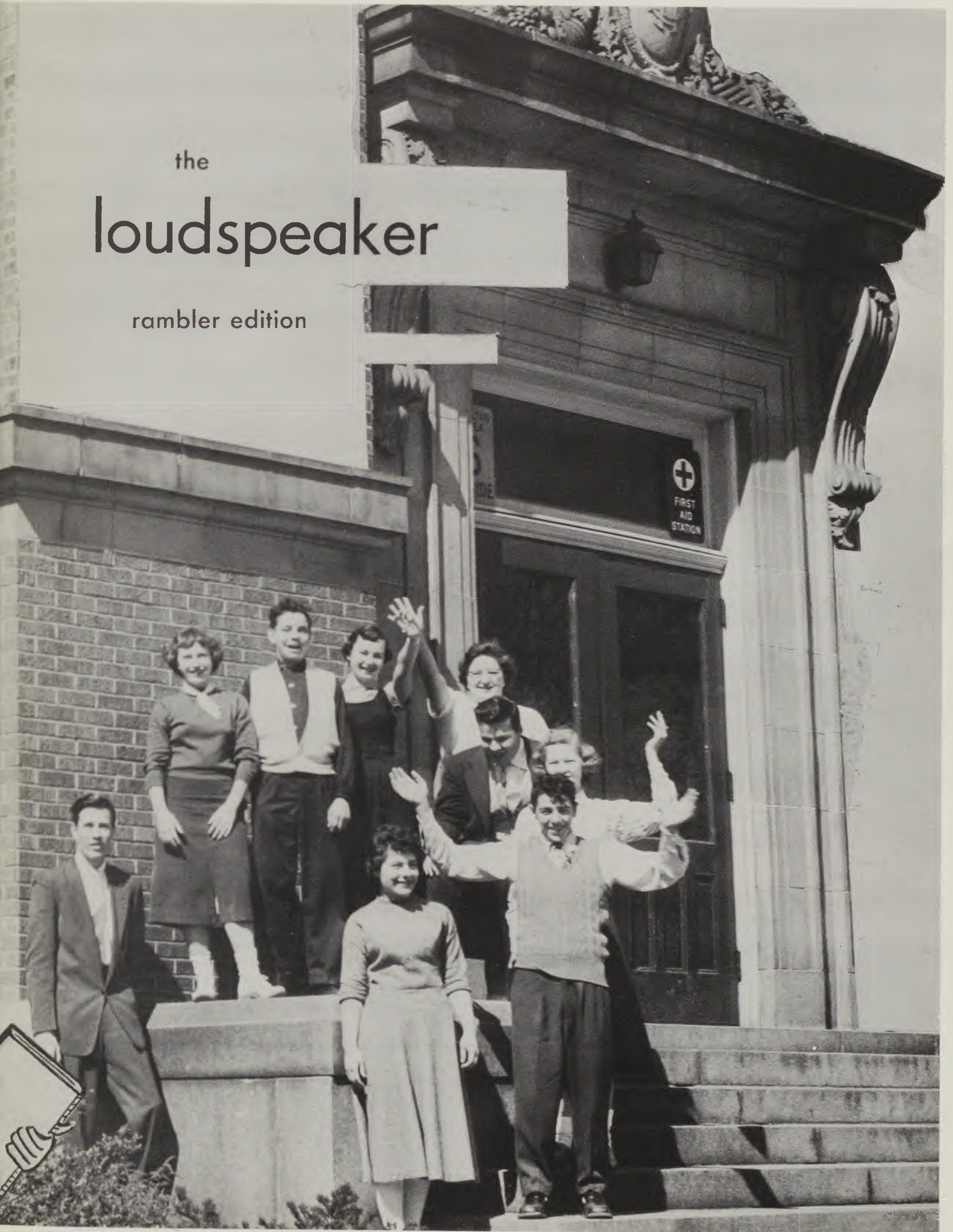
We are proud to record in the 1955 edition of the Loud-speaker the visit of Melvin the Martian.
