election reform

- **reform laws and policies that disadvantage 3rd party candidates**
- **proportional representation** = use multi-party government as in most of Europe

A

election reform

- **end voter restrictions** = end the requirement of government-issued photo identification & restriction of early voting (restrictions benefit republicans)
- **increase federal oversight of election processes**

election reform

- **increase state regulation in voting process** = require government-issued photo identification and purge names of people that fail to vote or update their registration, ostensibly to combat voter fraud

- **reform laws and policies that disadvantage 3rd party candidates**
- **voter non-participation** = some of the right-leaning anti-establishment people believe voting reinforces existing injustices and that non-participation en mass would be the most politically powerful act
