## FOOTBALL

## Rahway-September 27, 1952

A confident Carteret club traveled to Rahway to engage a strong Rahway team. Carteret scored first when Tom Lawlor, outstanding left end, scooped up a fumble and outdistanced a speedy Rahway pursuer. With seconds to go in the first half, Rahway scored on a desperation pass into the end zone. Late in the fourth quarter, this strong Union county club scored their final touchdown on another long pass play. The Ramblers' stubborn defense was sparked by Tom Lawlor, an All-State end.

## Union-October 4, 1952

Suffering a letdown, and hampered by the loss of three regulars, Carteret succumbed to an inferior foe. A blocked kick gave Union the ball deep in Carteret territory. A number of charges through the middle of our forward wall resulted in a Union touchdown. Hampered by numerous penalties, the Rambler defense buckled and the Farmers pushed across another touchdown. Late in the final period, the Ramblers drove the entire length of the field to push over a meaningless score. Iou Kasha circled right end from six yards out for the touchdown. The bright spots for Carteret were the outstanding charges of Dick Czajkowski and the defensive work of Bob D'Zurilla.

Long Branch-October 11, 1952
A powerful, undefeated Long Branch ball club, sparked by the offensive thrusts of Howie Williams, marched over a spirited but overmatched Rambler club. Carteret fans were impressed by
the tine play of their two fine guards, Joe Melick and Jim Gilrain.

## Sayreville-October 17, 1952

Coach Doug King's Ramblers played their first night game in three years. They found it very much to their liking as they downed a previously undefeated Sayreville team. Taking advantage of a Rambler fumble, Sayreville tallied tirst as Paul llerrick went off tackle from the five-yard line. The Kingmen bounced back as Dick Czajkowski scored on a beautiful thirty yard run, after taking a pitchout from Joe Medvetz. The second half was featured by the beautiful broken field running of Lou Kasha. Late in the third quarter, after a sustained drive, Kasha wormed his way over from the five. The last period was a battle of the two strong defenses. Although the whole team played good ball, the offensive feats of Czajkowski and Kasha were the talk of the county sports circles.

## Linden-October 25, 1952

The Ramblers rambled to their second straight victory at the expense of a baffled Linclen aggregation. In the first period, the Ramblers broke the ice as Joe Medvetz's pass floated into the waiting arms of Tommy Lawlor in the end zone. Early in the second period, climaxing a downfied drive, Joe Medvetz circled. his own left end on an option play and romped ummolested to paydirt. Both offenses stalled in the second half as the defenses strengthened. Outstanding in this Rambier victory were two
fine Joes, Melick and Medvetz. Time after time, Melick spilled linden ball carriers hehind the line of scrimmage. Offensively, it was the fine signal calling and passing of Medvetz.

## South River-November 1, 1952

Two spirited county ball clubs clashed at Camphell field before a large gathering. The first break of the game came when, after a bad pass from center, Sid Robinson circled Carteret's left end for a twenty-five yard gain, setting up the Maroon's first score. It was stricily a defensive battle on the part of the Dennymen, stopping several Carteret drives wthin the ten yard line. In the fourth quarter, cutting through substitute linemen, Bill Petry scampered forty yards for the final score of the ball gane. Tom Gibson and Frank Peter played the best games of their careers, their many scintillating catches thrilling the crowd.

## W'oodhridge- November 8, 1952

The Carteret Ramblers, superior in every department of play, completely stymied the Woodbridge offenses with consistent line play. Bob lleyers, mashing through the Woodbridge forward wall, smothered Pat Lamberti's punt on the Barron's nine yard line, with Boh Kent recovering the ball. With eight seconds remaining in the half. Carteret lined up in a field goal formation. Woodbridge, unaware of Boh Andres' passing ability, was completely fooled by a pass to Tom Gibson in the end zone. The second halt was a battle of two huge forward walls. Coach Doug King was especially pleased with the all-around play of Bob deyers and Tom Gibson.

Bound Brook-November 15, 1952
After forty-eight minutes of bruising football on a rain-soaked
turf, Bound Brook emerged victorious by a one point margin. Early in the first quarter, Tom Gibson pulled down a Medvetz aerial in the end zone. The Crusaders bounced back quickly on a downfield drive, featuring the running of Ken Washington, who climaxed the effort by scoring from the ten. In the third quarter, a long pass set up the visitor's second score. The Ramblers, in an effort to tie the game, pushed over a score midway in the final period, with Lou Kasha scoring on a fifteen yard end run. However, Bob D'Zurilla's conversion attempt was blocked by the entire Bound Brook line. The charges of Ken Washington through the middle of the Rambler line were turned back time after time by Bob D'Zurilla and Boh Meyers.

## Perth Amboy-November 27, 1952

In a fumble-filled game, the Carteret Ramblers were edged by the Panthers of Perth Amboy. In the first quarter the kingmen came up with some fine defensive play to thwart Perth Amboy within the ten yard line. The Carteret offense perked up in the second quarter and kept the State Street eleven penned up in their own territory. Just before halt-time, Joe Medvetz carried the ball to the Panther goal line before being tackled. The decision that no touchdown was scored was disputed by the entire Rambler club. The tension mounted in the second half when neither club was able to score. Finally, with three minutes to go in the contest, Perth Amboy scored when Bob Gatyas took a flat pass from Nick Mauro and ran five yards for a score. Bob Andres was responsible for most of Carteret's ground gains, while Tom Lawlor was outstanding on both offense and defense.
