HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY SHOW RULES

- Entries: Registration fee £1.00.
 20p per entry/Juniors (under 14) free.
- 2. Exhibitors may enter any number of items in each class but may win **only one prize per class**.
- 3. Home-Grown Requirement

All exhibits must be grown by the exhibitor in their own garden or allotment, except for floral arrangement classes. If there is any doubt, the Committee may appoint a subcommittee to inspect the exhibitor's garden or place of cultivation.

4. Cup Verification

A subcommittee of **three members**, including the Chairman, may inspect the garden or place of cultivation for the exhibits that win either:

The Captain Faire Silver Cup or The T. Wright Esq. Silver Cup

5. Presentation of Vegetables

All vegetables must be **cleaned** and presented on **plates** (plates not supplied) where appropriate.

6. Stalks

Stalks must remain on exhibits where appropriate.

7. Prizes in Small Classes

Judges may withhold prizes if there are fewer than 3 exhibits in a class.

- 8. Double Prize Money this year for First Time Entrants.
- 9. Staging Times

The hall will be open for staging exhibits during the following times:

- o Friday 5th September: 7:30 PM 9:00 PM
- o Saturday 6th September: 8:00 AM 10:15 AM

10. Exhibit Removal

Exhibits must be removed between **4:00 PM and 5:30 PM** on the day of the show.

11. Prize Money

Prize money will be disbursed after 4:00 PM on show day

Horricultural Society for the of forming a Horticultural Society for the village of Hoby and surrounding neighbourhood, comprising Ragdale, Brooksby, and Rotherby, the Rev. H. A. Beresford presided over an enthusiastic gathering of horticulturists in the Institute. It was decided that the Society should be known as the Hoby and District Horticultural Society. It was stated that the members would be able to purchase their seeds on the co-operative principle. It was decided to arrange a series of lectures, and to organise a show and give special prizes for the best enlitivated gardens. Officials were elected as follows:—President, Mr. E. Ironside: hon. treasurer, Mr. P. Stonehouse, the secretary, Mr. F. B. Croft; Committee, Messrs, P. Stonehouse, W. Bayliss, F. Gumbrill, and H. Shelton, representing Hoby. Messrs, Spence, Ecoh, and Steel (Rotherby), and Mr. J. Dixon (Brooksby). The membershin fee will he la, ner annum.

There are pictures, memorabilia and stories from the Society's records over the last 100 years. They show notable events demonstrating the community interest and commitment.


