

BURGUNDY

- 1st century - Romans
- Benedictine order, founded in 910 - clergy rule for centuries
- During the Bourbon monarchy's reign, the influence of the church waned.

↳ highlighted by the 1760 purchase of La Romanée Conti.
↳ moneyed middle class began to control vineyards as well; clergy needed to sell off for capital.

- 18th century - putting wine in glass under cork
- One the revolution was underway, religious + aristocratic landowners were dispossessed of their properties.
↳ resold in 1791

- 19th century - oidium, mildew + phylloxera
↳ 2008: recent vintage devastated by mildew + oidium
↳ phylloxera necessitated the replanting of vineyards
↳ in rows vs. proximity

- 1920s - 30s → economic misery: domaine bottling + cooperative movement took off.
→ some top vineyards came up for sale - JRC bought La Tâche, Henri Lemaire bought La Grand Rue, Mommessin bought Clos de Janf.

- 1970s - fertilisers changed the alkaline balance of the soils → more necessary to acidify than it is now.

two early authorities who predated the AOC system:

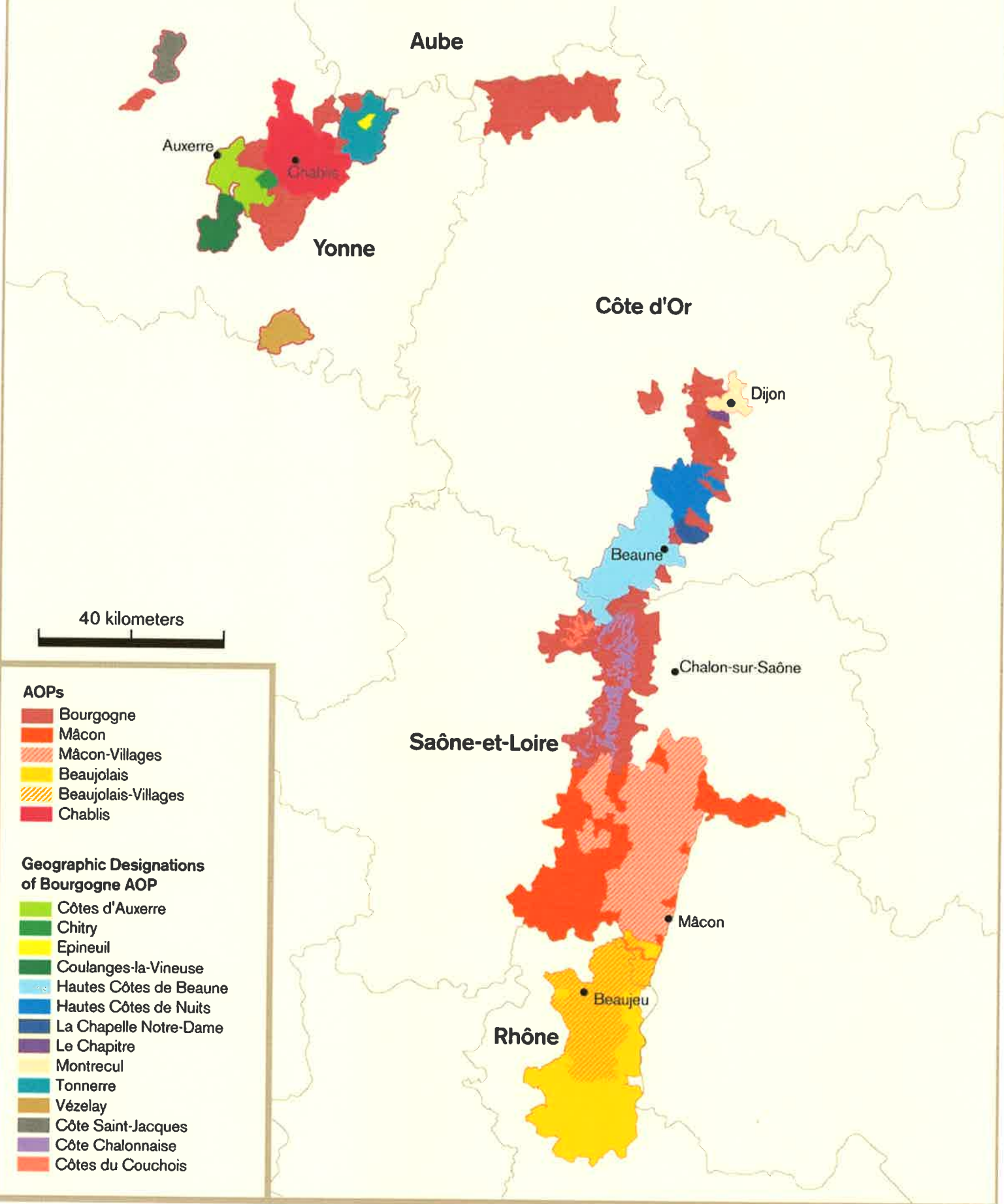

THE BURGUNDY WINE TRADE

- cooperatives are important in Mâconnais, Chalonais + Chablis
- lines b/w négociants & domaines becoming more blurred
 - ↳ Bichot, Bouhard, Drohin + Fairly + Jadot → all major landowners.
- Napoleonic laws - why more evident in Burgundy than elsewhere?
 - nature of vineyards - fragmented ownership to begin with.
 - all family owned + nothing is incorporated, like Bordeaux.

TERROIR

- basis of Burgundy - clay/limestone mix originating from the Jurassic period.
 - oolites are little particles/pellets of calcium carbonate.
