The best landscape style for these homes would complement their **Modernist**, **Southwestern**, **and Pueblo Revival** influences while thriving in the desert climate. Here are a few ideal options:

1. Desert Modern (Minimalist Xeriscape) – Best Fit

This style enhances the clean lines of the architecture with structured plantings and low-maintenance elements.

- ✓ **Gravel & Decomposed Granite:** Use light-colored gravel to contrast the white stucco walls.
- ✓ **Architectural Plants:** Agave, yucca, golden barrel cacti, and desert spoon provide sculptural interest.
- ✓ Hardscaping: Concrete or stone pavers for pathways and patios.
- ✓ Accent Boulders: Large, strategically placed boulders enhance the natural desert aesthetic.

Bonus: Low-Water Modernist Accent Plants

For additional contrast and variety, mix in these standout plants:

- ✓ Aloe Vera Compact and sculptural, with added medicinal benefits.
- ✓ Hesperaloe Parviflora (Red Yucca) Slim, arching leaves with red flower spikes.
- ✓ Echinocactus Grusonii (Golden Barrel Cactus) Bright yellow-green spheres with strong geometric appeal.
- ✓ Senna Artemisioides (Feathery Cassia) Airy, grayish foliage with bright yellow flowers.

6. Senna Artemisioides (Feathery Cassia)

- ✓ Size: 4-5 ft tall and wide
- ✓ Foliage: Wispy, gray-green leaves
- ✓ Flowers: Bright yellow in late winter/spring
- √ Water Needs: Low
- ✓ Best Use: Adding soft movement, contrast to bold cacti/agaves

Large Shrubs (5-8 ft height)

Ideal for privacy, windbreaks, and anchoring a modern landscape.

7. Tecoma Stans (Arizona Yellow Bells)

- ✓ Size: 6-8 ft tall, 4-6 ft spread
- ✓ Foliage: Deep green, lush appearance
- ✓ Flowers: Bright yellow, trumpet-shaped blooms
- ✓ Water Needs: Low-moderate
- ✓ **Best Use:** Statement shrub, wall coverage, screening

8. Acacia Redolens (Prostrate Acacia)

- ✓ Size: 5-7 ft tall, spreading up to 10 ft
- ✓ Foliage: Dense, blue-green, low-growing
- ✓ Flowers: Small yellow puffballs in spring
- √ Water Needs: Very low
- ✓ Best Use: Low-maintenance groundcover alternative to grass

9. Sphaeralcea Ambigua (Desert Globemallow)

✓ Size: 5-6 ft tall, 3-5 ft spread

✓ Foliage: Gray-green, fuzzy texture

✓ Flowers: Orange, apricot-colored blooms in spring

√ Water Needs: Low

✓ Best Use: Naturalized plantings, adding a pop of color

Best Shrub Combinations for a Desert Modern Look

For a sleek, architectural feel, combine plants based on color, texture, and form:

Color Contrast:

- Gray-green foliage (Texas Sage, Desert Spoon, Dalea)
- Deep green foliage (Yellow Bells, Chaparral Sage)
- **Bright flowers for pop** (Fairy Duster, Desert Globemallow)

Texture Play:

- Fine-textured shrubs (Feathery Cassia, Fairy Duster) soften the look.
