Class History

Suddenly I was fully awakened by a lively commercial. But it was wasted on me, because I began to think of the fun I had when I was a freshman. Slowly, my eyes closed; my mind started to spin; I was wandering again in the land of Morpheus. Instead of my comfortable parlor chair, a hardbacked, uncomfortable seat in the assembly at C.H.S. was my throne. On the stage were my classmates cavorting in the Sophomore Carnival. Everyone seemed to be enjoying himself, especially Tony Spumoni, who captivated the audience with his boisterous antics. I awoke again—this time it was the telephone (wrong number!). I settled myself again; my thoughts traveled back to my sophomore year. Now we had arrived—we were an important group in our school.

Again I dozed, and again I dreamed. It was the year 1949. Ah! What memories! Juniors at last! This year was one of the most eventful years in the glorious history of Carteret High School. Dolores Neder was elected president of our class; the other officers were Richard Mandichak, John Nagy, and Emma Fedorco. We held a card party that year. Miss Kelly and Miss Wilson were tireless in their efforts to make this, as well as all our other events, very successful. Our junior play, "Meet Me in St. Louis," was highly lauded. Many thought it the best play ever presented at C.H.S. There was much ado that year over Junior Prom, but it proved to be an outstanding success—a superb example of what careful planning can accomplish. Everyone who attended it enjoyed himself.

In our junior year, too, John Little added new laurels-he received the John Markowitz Memorial Trophy for his football achievements. He was also chosen as our representative to Boys' State; Agnes Capik, attended Girls' State, and Irene Rakovic went to N.J.C. for a week through the efforts of the American Legion Auxiliary and the Woman's Club. In May the Student Council elections were held, and John Little was elected president. Hugo Marocchi was a very close second in a heated campaign. Marlena Lozak was a surprise victor in the vice-presidency race, which was also close. Three of our number-Charlie Russo, Micky Litus, and Bob Curran-left in our junior year to join the service.

In June, the Honor Society was inaugurated in C.H.S. Four juniors were chosen because of their superiority in scholarship, leadership, service, and character. These students were John Little, Florence Minue, Stephen Bilinsky, and Charles Kereluik. Our junior year will never be forgotten because of the brilliant achievements of our members.

My dream became rather somber. This time a cloud seemed to hang over me; gone was the joy that had pervaded the other three years, probably because we knew that very shortly we were going to leave C.H.S. Our happy school days would soon be over and we would have to go out into the world to earn a living. Dolores Neder was again elected president, thus establishing a precedent in C.H.S. annals. Ralph Russo was chosen vice-president; John Nagy, secretary; and Florence Minue, treasurer.



All in all, it was a great day! John Little and Hugo Marocchi made the All-County Football team. Lou Tami was honored with the John Markowitz Memorial Trophy.

In March, a delegation headed by Mr. F. E. Stengel ("Happy") surveyed the finest student body in the state of New Jersey. At long last there were new shades for everybody except Mr. Donatiello. Mr. Waron and Miss Kramer entertained with one of their usual outstanding performances. The visiting committee appeared to be favorably impressed.

I awoke—my dream was over—so was the movie! I shall never know what the movie was, but I shall never forget our four wonderful years in Carteret High.

PERTH AMBOY vs. CARTERET

The annual Turkey Day game between the Ramblers and Panthers was played at Perth Amboy before a crowd estimated at 6.000.

First Quarter: This period produced quite a bit of bruising line play, with the Ramblers getting the better of it.

Second Quarter: With Frankie Medvetz doing the throwing and Ronnie Medvetz doing the catching, the Ramblers stopped the drive on the 16 yard line. After an exchange of punts, Amboy was backed up to their one-yard line on a 60 yard kick by Hugo Marocchi. On an attempted end run, Bob Pusillo tackled the Amboy player behind the goal line for a safety. An that was the margin at half time 2-0.

Third Quarter: By now the people were rubbing their eyes in utter amazement, as Carteret was shoving the highly favored Amboy team all over the field. With Little and Marocchi doing the carrying, the Ramblers brought the ball to the one-yard line from where Frankie Medvetz took it over on a quarterback sneak. The try for extra point was good and the score stood at 9-0. The Panthers took advantage of a good break as they recovered a Carteret fumble on the 27 yard line. In three plays they had a touchdown and the score was then 9-6. The period ended shortly thereafter.

Fourth Quarter: Proving that he is a great quarterback. Frank Medvetz took charge and threw and ran the team down to the six-yard line. There Johnny Little took it over on two plunges. Then Hugo Marocchi took over with his educated toe. He kicked the ball out of bounds in the coffin corner time and time again. Thus setting up the last two safeties for Carteret, which brought the final score to 19-6.

UNION vs. CARTERET

The Ramblers started off their 1950 football season by playing a heavily favored Union team to a 12-12 tie. With Union ahead 6-0, Carteret recovered a fumble deep in Union territory. Carteret tied the score as Medvetz threw the ball to Pusillo for the touchdown.

Early in the last quarter, with the Ramblers once again behind, Medvetz threw a long pass to Marocchi, who caught it and took it to the one-yard line. On the next play Dominguez plunged over for the tying touchdown. Carteret 12-Union 12.

LONG BRANCH vs. CARTERET

In the opening home game the Ramblers scored a 7-0 win over Long Branch. Carteret's scoring drive started on their own 42-yard line. The drive was climaxed by a beautiful 30-yard pass, Medvetz to Marocchi. Marocchi made a spectacular catch at the 5-yard line while being cross-bodied in mid-air by a Long Branch defender, and scored as he walked a tightwire along the sideline.

The extra point was made on a pass from Medvetz to Pusillo. Carteret 7-Long Branch 0.

SAYREVILLE vs. CARTERET

With a great display of aerial power, Carteret High's Ramblers stopped a hard fighting Sayreville team 13-6.

After the Bombers had taken a 6-0 lead on a 50-yard scoring play, the Ramblers really started moving. Taking over on their own 35, they brought the ball down to the Bombers' two-yard line on two passes, Medvetz to Little and Medvetz to Marocchi. Little then skirted end for the remaining 12 yards. The score at that point was 6-6.

Late in the third quarter Sayreville attempted to kick out of danger, but the kick was blocked by Bob Pusillo, who also recovered on Sayreville's 25-yard line. A series of ground plays brought the ball down to the one-yard line. There Medvetz took it over on a quarterback sneak. A pass from Kaskiw to Marocchi was good for the extra point. Carteret 13-Sayreville 6.

LINDEN vs. CARTERET

Carteret scored its third straight victory as the Ramblers nipped Linden 13-7.

With the score at half time 7-6, in favor of Linden, things did not look too bright for Carteret; but an aroused and inspired team took the field for the second half. Early in the third quarter Linden was forced to kick, deep in their own territory; hut they forgot one thing, to block out Ronnie Medvetz. Ronnie came charging in, blocked the kick, and recovered the ball on Linden's one-yard line. On the next play, Frank Medvetz took the ball over on a quarterback sneak. A pass from Kaskiw to Marocchi was good for the extra point. Carteret 13—Linden 7.

SOUTH RIVER vs. CARTERET

Well, it finally happened! The Ramblers lost! Not taking any credit away from the Ramblers, they were just outfought and outcharged by an inspired team from South River. It was no contest after the first half as the Maroons took a 26-0 lead.


