Friends Annual Meeting and Literary Luncheon

Community activist Justin Rudd and photo-journalist Cristina Salvador-Klenz were the featured speakers on Saturday, May 17, at the Friends Annual Meeting and Literary Luncheon, held at the Grand.

About 60 members sat down to a luncheon of lemon rosemary chicken or roasted butternut squash. Special guests included Director of Library Services Cathy De Leon, Manager of Branch Services Cynthia Bautista, and new BJK Main Librarian Jessica Framson.

Friends President Barbara Sosa welcomed the members and conducted a brief meeting to elect a slate of officers recommended by the Friends Board. Unanimously re-elected to a two-year term expiring in 2027 was President Barbara Sosa, Program Vice-President Lisa Moore, Corresponding Secretary Carol Quinlan, and Director of the Blanche Collins Forum Jess Baker-Shimabukuro.

Justin Rudd spoke about growing up in Alabama and how he found a home in Southern California. He came to the luncheon straight from the beach clean-up that he and his team of volunteers perform monthly. He shared the history of his efforts to create our now-famous *Rosie's Dog*

Beach, named after his first bulldog. He also told us how he uses the library's online Libby program to access books; he just finished his 430th book since COVID began!

Photojournalist Cristina Salvador-Klenz shared breath-taking photos from her latest projects – *Intersections in Time: Photos from My Car, Long Beach, California*, and a sequel to her international award-winning book, *Hidden: Life with California's Roma Families*. She answered questions and provided the audience with her insight to a very insular people.

As the library continues its mission to reflect, serve, and celebrate our diverse community, this spring has been a vibrant season of cultural learning and connection—thanks in large part to your support as Friends of the Library.

In May, we proudly honored Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) Heritage Month with a full slate of events and resources.

Highlights included:

- * A Kickoff Event featuring Cambodian dance troupe Modern Aspara and the film screening of the Tribeca Film Festival, award winning documentary, *New Wave*, about how a young woman's rebellious youth led to her learning about her family's Vietnamese refugee experience.
- * Author Talks featuring AAPI writers sharing their stories and creative journeys.
- * A curated display of books, films, and digital collections showcasing AAPI voices in literature, history, and contemporary thought.
- * The launch of the Filipino American Heritage Collection at the Bret Harte Library.

These programs drew hundreds of participants and sparked important conversations about identity, resilience, and representation.

Now, as June begins, we're kicking off Pride Month with a celebration of LGBTQ+ history, creativity, and advocacy and also the annual Summer Reading Program (SRP). This year's theme for SRP is "Level Up at Your Library."

We are proud of the library's role as a welcoming space where every story matters. Your ongoing support as Friends help make these programs possible!

We choose an essay 'prompt' that is reflective of the theme, and the contest kicks-off the same day. This year's program kicks-off on Saturday, June 14th, and the theme is "Level Up at Your Library!" A special program at BJK Main Library will feature the Alley Cats, a Doo-Wop group that blends their musical performances with comedy, and family crafts.

(By the way....that same day at BJK Main, the Friends will have our BIG BOOK SALE! Come see all the gently-used books and media (DVDs, CDs and more) for sale at rock-bottom prices!)

This year's essay contest prompt/question is "How has the library helped you grow?" Library patrons ages 5-18 may submit entries, either on paper to one of the neighborhood branches, or online to the lbfriendsessaycontest@gmail.com. The deadline for entries is August 9th, and the awards ceremony will be held at Michelle Obama Neighborhood Library on Saturday, August 23, at 10:30 am. Flyers with complete details are available at all branches.

The essay contest is one of my favorite annual events. We receive over 100 entries, and I love reading them all. The younger patrons sometimes

include pictures with their essays, and the older patrons are always thoughtful and inspiring. It is hard to choose the winners in each age group – the judges (volunteer members of the Friends Board) do not always agree. And we have seen repeat winners as they grow out of one age category into the next, and lots of brothers and sisters submit entries.

Please encourage your children, teenagers and grandchildren to submit an essay this summer. They could win a gift card to Barnes & Noble and receive an award certificate at our ceremony in front of their family and friends. It's another reason to visit our libraries this summer – and aren't we lucky?!

