



Foreword

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Class History

It all started way back in '40 when a few grammar schools got together and deported all their undesirables to form the Class of '44. Two hundred strong, we entered the turnstiles of C. H. S. and took our seats in the tropical region known as the balcony. There, week after week, we perspired through Friday assemblies. Financially, we started the year off with a bang. Deanna Durbin sang our way to riches in "Spring Fever" at the Carteret Cinema, the Ritz. Our affairs were in the capable hands of Robert Shanley, Vera Ginda, Audrey Burke and Julian Pruitt. Mrs. Hausner (then Miss Venook) and Mrs. George were drafted to care for our class and to act as wardens, oops, I mean advisers. Together we faced danger, hardship and—the upper classmen. At last we came to the end of our freshman year; we could hardly wait until we became sophomores.

We then advanced to the back seats of the auditorium. There, we remained for a year. We elected Edward Kolibas, John Kolibas, Jr., Marie Sidun and Julian Pruitt to preside over our destinies. Since we had made such a success of our freshman year, we decided to take it easy as sophomores so we didn't have an activity at all. Gee, how we wished we were juniors! We didn't have to wish long. We drove our sophomore homeroom teachers mad, and we were forced to migrate into the junior rooms. Phyllis Chodosh, Joseph Sabo, John Kolibas, Jr., and Vera Ginda led us through our really big year. We gave a play called "Stage Door," which was a huge success; it ran for three

performances. We wanted to present Mickey Rooney in person but we couldn't afford it. We started to make a name for ourselves in sports and other activities—our water boys were the best in the state. All this time we kept our eyes on those front seats. We looked forward to the day when he could see a movie. Gee, we wished we were seniors!

1943 brought the war in full force. We elected Robert Shutello, president; Catherine Fedorcsak, vice-president; Harold Edwards, treasurer; and Gladys Meltreder, secretary. We wanted our prom early because we knew that many of our boys would be leaving. We had it December 10, the earliest date in the history of C. H. S., and it was a gala affair. We presented "What a Life." It ran for two performances. We spread Christmas cheer by selling Christmas cards. In all our undertakings, we were very successful.

Although we entered high school happy golucky and not entirely mature, we think of years past with a deep reverence and appreciation for our school. Now we remember all those little things that mean so much to us, as we are leaving. We look back and recall with sadness the death of Alfred Guimond in our freshman year. We note the diminishing ranks of our boy students as they file out for war and war education. We remember friendship and thoughtfulness, obedience and disobedience, laughter and tears. And as we say goodbye to our teachers, desks, rooms, books, and friends, each says with all his heart, "I wish I were a freshman!!!"
