A Note About This Study...

These "all-in-one" study packets were born out of struggle for me. Soon after I had my second baby I realized that at that season of my life, I needed simplicity if I was going to be consistent in my devotional life. I might pull out my Bible and notebook, open everything up, copy the Scripture reference down onto paper, and begin to read and make notes, only to be interrupted by a toddler or a newborn. When I came back to study later I would not even remember where I was in the passage, and even the effort it took to pull out my resources, looking back and forth from notebook to Bible, seemed to be too much.

So, in a rare moment of ingenuity for a postpartum brain, I thought maybe if I printed out the Scripture I was studying on paper, added some wide margins, and kept it on the kitchen table throughout the day, it might just eliminate some of those hindrances. I could write directly on the passage, so that I would always know exactly where I was in the study. I would always be able to see what I had just studied and observed. I didn't have the self-imposed guilt of writing a new date in my journal and seeing the gap from the last one. It just made things more simple. And...it worked! This format was a lifesaver for me during those chaotic days, and even as my seasons have change I still have grown to love this method.

This study is the same format – wide margins, triple spaced – so that you can keep track of your observations and insights all in one place. I have added some guiding questions in the margins, but don't feel limited to those. Observe the passage for details. Circle, underline, or highlight words and ideas that are repeated or emphasized. Look up definitions of unfamiliar terms and jot down their meaning. Think about other passages that relate to what you are reading. Ask what the passage is teaching about God. If you are not confident in studying the Word of God in this way, please consider reading a book like *Women of the Word* by Jen Wilkin.
