The Prophetic Vision of the Second Vatican Council

- The fruit of renewal ... at the cusp of deeper challenges
- A rediscovery of the Church in light of God's plan
 - Church as mystery, born from the heart of the Trinity
 - A new "consciousness" (see Karol Wojtyla)
- "Church": not reserved for hierarchy or institutional dimensions; not distinct from the members

Lumen gentium: The universal call to holiness

- All the Christian faithful, whatever their condition (status) or rank (ordinis), are called to the fullness of the Christian life and the perfection of Christian charity (no. 40).
- [A]II the faithful of Christ are invited and bound to strive towards holiness and the perfection of their particular state of life (no. 42).

Gaudium et spes: The supreme calling

•[O]nly in the mystery of the incarnate Word does the mystery of man take on light.... Christ, the final Adam, by the revelation of the mystery of the Father and His love, fully reveals man to man himself and makes his supreme calling clear. (GS, no. 22)

Gaudium et spes: The supreme calling

- All have been called to one and the same end, God himself. (no. 24)
- [M]an, who is the only creature on earth which God willed for itself, cannot fully find himself except through a sincere gift of himself. (no. 24)

- Documents on Bishops, Priests, Religious, Laity
- Apostolicam actuositatem: To the laity go and transform the world ... live sent.
- Ad gentes: The pilgrim Church is of its very nature missionary, since she draws her origin from the mission of the Son and the mission of the Holy Spirit, in accordance with the plan of God the Father. (no. 2)

- Sacrosanctum Concilium: Full, conscious, active participation
- Presbyterorum ordinis: "The Lord Jesus, 'whom the Father consecrated and sent into the world,' gave his whole mystical body a share in the anointing of the Spirit with which he was anointed." (no. 2)

•Awaken, O Church! Come alive!

Our mystical incorporation into Christ

- Second Vatican Council, an extended exegesis on St. Paul and the Church as the (Mystical) Body of Christ
 - •1 Cor 12:4-7, 12-31; Ephesians

Our mystical incorporation into Christ

- •Priest, Prophet, King
- •Communion and Mission inseparable calls
- Enlivened by the Holy Spirit

Each member, each vocation, is needed

- •There are no observers in the bleachers
- "Vocation" pertains to all the baptized
- •Each of us is called because we are loved, and the love of God urges us on, wherever we are called

Vocations interrelated and interdependent

- People of God: the whole Church
- The hierarchy serves the mission of the laity (and that of the life of the counsels)
- The laity, particularly the domestic Church, is the seedbed of vocations in the Church
- Consecrated life gives specific expression to the evangelical counsels, guiding both hierarchy and laity to greater love

Harmonious collaboration brings life, growth, and beauty to the Body of Christ

- Analogy of the Body
- Work of the Holy Spirit
 - Co-essentiality of institutional and charismatic
- Evident in the history and life of the Church

- Aspects in need of realization

Jesus' Calling of the Twelve – Mark 3:13-15

And he went up on the mountain, and called to him those whom he desired; and they came to him. And he appointed twelve, to be with him, and to be sent out to preach and have authority to cast out demons.

Loved, Called, Sent

- "Vocation is the revelation of God's choice." (Balthasar, The Christian State of Life, 140)
- "It is only in contemplating the love of the Son that man comes to understand his own calling: to perceive and understand himself from no other standpoint than that of mission." (Balthasar, ibid., 79-80)

Loved, Called, Sent

- •Not that we loved God but that he loved us... (1 Jn 4:10)
- •As the Father has loved me, so have I loved you; abide in my love. (Jn 15:9)
- •Love one another as I have loved you. (Jn 15:12)


Three basic senses of "vocation"

- Particular, daily life


At the root of every vocation ...

- •Holiness love
 - Deep friendship with the Lord
 - The call to pure and chaste love
 - The call to evangelize mission


•First of all, I have no hesitation in saying that all pastoral initiatives must be set in relation to *holiness*.




 The Council Fathers laid such stress on this point, not just to embellish ecclesiology with a kind of spiritual veneer, but to make the call to holiness an intrinsic and essential aspect of their teaching on the Church.




