THE COURT: You are excused. Thank you John. 1 MR. WISEMAN: John Foor. 2 THE COURT: This witness does not object to 3 being photographed. 4 JOHN STEVEN FOOR 5 Called as a rebuttal witness by the State of Ohio, 6 being first duly sworn in according to law by the Bailiff, 7 was examined and testified as follows: 8 REBUTTAL EXAMINATION 9 BY - MR. WISEMAN: 10 Mr. Foor could you please state your name and 11 occupation. 12 John Steven Foor, I am a registered nurse employed 13 by Grant Medical Center. In Columbus, Ohio? Q 15 Yes. 16 I would like to direct your attention to the night 17 of February 13, 1994 or the early morning hours of 18 February 14th, 1994. Were you working during those hours? 19 Yes. A 20 At Grant Medical Center? 21 Yes. 22 Did you have occasion to attend a patient named, 23

Richard Warren?

Yes.

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And why did you need to attend to Mr. Warren, if you 1 Q 2 know? He was my assignment after he was released from the 3 4 surgery for operations for the traumatic incidents that he had. 5 Do you recall what traumatic incidents they were? 6 7 He suffered gunshot wounds. 8 Did you have occasion to communicate with him after Q 9 surgery regarding what happened to him? 10 Yes. Tell us about that and what did you do? 11 12 Well, it was after Mr. Warren was recovering from his operations immediately waking up from the anesthesia and 13 so forth. After he done that, I began to collect data in 14 relation to his personal history and also any information 15 that might relate to the incidents that might help with the 16 17 investigation. Did you know Mr. Warren? 18 19 No, I did not. Did you have any information about what had happened 20 to him prior to your talking to him, other than medical 21 22 information? 23 No. What kinds of questions, if you remember, did you 24

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ask him?

Well, at the time Mr. Warren was not able to speak because he was on the ventilator, post operatively. And he initially tried to communicate by sign language and wasn't successful. So I was able to get a clipboard and a piece of paper and he wrote out the information.

Q What did he write, specifically in relation to the incident?

A He said that he felt the first name of the person was Kevin, that's all he knew. He did not know the last name or anything like that.

Q What time of day was it when this happened?

A Specifically, it was in the early morning hours, a couple of hours after the operations and so forth. Sometime around 5:00 a.m. I believe that I charted -- that I started writing notes around 5:00 in the morning -- medical records.

Q Did he have contact with anybody other than you or medical personal from the hospital from the time he left surgery until -- while you were with him?

A No, not in the communicative sense.

MR. WISEMAN: Mr. Foor thank you very much 1 for your testimony. No further questions. 2 CROSS-REBUTTAL EXAMINATION 3 BY - MR. BANKS: 4 Mr. Foor, what would you say if I told you 5 Mr. Warren said he never wrote anything down? Well, he did write something down. 7 And how long have you been a nurse? 8 Since 1984. And did you consider his condition to be life 10 threatening that evening? 11 At any time anybody is in the critical care unit, 12 their situation is such that it could be life threatening. 13 So it was critical the information that he was 14 writing down, enough for you to communicate back to someone 15 else? 16 Yes, sir. 17 And, in fact, what did you do with the note? 18 It was with the patient's chart there and was just 19 on a piece of scratch paper. 20 Did you write it down in the notes, specifically 21 what the patient said? 22 No. 23 We have a death and life situation and a person has 24

identified a first name of the person, wrote it on a piece

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of paper and gave it to you and you did not keep that piece 1 of paper; did you? 2 3 No, I did not. 4 Nor did you write any of this conversation down anywhere in the medical records or the notes; did you? 5 What I wrote down was "patient is writing a note." 6 Α Would you like to find that for me? 7 8 MR. BANKS: May I approach, Your Honor. 9 These are the medical records that were delivered from the hospital. 10 THE COURT: Are those marked? 11 MR. BANKS: No, but we can mark them. 12 Well, let him go through the 13 THE COURT: 14 records and what he testifies from, we will mark that 15 specifically. MR. BANKS: Yes, Your Honor. 16 Here it is on the nursing notes. Note 0500 on 17 February 14th under the narrative observations which is part 18 19 of the record, "Alert and oriented, cooperative, Kistrea's, writing notes. And the doctor, he mentions wrote down the 20 name Kevin. 21 But that is not recorded here. 22 23 Would you mark this please. 24

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(Defendant's Exhibit 22 was marked for 1 identification by the court reporter.) 2 3 You are saying he was coherent, alert, and writing notes? 4 That's correct. 5 6 And that was important to you to state his condition? 7 Yes. 8 And it was important also, enough for you to call 9 and say that he had written down the name Kevin? 10 11 Yes, I called. And informed the Bucyrus Police Department of that information? Right. 14 15 And you didn't keep the note or the piece of paper 16 he wrote it on? No, I didn't. 17 And you didn't say what was in the note in your 18 narrative; did you? 19 Not what it said specifically, no. 20 You didn't think it was important enough to--21 MR. WISEMAN: Objection, Your Honor. 22 THE COURT: Objection is sustained. 23 (Mr. Banks) Your training from the other hospitals and prior to your being employed at Grant, isn't it true 25

that important information like that you would contain in . your notes? Information related to the patient's medical 3 condition, the status and so forth, is pertinent and we 4 relate it in the notes. Information that you are speaking 5 about is related to the police officers, the police 6 department for them to take care of. 7 Did you have a security department there? 8 Yes, we did. 9 Did you turn that over to the security department? 10 Turn what over? 11 The note. 12 The note, I did not. 13 MP. BANKS: Okay, thank you. Nothing 14 further. 15 FURTHER REBUTTAL EXAMINATION 16 BY - MR. WISEMAN: 17 Nurse Foor these are the entire hospital records 18 from Mr. Warren's hospital stay? 19 That's correct. 20 And are there standard rules of procedure that go in 21 a patient's medical record? 22 Yes, there are. 23 And you indicated what goes into the medical 24 records--25

1	A Well, specifically what I was recording here was the
2	patient's condition as far as his recovery from his surgical
3	procedure, within the nursing notes.
4	Q And that is your primary concern?
5	A Yes.
6	MR. WISEMAN: Okay, no further questions.