- tectonic plates - arch upwards (anticline) at Gevrey + downwards (syncline) at Volnay.
- top soil - affects water retention, heat absorption + organic matter.
- Lime, as it weathers, breaks up & turns into clay
 - ↳ argilo-calcaire = clay-limestone
- majority of vineyards face E/SE.
 - ↳ in Chablis, a touch of west
- mid-slope is best
 - ↳ too high, too little top soil + too much wind
 - ↳ mid-slope - good exposure to sun & good drainage
 - ↳ foot of slope - heavy soils w/ no drainage
- RAIN
 - 93, 94 + 07 → exceptionally wet
 - 94, 02, 03, 05, 09 → exceptionally dry
 - drought is rarely a problem
- HAIL
 - 98, 01, 04 - all years of repeated hailstorms
 - also 12, 13, 14 all hit by hail
 - Marsannay + Volnay seem to be particularly vulnerable
 - worst time for hail is August or September
 - ↳ berries can rot
- FROSTS
 - 84, 85, '10 - winter frosts killing vines
 - spring frosts reduce crop - 91 + 98
- SUNSHINE/SUNBURN
 - an issue in 76, 83, 03, 98
 - rarely is lack of heat an issue, though 07 + 08 show some signs.

WHITE GRAPES

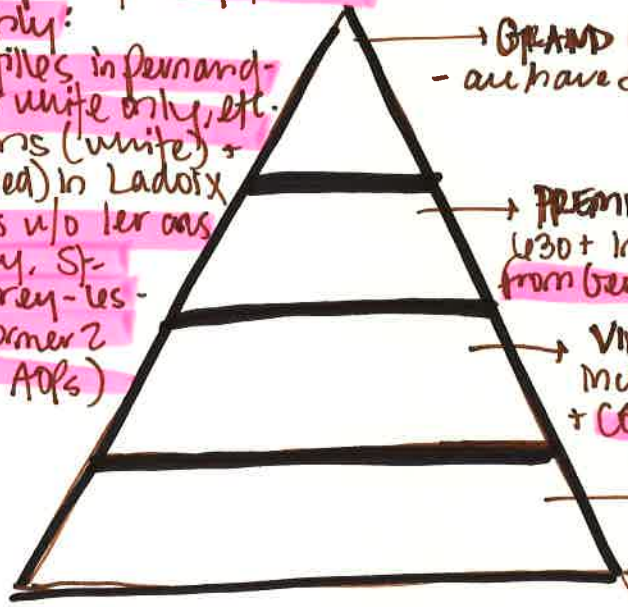
- clear juice is sought - pneumatic pressing & débarrage
- Chardonnay - Pinot Noir x Coulis Blanc
 - true of Aligoté, melon de Bourgogne + Sacy
 - "Beauvois" - synonym in the Auxerrois
 - didn't establish itself in Burgundy until the late 19th Century.
- Pinot Gris - aka Pinot Beurot, Fromenteau
- Pinot Blanc
- Aligoté

AOC

- early 19th century - tendency to cut cordons, use high-yielding vines, pass lesser vines off as greater - regulation was needed.
 - ↳ response to oidium, mildew + phylloxera
- today 100 Aops of Burgundy (premier cvs don't count as their own)

