Craftsman homes feel warm and handcrafted. Their wide porches, tapered columns, and natural materials create instant curb appeal. Inside, built-ins and woodwork make the home feel personal and cozy. These homes appeal to buyers who want character, charm and thoughtful details from a bygone era.

Potentially a good fit for families, character lovers, entertainers, hobbyists and pet owners. Consider that there may be more exterior maintenance and that the staircase is similar in the number of steps to a 2-story home, 10-14 steps.
