about immigration policy

- Some businesses employ illegal immigrants because they will work for less, especially in agriculture where producers say they can't compete if required to pay a legal minimum wage. Should work permits be seasonal for agriculture?
- Work permits ensure illegals are not exploited, are taxed, and have access to basic public services such as public health clinics. Should these be more easily available?
- Should the U.S. help Latin-American nations alleviate their dangers that drive illegal immigration?
- Should children of illegal immigrants be denied legal citizenship when born in the United States?
- When should the U.S. accept refugees from war-torn nations? How many?
- Should the U.S. deny entry to those from nations that "harbor terrorists"? What other means could identify and restrict threats?

immigration

- **work permits** = permanent border passes; make an earned path to legalization easier to access

immigration

- **toughen fines on employers** = immigrants will seek a legal path to work in U.S. if employers offer work only to those documented

immigration

- **build a wall** = make it harder for illegal immigrants to enter the southern U.S. border
- **toughen deportation** = active search for undocumented immigrants
- **seasonal work permits** = temporary border passes

A

immigration

- **work permits** = permanent border passes
- **closed borders** = altho the open borders position is more consistent with this party's ideology overall, many with a right-leaning anti-establishment stance prefer closed borders and active deportation