Recent trend - promotion of ter cvs for one color only:

- Sous-Frètilles in Pernand-Vergelesses for white only, etc.
- Les Grèchons (white) + Les Joyeuses (red) in Ladoix
- Only villages w/o ter cvs are Marsannay, St-Romain + Chorey-les-Beaune (the former 2 are post-war Aops)



- **GRAND CRUS:**
 - all have separate Aops - 33 total.
- **PREMIER CRUS:**
 - 430+ in Burgundy - codified in 1942 to protect from Germans
- **VILLAGE AOPS:**
 - includes all villages, plus Côte de Nuits + Côte de Beaune Villages, Petit Chablis
- **REGIONAL AOPS:**
 - includes Bourgogne, Mâcon, Mâcon-Villages, Coteaux de Nuits, Hautes-Côtes de Beaune, etc.

GRAND CRU FUN FACTS

- 33 total
- 7 specifically for white wine, remainder for red (though Musigny + Corton may produce white)
 - ↳ 7 for white, 2 for both, 24 for red
- 2 are fully interchangeable in terms of surface area - Chablis + Mazoyères-Chambertin
 - ↳ Chambertin-Clos de Père may be sold as Chambertin
- Corton may have vineyards appended to its name - Clos du Bois, Bressandes, Maréchaudes
 - ↳ Clos des Lambrays + La Grand Pire - not put forward by their owners at the time.
- single Aop for Chablis
- none: Volnay + NSG → abrogation of marquis d'Angenille + Henri Gouges

AOC

- grape varieties = up to 15% PG, PB + Chard. allowed in red wines
= Pinot Blanc allowed for white wines in the Cote d'Or
- yields = 1974 the laws changed, w/ each Aop being given its own yield requirements, w/ a tolerance of up to 20%. PLC (Plafond Limite de Classement)
 - = villages can opt to move to a ten year average
 - = PLC is now gone, w/ "RMD" (Rendement Moyen Decenal) being adopted by the Cote d'Or → 10 yr. average.

CÔTE DE NUITS

- the escarpment that forms the western flank of the plain of the River Saône
- D974 highway - formerly RN74

