Nannies are educators, too!

Action Research: Contextualized Professional Development for Home-Based Carer-Educators

What We Know: Background

- We know very little about nannies, and almost nothing about nannies as professionals.
- Nannies have been marginalized as a working population, and further many individual nannies experience marginalization + intersectionalities in their lived experience as workers.

The Knowledge Gap

- No study had been conducted with the perspective of the population itself, but only research centering outsider perspectives and evaluations.
- This action research project was conceived and executed by a professional career nanny, at the request of other nannies and in authentic collaboration with them.

Methods

- More than 100 nanny participants cocreated a brand-new data set, which included documenting their image of the child at the start and again at the end of the professional development course day, after interacting with the course content.
- Documentation of the image of the child was analyzed thematically according to seeing the child as competent, and seeing the child as a partner in teaching and learning (vs. seeing teaching as a powerover dynamic).

RESULTS:

Participants' image of the child showed

image of the child from 34.9% to 67.0%

+

DECREASE in NEGATIVE image of the child from

15.6% to 3.5%

Why This Matters

- These shifts represent a stunning evolution and growth in the participating nannies' evidence-based image of the child after experiencing just one single day of contextualized professional development instruction.
- As a professional field, ECEC is missing out on supporting the development of these faceless but dedicated, intelligent, and enthusiastic early childhood professionals.
