

HARRY'S HANDY HINTS: On a recent fishing trip, I (hopefully) relearned one of my earliest lessons. That is, a rising fish in late season can usually be taken on a good terrestrial pattern. On this particular trip the best ones were ants and beetles. The Letort or Crowe beetle was the pattern we used, but I was continually frustrated over their lack of durability. Some fall apart after only one fish and others fall apart (space reserved for ed's error: ed) just casting. Each night I'd tie three or four, and catch one or two fish on them the next day. One or two fish is better than none, but I was looking for a better way to go.

On the trip home I picked up the October issue of "Fly Fishing the West" and found what may be a good alternative to the deer hair construction of the Crowe Beetle: polypropylene. It will certainly be more durable.

The tying is as follows:

- 1. Tie a piece of black polypropylene yarn on the hook extending beyond the bend about an inch.
- 2. Dub a bocy of Fly Rite or similar material.
- 3. Take one or two truns of hackle about 1/4 of the way back from the hook eye.
- 4. Pull the yarn forward and tie it down at the eye. Trim the head in the manner of the Crowe Beetle.

 Generally the Beetle is tied in sizes 12-16. Harry Barnes


