaces as safe as possible.

# Why we don't say "brave space"

Some people say "brave space".

We **don't** use these words, because:



- It can put pressure on already marginalised people (people who are already treated unfairly)
- It asks marginalised people to be extra brave

We believe **everyone should be responsible** for their actions

# What we expect from you

We ask you to:



- Follow our safer space policy
- Be kind and respectful to others
- Help us make the space welcoming for everyone we support

We are open to talking about our policy.

We want to work together to make our spaces better.

# 3 What is a Safer Space?

A safer space is a space where everyone is:



· Responsible for their actions



· Thoughtful with their words



Thoughtful about how they behave

Open to learning from mistakes.

# What does being responsible mean?

Being responsible means:



Coming into the space with good intentions

Making sure our words and actionsmatch those good intentions

• If someone tells us we have hurt them or others, we:



- Listen
- Take it seriously
- o Try to do better

Even if we didn't mean to hurt someone, we still need to take **responsibility**.

# Why is this important?

When we are all responsible, we can:



- Build a space that feels fair and safe for everyone
- Care for each other
- Create stronger connections



# Learn from each other's experiences

Everyone helps make the space safer – not just one person.

# 4 Our Zero Tolerance Policy

We have **zero tolerance** for harmful behaviour. This means:



We **do not allow** certain actions in our spaces – ever.

If someone breaks these rules, they will be **asked to leave** and may face further action.

#### 1. No Violence or Abuse

We do **not allow**:



Physical violence (hitting, pushing, etc.)



Sexual abuse or harassment



• Emotional or psychological abuse (like bullying or gaslighting)



• **Financial abuse** (controlling someone's money)



Domestic abuse



Abuse online or through technology




• **Spiritual abuse** (misusing beliefs or religion to harm)

#### 2. No Discrimination or Hate

We do not allow:



 Any hateful behaviour, in words or actions



 Any unfair treatment of people based on who they are

This includes (but is not only):



- Racism (against Black and people of colour)
- Misogynoir (hatred of Black women)



- Transphobia (hatred or fear of trans people)
- Transmisogyny (hatred of trans women)



• Endosexism (against people who are intersex)



•Classism (treating people unfairly because of money or background)



 Heterosexism (against LGBTQIA+ people)



Misogyny (hatred of women)



• **Ableism** (against disabled people)



• Allosexism (against people with different sexual experiences)



• **Cisgenderism** (against people who are not cisgender)



 Ageism (treating people unfairly because of age)

# If You Break These Rules

If you hurt others in these ways, we will:



- Ask you to leave straight away
- Or remove you from the space
- We may also take further action depending on what happened

# 5 Our Guidelines and Expectations

These are the rules and values we follow in our spaces. They help keep our events **safe**, **fair**, and **respectful** for everyone.

# Do Not Use Privilege to Cause Harm



- •Everyone has different **levels of privilege** (power, safety, support).
- •Do not use your privilege to hurt others or take up too much space.



 You can use your privilege to support others, not harm them.

# **Be Aware of Your Privilege**



- Think about the power or safety you may have.
- Notice how this may affect others around you.

## **Take Racism Seriously**



- Racism can happen
   anywhere, including here.
- It can also be **internal** (learned or unspoken).



- Think about any racism you may carry or benefit from, and work to change this.
- We do not allow any racist or anti-Black words, actions, or behaviours in our spaces.

# **Respect Boundaries**



- Respect people's personal space.
- Respect emotional boundaries –
   don't push others to talk or share.

# **People Have Different Lives**



Everyone has a different story and background.

# People are different in:



- 。 Race
- Gender
- Sexuality
- Disability
- Class or income

Do not make **assumptions** or **stereotypes** about people.

## Survivors in our spaces



- Some people may have lived through violence or harm.
- Be **gentle and respectful** you may not know what someone has been through.

# **Ask Questions Respectfully**



- You can ask respectful questions.
- But remember: no one has to answer your question if they don't want to.

**Don't Ask Intrusive Questions** 

Do not ask intrusive questions about someone's:



- 。 Sex
- Body parts
- Gender identity

## Respect Hidden Disabilities and Needs

# Anyone might have:



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- A disability
- Be **neurodivergent** 
  - Have **health conditions**

Do not assume anything about someone.

Respect people's **access needs** (e.g. quiet space, seating, captions).

## **Content Warnings**



 If you're sharing something that might be upsetting, give a content warning first.

But remember: marginalised people can share their own stories, even if they are difficult for you to hear.

#### **Pronouns**



- Not everyone feels safe or ready to share their pronouns (like he/she/they).
- Some people do not have pronouns. You can use these people's names instead of pronouns.



- If you don't know someone's pronouns:
- Use their **name**, if you know it
- Use gender-neutral words, like "they" or "everyone"

# **Taking Photos or Videos**



- If you want to take a photo, video, or screenshot:
- o Ask permission first
- If you want to share it online, ask for extra permission

## When Something Happens



We want our space to be safe and fair. But if something **goes wrong**, here is what to do:

## If something happens to you

#### If someone is:



- Abusive
- Disrespectful
- Discriminating against you



• Breaking any of our **rules** 



You can speak to us.

We are here to **support you**.



Please talk to an **organiser** or **venue staff member** and tell us what happened.

# If you see something happen

If you see someone being:



- Abusive
- Discriminating against someone
- · Hurtful or disrespectful

Don't be silent. Please say something.