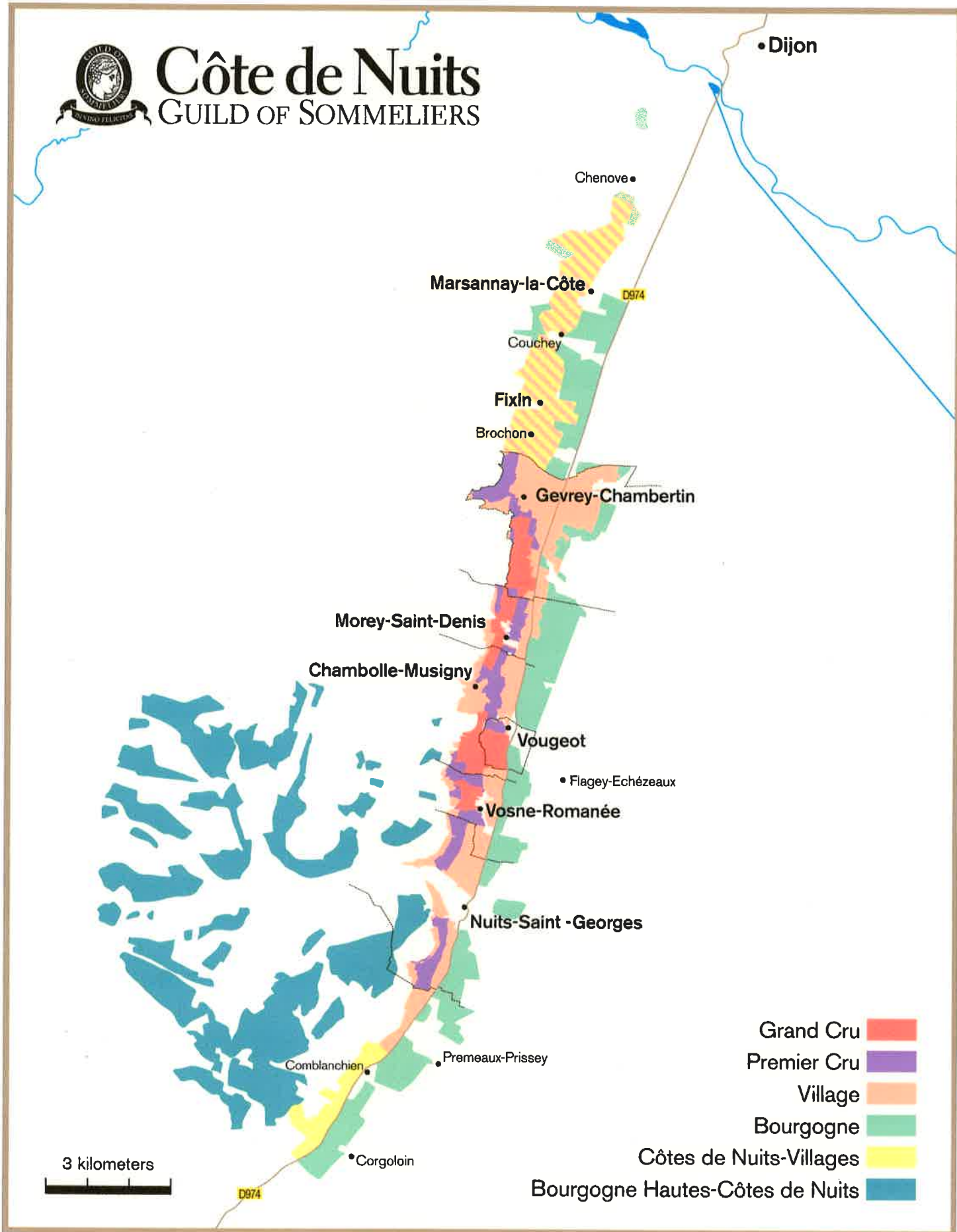
HANTES - CÔTES DE NUITS

- the rolling hills to the west of the Côte de Nuits (starting @ Vougeot, south through Corton)
- in previous centuries, Gamay reigned supreme here.
- In 2011, 699 hectares making 23,400 hectoliters of red wine + 6010 hectoliters of white wine.
- producers based here: David Duband, ^{Gilles}Jayet-Gilles, et al.
- producers w/ extensive holdings:
 - Anne Gros
 - Michel Gros
 - Thibault Liger-Belair

