It went very well and we have been asked by the library to put on the same class again next winter.

Later in February, Dennis O'Brien and myself put on another fly tying class at the Vernon District Library. In the two nights of class we had a total of 7 people attending who enjoyed learning to tie several flies. In both locations we had several children that attended the class.

Local Fly Fishing Opportunities By: Mark Johnson

I have had a few requests lately from members asking about local Mid-Michigan areas to fly fish so I thought I would try to supply a little input from other members that I know do fish locally. This will be somewhat of a summary of comments from members about some of their local areas to try. I would like to thank the following members for their input in helping with this article. Bob Ceru, Harry Barnes, Bonnie Barnes, Don Sawyer, John Ross and Dave Hovis all contributed some information to this article.

Before I start, I would like to mention that there is a great local fishing access map as a resource for all of you to use. It was the one that The Red Cedar Fly Fishers donated money to a few years back to help print. There are copies of it still around, but I do have a PDF file of the map if anyone would like to have it. It is a rather larger file, I0-I2 megabytes I believe, so I will not attach it to the email with the newsletter as it may be too large to go into some email servers. If you would like a copy of it, please send an email request to me (Where this newsletter was sent from) and I will send it back to you. I hope some of the comments below help you in your search for new places to fish.

-I have always been told that the upper Shiawassee is still some of the best smallmouth fishing waters in the area. I know that Schultz outfitters uses that stretch for some guided smallmouth bass fishing.

I was talking to the guys from Schultz outfitters at the last fly fishing expo and they told me about how before the dams were demolished; the Shiawassee used to do "kill" tournaments because there were so many smallmouth in the river.

I have also been told that there are some nice pike and carp in the river as well. The local schools do release salmon in the river somewhere north of Owosso. The US Fish and Wildlife Service are also releasing sturgeon in the Shiawassee River in the same area they release the salmon.

Another river in the area I've heard great things about is the Flint River. I've heard good things about the northern section in the flushing area.

Local Fly Fishing Opportunities Continued

-I used to fish the Flat River near Smyrna for smallmouth. I tried to find the same location last year but couldn't find it. It was fairly low water, and a spruce fly was deadly. I also fished the Flat near Whites covered bridge. I noticed on the map that there's a boat launch now in that area. I've been told several times that the Grand River in the Portland state game area is excellent. I know I went there a few times, but nothing really stands out now. Bonnie and I float tube Crandall Lake on M-50 near Charlotte. It's supposed to be catch and release fishing, but either the fish are awfully slow growing, or they've not being released. The nice part is there are no motors, not many people, and there are some nice bluegills.

-I fish in the Grand River most of the time. I have a couple areas near Eaton Rapids that are good access for boat or kayak anglers. Primarily smallmouth and pike. I like white, or white with red or chartreuse, streamer type patterns. Topwater's also work well if the water is warm enough. For good wade fishing there are some spots near Holt and Dimondale. The bridges on Waverly south of Holt Road, and M-99 south of I-96 have good wadable water that can produce some nice smallmouth fishing. West of Lansing all the way to Ionia the Grand River has good wade fishing also. Lots of areas to access and most of it can be waded if the water is at normal summer flows. I like to fish for Pike near Laingsburg on the Looking Glass. Access is challenging though because of a lack of public land. Babcock Rd has a boat/kayak launch for small craft. Not very wadable. It gets really weedy as summer progresses, but if you want to fight your way through the weeds and go upstream a ways it can produce good fish when they feel like biting. (Pike can be very moody). There are places further downstream towards Dewitt and west toward Portland where you can get in and wade. The Looking Glass has generally smaller fish than the Grand, but if you find a deeper hole you may get a decent one or two.

- Near here, Thornapple Lake southeast of Grand Rapids and Grand River near Dimondale. Need a boat for transportation, some wading. Also, Terry Greiner when he was younger would wade the Grand River a mile above the access below Charlotte Hwy bridge for Smallmouth. The road escapes me ---Erdman I think but Terry found a road access upstream from the launch.

-Fitzgerald Park in Grand Ledge below the dam there can provide some fly fishing opportunities. Also, parts of the Looking Glass River East and West of DeWitt I have fished in the past with a mixed bag of species there. Also, have

fished at Park Lake in Bath several times. It has a good population of Largemouth Bass to target as well as smaller bluegills. This lake gets weedy later in the summer and is not suitable for wading to get to the better areas which are farther across the lake from the boat launch there. A float tube or kayak is advisable.

Check it out.



What's unsaid: "... s long as you still haven't mastered third-grade arithmetic."


What's said: "I've never seen anybody tie a fly like that."