• In fact, to place pastoral planning under the heading of holiness is a choice filled with consequences. It implies the conviction that, since Baptism is a true entry into the holiness of God through incorporation into Christ and the indwelling of his Spirit, it would be a contradiction to settle for a life of mediocrity, marked by a minimalist ethic and a shallow religiosity.



 The time has come to repropose wholeheartedly to everyone this *high standard of* ordinary Christian living: the whole life of the Christian community and of Christian families must lead in this direction.



• It is also clear however that the paths to holiness are personal and call for a genuine "training in holiness", adapted to people's needs.





 The Lord asks everything of us, and in return he offers us true life, the happiness for which we were created. He wants us to be saints and not to settle for a bland and mediocre existence.



• The call to holiness is present in various ways from the very first pages of the Bible. We see it expressed in the Lord's words to Abraham: "Walk before me, and be blameless" (*Gen* 17:1).



 My modest goal is to repropose the call to holiness in a practical way for our own time, with all its risks, challenges and opportunities.



• For the Lord has chosen each one of us "to be holy and blameless before him in love" (*Eph* 1:4).



Evangelization

There is a pressing need to frame everything in terms of evangelization, as the fundamental principle that guides ecclesial activity as a whole.

(DC, no. 297)

Reproposing the call to holiness

- •Restoring the initiative to God (exercising the primacy of grace)
 - Prayer and surrender to the Holy Spirit
 - Gifts, charisms, and discernment



On Discernment

 How can we know if something comes from the Holy Spirit or if it stems from the spirit of the world or the spirit of the devil? The only way is through discernment, which calls for something more than intelligence or common sense. It is a gift which we must implore. If we ask with confidence that the Holy Spirit grant us this gift, and then seek to develop it through prayer, reflection, reading and good counsel, then surely we will grow in this spiritual endowment. (GE, no. 166)



An Urgent Need

 The gift of discernment has become all the more necessary today, since contemporary life offers immense possibilities for action and distraction, and the world presents all of them as valid and good. All of us, but especially the young, are immersed in a culture of zapping. We can navigate simultaneously on two or more screens and interact at the same time with two or three virtual scenarios. Without the wisdom of discernment, we can easily become prey to every passing trend. (GE, no. 167)



The Harmony of Difference in Unity


- Complementary calls, gifts, charisms

- Life in the Holy Spirit

St. John the Baptist

- Turning the hearts of fathers to their children
- A friend of the Bridegroom, who is Jesus
- Martyred in defense of the truth and sanctity of marriage





Sts. Priscilla and Aquila

- Married couple, co-workers with St. Paul
- Domestic church in service to the proclamation of the Gospel and the apostolic and priestly ministry
- Risked their lives for St. Paul's



St. Catherine of Siena

- Third-Order Dominican, helped restore the papacy to Rome
- Worked for reform and against the western schism
- "Be who God meant you to be and you will set the world on fire."

The Georgia Martyrs, Venerables

- Five Spanish Franciscan friars, serving Native Americans along presentday coastal Georgia (La Florida), martyred in 1597 for standing for the truth of marriage and against polygamy

 - Blas Rodríguez
 - Miguel de Añon
 - Antonio de Badajoz
 - Francisco de Veráscola

St. Thérèse of Lisieux

- Patroness of missions
- Spirituality of the "little way," one of the most influential spiritual masters of the 20th-21st centuries
- For clergy, consecrated/religious, lay (young or old, married or single)

Venerable Fr. Augustus Tolton

- Followed the Lord's call, even in the face of great obstacles
- As a priest, he was open to serving all, in the face of persistent prejudice and racism
- "It was said that I would be the only priest of my race in America and would not likely succeed."





St. José Luis Sánchez del Río

- A young, courageous lay witness in the Cristero War, when the Mexican government was executing priests, closing schools and convents, and taking church properties
- Tortured and martyred for the faith in 1928, at the age of 14

Pope St. John Paul II

- An advocate of holiness for many
 - Marriages and families
 - Young people
 - Women
 - Brother priests
 - Religious sisters and brothers
- Bequeathed a vision of the human person and the call to love that has only begun to be unpacked
