We had such famous personalities as Shirley Elko and Charlotte Kling, pianists; Matilda Moras and Juanita Gago, vocalists; Mac and Bob, mimics—all performing at our station. Breaking all precedents, we held our first station at C.H.S. Starlight Room. June came at last, and, wearied by our daily grind, we set out for Florida to recuperate.

The warm sunny days of summer sped by too quickly, and before we knew it another September was upon us, and we were embarking upon another year at our CHS, station. After electing Herbert Kaplan head man with the records, we chose Helen Peter, James Foxe, and Eleanor Rakovic, to assist him, then we started business. Our second year was somewhat uneventful; we failed to cut any new records, but we replayed some of the old ones, such as "Big Movie Show In The Sky" and "Look, Ma, I'm Dancing." Our mobile units covered the championship game between Carteret and Matawan at Asbury Park. We won, only to be eliminated in the state finals. Some of our boys at the station received awards for their athletic achievements. Ending the year well in the black, we again took our annual leave to prepare for our third year on

Well, two years had come and gone. Once again we were back, but this time with the mike a little higher. We felt as a high school junior might feel when he becomes aware of the fact that he is an upper classman. This year our platter spinner was Vincent Gormley, who was ably assisted by Gloria Travostino, Robert

Williamson, and Arlene Uhouse. This was our most prosperous year.

We presented a station play. The play, "Our Miss Brooks," featured our own Betty Toth as Miss Brooks. It was acclaimed by critics as the play of the year. Along came spring. The highlight of this season was the prom, which we held in our own Oriental Room. Music was furnished by Baron Bobick's famous band. Then came the time for the selection of our representatives to Girls' State and Boys' State. The committee wholeheartedly agreed on Sally Ann Gasior and Herbert Kaplan. June was just around the corner. Exams, farewells, and then vacation again. Imagine! We had been spinning discs for three whole years.

Well, Time marches on, and, too soon, along came September, the beginning of what proved to be our most glorious year. Once again, our man behind the controls was Vincent Gormley, with John Bosze, James Foxe, and Helen Peter rounding things out. From the look of things, any four-year man without a car was definitely in the minority. In the field of athletics, one of our numbers, Ron Medvetz, made the first team all-county squad in football, and Howard Rozzelle was named to the second team all-county basketball squad.

The second station play, "Seven Sisters," won the acclaim of the critics as the first had done. The play starred Eleanor Rakovic and Al Makkai. We had a farewell dance. We went on a trip to celebrate our four years in business.

On Sunday, June 8, we broadcast the C.H.S. Baccalaureate exercises. Later in the month, we established another precedent by having the C.H.S. graduation on the air.
