I'm going "woke" and I invite you to do the same. But not in the way you may think.

I love the persistent nature of those people, even though they are trying to get others to believe that men are capable of giving birth as women do, of women being referred to by pronouns which make no sense since a single biological male cannot be a "she" and a biological female cannot be plural, such as being referred to as "them" or "they."

But think about the persistency these people exhibit for a cause in which they believe, as dysfunctional and impractical as it may be. They will scream at a person in trying to force their belief onto others, not realizing that they lack truth and people can easily see this. They are found to not be the sharpest pencil in the box; their crayon box is missing the black and white crayons which help in knowing the truth. Confusion reigns.

And that's why we need to go "woke" – "Christian Woke" that is – a new term I wish to create, and a movement that I'd love to see rejuvenated to be the "movement of the future." "Christian Woke," in its loving way, was the way of life that caused the movement in the Early Church. "Christian Woke" was the profession of truth during and after the Reformation. It was the founding power and willingness to move "Cursillo" into a movement and not simply an event or limited-time movement.

So if Cursillo has only been limited-time program in your life, perhaps it's time to return to speaking the truth in love to those who are struggling to find the truth, to know Jesus, and to understand the love of God. Be persistent in your beliefs and in sharing those beliefs, as others did for you. Some who have experienced their Cursillo Weekend believe that the movement is dysfunctional today. That happens only when Cursillistas stops living what was given them.

Most of you remember my father, Wayne Fleckenstein. He served selflessly in Cursillo for the almost-40 plus years that he was a Cursillista. He and my mother held almost every single chairperson position on Secretariat at different times. He also served on the Regional and National levels as well, through the 1990s and early 2000s.

My father did everything with a servant's heart. He thought nothing of spending countless hours on the phone with people, pulling together teams for Cursillo Weekends. However, he also would drop everything for a friend in need, from driving halfway across the state to pick up a stranded friend on the turnpike, to going and sitting at a funeral home to comfort a grieving friend.

Wayne taught me at a very young age that my time is not my own. He and my mother instilled in me that everything we have is a gift from God, so we need to glorify Him as best as possible and give what we can back. Giving of time, especially to something as great as Cursillo, is a tribute to God, saying thank you to Him for giving us this gift, this charism. And if you spent any time with Wayne, you know how generous he could be with his time and his insight into the world around us.

Wayne showed by example (and by words, too) how to live as a Christian in this needy, broken world. He never gave a second thought to rolling up his sleeves and helping a friend, in the parish, or in Cursillo. He was not without his faults, however. His stubbornness (which I also have inherited) and his temper were two things that he tried to curb as he got older.

There is a lot that my father has given me, but the best thing he gave me is wanting to be a servant for the Lord. As Jesus said, "I have come to serve, not to be served..." May we all aspire to serve each other with love, just as Christ does, just as my father did. Ultreya!~ Julie Fleckenstein

Living the Cursillo Method is Eye Opening

I see God working all around me in even the most humble of daily tasks. I owe much of that to actively living the Cursillo method in my Fourth Day, which manifests in many ways. It could be taking out the trash and something reminds me to grab the can full of diapers. It could be going to my Holy Hour to pray for Cursillo and seeing the newsletter chairperson sitting in Adoration, which was a clear reminder I was late in submitting an article to her. Sometimes it can be something big to keep me from stumbling into harm's way like the day our gas lines were marked incorrectly and uncapped, which would have resulted in death for my family and myself.

Knowing God's presence from living the method has given me the grace to converse about God with people I would not normally. A friend who was helping me at work for a couple months said to me, "How do you end up talking about God every day with your customers?" 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The Second Leg: Study