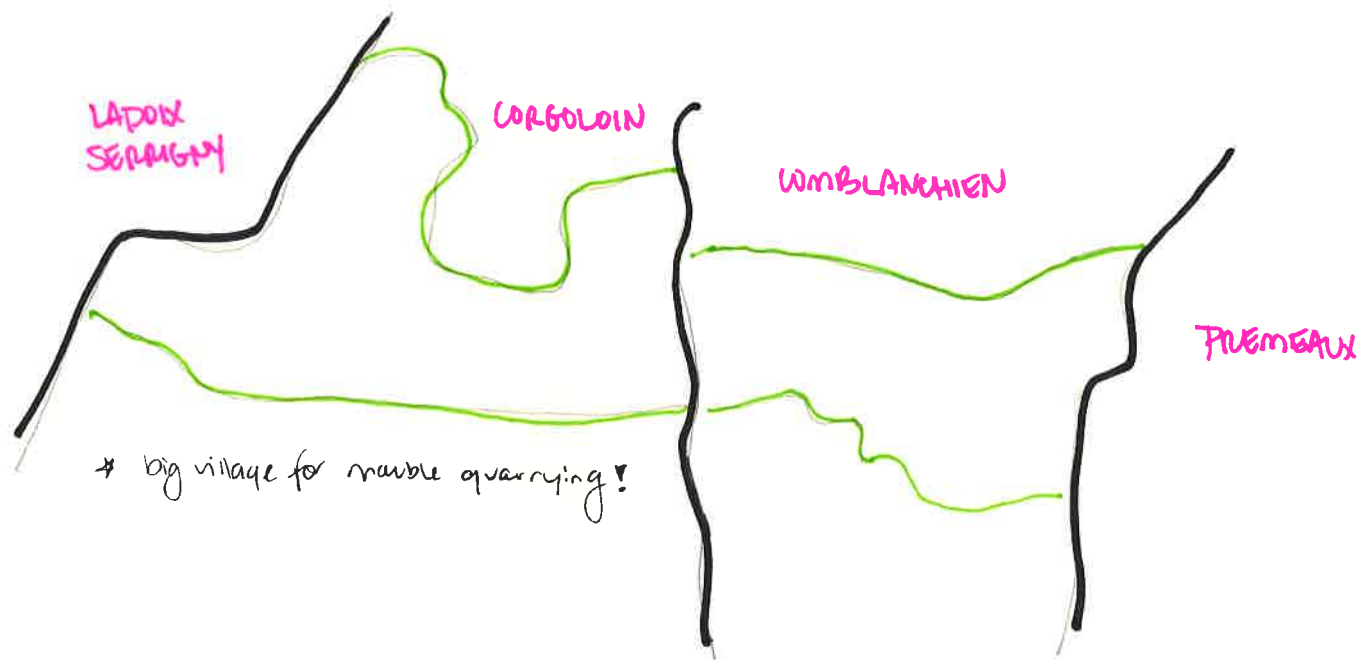
CÔTES DE NUITS VILLAGES

- vineyards that lie at the northern + southern ends of the Côte.

- Brochon - southern part qualifies as Gevrey-Chambertin
- Fixin - rarely bottled as CdN villages b/c it has its own AOP
- Premeaux - only 2 classified as CdN villages - most vineyards are NSG villages or 1er cr.



- dry red + white wines may be made

MARSANNAY

- communes: Marsannay-la-Côte, Chenôve + Couchay
- got its name on the map from rose
 - ↳ Joseph Clair-Dau re-introduced Pinot (previously dominated by Gamay) and started making rose in 1919.
- 1987 - gained top status (after being denied CdV villages) for blanc, rose + rouge.

