WHY PRETZELS AS A SIGN OF LENT?

In the Middle Ages, fasting included such preparation as removing all items from the pantry that could lead toward the making of special foods. Lent was a period of strict fasting.

Keen housewives would empty their pantry of such items as butter, salt, flour before Ash Wednesday. To prevent abuse of waste, they used the ingredients to create special things that could be eaten before Lent began. In Germany, that resulted in making pretzels.

The shape of the pretzel was a twist of the dough that looked like arms embracing, as a symbol of love and unity.