Speak to an **organiser** or **venue staff** straight away.

# 6 Making Our Spaces Work for Everyone


At **Sister Shack**, we believe a **safer space** must also be an **accessible space**.

We want everyone to feel welcome and included.

#### **Before Our Events**

We will tell you **important access information** ahead of time.

#### This includes:



How to get to the venue



If the venue has step-free access



• If there is a quiet space



•What the **toilets** are like



•What **access tools** (like captions or interpreters) are available

## **Communication Access**

We are working to make our **online and printed information** easier to use.

We do this by:



• Using **alt text** for screen readers



Hiring British Sign Language
 (BSL) interpreters, if we can



 Adding closed captions to videos

## **Ticket Access**

Most of our events are free.

If there is a ticket fee, we:



- Offer free or cheaper tickets for:
  - Refugees
  - People seeking sanctuary
  - People on low incomes



- Offer "Pay it forward" tickets:
  - Someone with more money can buy a ticket for someone else who can't afford one

#### **Food Access**

At events with food, we will:

- Label allergens clearly (like nuts, dairy, etc.)
- Offer different food options, including:



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- 。 Vegan
- ∘ Halal
- **o** Kosher
- 。Gluten-free

#### **Wheelchair & Toilet Access**



Most of our venues are wheelchair accessible and have gender-neutral toilets.

If we use a venue that is **not fully accessible**, we will:



- Let you know ahead of time
- Share details on our social media pages

#### Feedback & Questions

We always want to **do better**.



We ask for **feedback** to help us improve access.



## 7 Pronouns

At **Sister Shack**, we want everyone to feel **safe** and **respected** when sharing who they are.

#### This includes:





 Whether any of these identities are clearly defined or not

#### **Using Names and Pronouns**



- If someone tells you their
   pronouns (like she/her,
   he/him, or they/them) use
   these pronouns
- If you don't know someone's pronouns, use their name.

Some people do **not use pronouns**, and you can refer to these people by name.

#### If You Make a Mistake

We all make mistakes.

If someone corrects you:



- Don't get upset or angry
- Say sorry
- Use the correct words
- Move on
- Do better next time

#### No Deadnaming or Misgendering

Using someone's **old name** (called a "deadname") or the **wrong pronouns on purpose** is **not allowed** 



If you do this again and again, you will be **asked to leave** the space



Respecting names and pronouns is part of making this space **safer and more inclusive for everyone**.

# 8 We say no to taking from our communities

We do not agree with people taking from our communities without giving back.


#### This includes:



1. Taking our ideas or work and **not** giving us credit.



2. Using our spaces just to **collect data or do research, without asking** or giving back.



3. Joining our community spaces to **copy what we do** and use our work in places where we are not welcome.



4. **Asking us to work for free** when you have money or funding.

In our communities, we help each other.



We follow ideas from **disability justice** so that we can be inclusive of people who can't give back.

If you have funding, pay us.

Too often our QTIBIPOC+ community is



- 1. Treated like a resource.
- 2. Asked to work for free.



3. Treated like research subjects instead of partners.

#### If you like our ideas or work:



- 1. Support us to keep doing it.
- 2. Join us, don't copy us.



3. If you hear a good idea from someone and you have skills or money, help them to make the idea happen.

#### If you value our work:



- 1. Work with us.
- 2. Support us.
- 3. Fund us.



- 4. At the very least, say where the idea came from.
- 5. Credit the original creators.

We will take action if we see people taking from us in harmful ways.

### 9 Safer Collaborations

At Sister Shack, we choose carefully who we work with.

#### Who We Work With

We work with people who:



- Share our goals, values, and beliefs
- Care about fairness, inclusion, and justice

#### Who We Don't Work With

We do **not** work with people who:



- Support or ignore genocide
- Use or spread hate or oppression
- Say or do things that go against our values

#### We Choose Carefully

We make **careful and thoughtful decisions** about the people and groups we work with, including:



- Individuals
- Organisations



- Collectives
- Community groups

#### If You Have a Concern

If you are worried about a group or person we are working with, you can contact us.



## 10 Safer Venues

We choose venues that help make our events **safer and more welcoming**.

#### The Old Coal Yard

One venue we use often is called The Old Coal Yard.

This venue:



• Is wheelchair accessible



• Has gender-neutral toilets



 Is Shout-Up! certified (this means the staff are trained to stop harassment) If you have a problem or need help:




- Speak to a staff member behind the bar
- They are there to support you


#### **Other Venues**

We also hold events at other venues.

Before each event, we will:



- Share accessibility information
- Let you know about the space and what to expect



Encourage you to visit the venue's
 website to read their rules and policies

## 11 Contacting Us About Issues or Concerns



We want to make our space as **safe** as possible.

But no space can ever be 100% safe.

If someone's actions make you feel **unsafe** or **uncomfortable**, please tell us.

#### **How to Tell Us**

You can talk to us:



1. During the event

2. At the end of the event



3. To any person helping to **organise** the event



4. To **staff** working at the venue

#### If You Can't Tell Us During the Event



It's okay if you can't tell us right away.

You can also send us an email:



#### **What Happens Next?**



• We will look into what happened.



•If someone breaks the rules, they may be **asked to leave**.



• We may take **further action** if needed.

We want to keep our space **safe** and **respectful** for everyone.