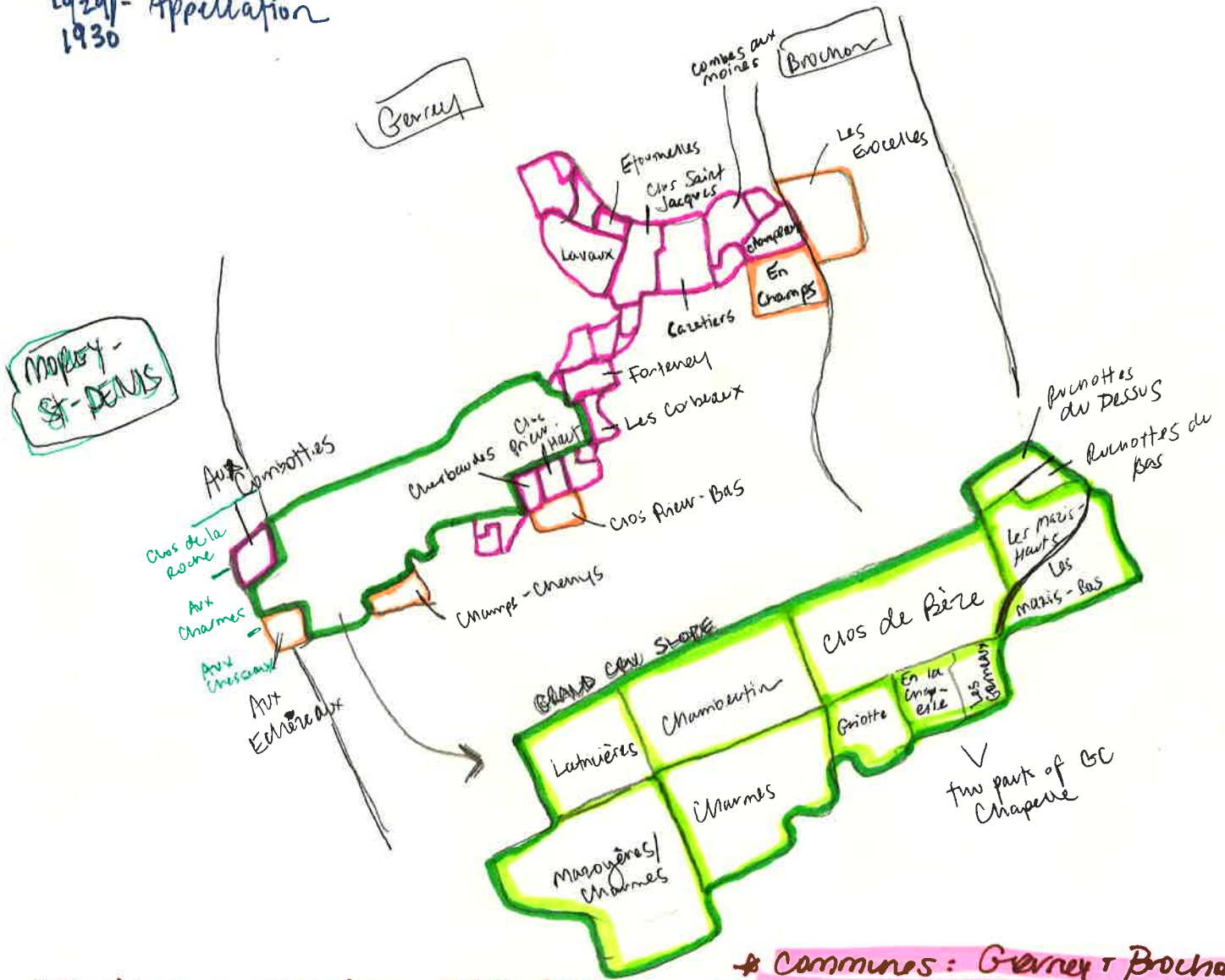

GEVREY-CHAMBERTIN

* villages G-C is unreliable - large amount is east of RN74.
 * rouge only

- The first village to re-brand itself by adding the suffix of its most famous vineyard. Became Gevrey-Chambertin in 1847.
- 1928 - Syndicat
- 1929 - Appellation
- 1930



- grand crus - mid-slope, 260-300m.
 - too much classified? Mazoyères + Chapelle rarely reach the heights of Lavaux + Saint-Jacques.
 - Latrières does best in warm years.
 - Ruchottes, Chapelle + Griottes all have so little top soil that they suffer in a dry year.
 - 2 main blocks of 1er crus:
 - Cote St-Jacques: La Boisserie, La Romanée, Les Verroilles, Lavaux - St-Jacques + Estournelles - St-Jacques, Caretters, Combe aux moine, Champaux
- * Communes: Gevrey + Brochon
 * Soil: brown limestone + marl!

GEVREY CHAMBERTIN

2. Surrounds the GCs - Combottes, Bel-Air, Les Issarts, Chazyrieux, etc.

Warmer than Chambertin - up to 10% more alcohol.

GC yields - 42 hl/ha (35 hl/ha prior to 2011)

- plots at top tend to be shaded by forest thinner in top soil.

- may be released as Chambertin - rarely in practice

- differences: slope more pronounced in Clos de Bèze, Chambertin has cooler breezes

convenient for those like Dijon, who own small plots in each.

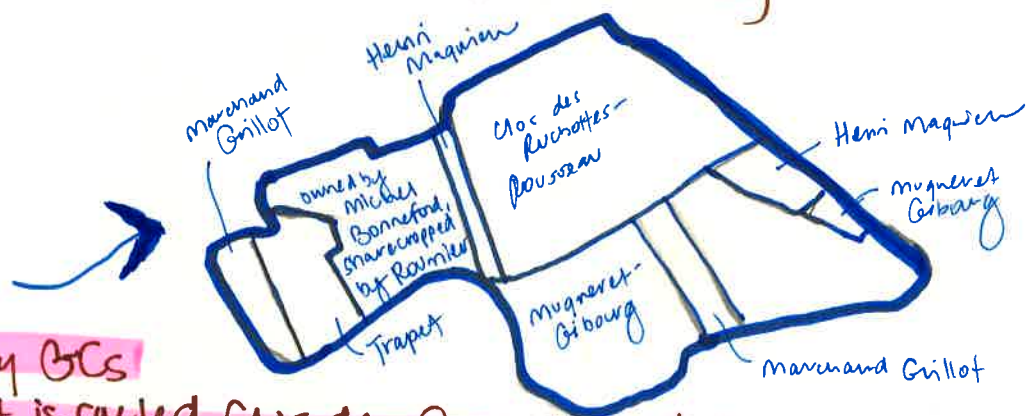

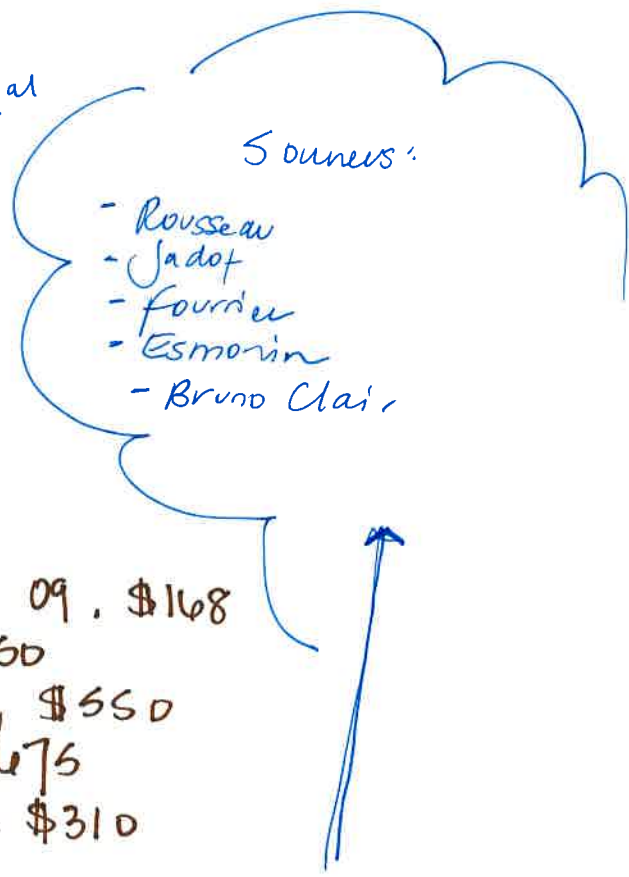

DOMAINE ARMAND ROUSSEAU

GEVREY CHAMBERTIN

- Armand Rousseau was at the forefront of domaine-bottling in the 1930s, he was succeeded by son Charles who was succeeded by son Eric who now runs the estate.
- Eric has changed little in the cellar, but a lot in the vineyards.
 - green harvesting
 - organic practices
- 100% destemmed
- only Chambertin + Clos de Beze see 100% new oak.
 - other BCs see 100% 1 y.o. oak
 - François Fures + Rousseau provide oak
 - Clos St. Jacques - new oak varies from 100% (2004) to 100% (2005)

- only a small dose of sulphur @ bottling.

- Jean-Marc took over the estate in 1994, from his father Jean-Claude, after internships w/ Henri Jayer + Domaine Drouhin (in Oregon)
- Jean-Marc increased domaine bottling to 100% and expanded the line ~~after~~ by bottling all ter crus separately.

GEVREY CHAMBERTIN

- Rose to fame w/ the 1993 vintage, at the age of 38.
- By all accounts, Moret was fiercely self-critical, and as he pushed harder, made wines of increasingly weight + opulence.
- Moret killed himself in 2006 (February) - last vintage was 2005.
- Son Arnaud is now running the estate, and wines are veering toward more elegance.
- A large and frustrating number of Gevrey villages cuvées: Combes Dessus, En Champs, Vieilles Vignes, En Motrot, En Derée + Au Velle.

- Clos de Tart
 - runs north/south instead of east/west
 - owned by the Notre-Dame de Tart from 1125 until French Revolution (1791)
 - monopole of the négociant Mommessin - purchased in 1932
 - owned by the Marey-Monge family w/ 1791 - 1932
 - estate was regenerated w/ the appointment of Sylvain Pithot in 1994
- Bonnes Mares
 - only 3.74 ha. in Money - Saint-Denis
 - Louis Jadot + Mommessin (on the marey side)

→ now owned by François Pinault

- La Bussière - monopole of Roumier, labeled "Clos de la Bussière"
 - 2008, \$202

Mont Luisants

- 1911 - William Ponsot replants 1 ha of Mont Luisants w/ Arigote
- 1930s - Hippolyte Ponsot plants Pinot Gris (Pinot Noir degenerated into Pinot Blanc)
- 1950s - Jean-Marie Ponsot plants Chardonnay - 20% Chard, 80% Arigote + 20% PB.
- 1992 - PB was ripped up

- In 2002, the company was bought by an American consortium including Ann Colgin. Wines began being made in a much more modern style.

HOSPICES DE BEAUNE

BEAUNE

- In 1443 the Hotel Dieu was built in Beaune, a site which would become the charitable hospital Hospices de Beaune.
- many donors have bequeathed vineyards ~~to~~ to the Hospices over the years.
- In 1859 for the first time, the new vintage from these holdings was sold at auction.
- Now held the third Sunday in November every year (for that vintage!)
- In 2005, Christie's took over the auctioneering.
- Cuvées are often named after benefactors of famous historical figures.

LOUIS JADOT

BEAUNE

- founded in 1859, though the family were already vigneron in the region, acquiring Clos des Ursules in 1829.