Samantha, a self-described dog and plant mom, grew up in a family of readers. Her first public library was in Nyack, New York, and she credits her brother, Tony, for her early love of reading. Her grandmother, Velma Stewart, helped start the Tappan Free Library in Tappan, NY. Her mother, Susan Moon, read to her and her siblings a lot and took them to do crafts at their local library. Her favorite books growing up were: *Winnie-the-Pooh*, *The Bobbsey Twins*, *The Magical Bicycle*, and *The Boxcar Children*.

The first group she joined when she moved to Long Beach was a book club! Her most recent favorite books are: *The Water Dancer* by Ta Nehisi Coats, *A Gentleman in Moscow* by Amor Towles, *All the Light We Cannot See* by Anthony Doerr, and *Hidden Potential* by Adam Grant.

Samantha's day job is *Director of Human Resources* at Burlington Stores. She is the President of the Professional Women Toastmasters of LA and a member of both The Junior League of Long Beach and The Assistance League of Long Beach. She loves the beach, food, crafting, and playing American Mahjong.

Jess grew up between Okinawa (she personally doesn't call it part of Japan due to colonization, but usually refers to it as south of Japan) and Southern California. The first libraries she had access to were various libraries within American military bases and the Uruma Municipal Central Library in Uruma, Okinawa. The former were nice reprieves, because kids weren't allowed to leave the military base without an ID, and it got pretty boring when you're a kid. The latter was a library to which her mother took her and her brother often. That library's collection is mostly in Japanese, which her mom mainly speaks and reads. She and her brother weren't fluent, but they always had a lot of fun in the kid's section looking through books or manga. She has fond memories sitting at the tiny tables with the light refracting through the library's

stained glass windows. The library helped her feel connected to her Okinawan culture because the library displayed materials related to it, particularly around certain cultural holidays such as Shimi or Obon.

When Jess was a teenager, she identified as part of the LGBTQ+, or as an adult working with LGBTQ+ youth. Libraries serve as vital safe spaces within communities that might otherwise be hostile towards the LGBTQ+ community. After doing LGBTQ+ community-based serving work for several years, she now works at a LA County Library. She understands how vital libraries are to its local community---it is by far one of the few free spaces and resources that aims to create equitable access to information and services.

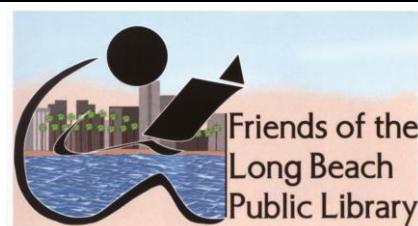

As Jess Baker says, "The more people who join, the more collective power we can have to continue advocating for our libraries."

Patrons Take Long Beach Transit to Libraries

The first thing Talia, a member of the Friends of LBPL, did when she moved to Long Beach was join a book club. Books and libraries have always been an important part of her life, and she has been bringing her first-grade son, Logan, to libraries all over Long Beach since he was an infant. I met up with Talia and Logan at the Alamitos Neighborhood Library to highlight an important part of visiting the library: they visit all the branches to participate in different programs by Long Beach Transit.

Logan, now in first grade, still remembers Toddler-Time at BJK Main, and he enjoys learning about different cultures as they attend cultural programs offered at different branches. He attends science events, Lego clubs, and other activities, and he likes going somewhere different each time. When asked which library was his favorite, he answered, "My

school library." As a retired school librarian, his answer underscored to me the importance of libraries in the every-day lives of children. Long Beach bus routes are bridges to other libraries and cultural events, from school to the wider community.

Talia finds taking the bus with Logan to be an important time for them together. She can focus on him rather than have to concentrate on traffic and parking. They can talk about what they see on their way. Logan has her undivided attention, unlike in the car.

Logan likes the fact that there are plenty of seats and interesting things to read, such as signs about safety and proper behavior on the bus. He says the drivers are polite and keep them safe, particularly if a person does not behave properly. Talia echoes this and adds that the busses are clean and on time. Yes, on time.

I agree with them on all of this, which is why I encourage other library-users to consider taking

the bus to enjoy all of our very special libraries in Long Beach. Our transit system also leads to CSULB from every part of Long Beach where other cultural events are available.

Talia volunteers for some of the programs, and over the years she has come to know many of the staff members at various branches. She says that the Long Beach Library system, along with its multi-cultural community, are reasons why she wants to remain in Long Beach.

Long Beach Transit helps all of us stay connected across our city...and avoid traffic and parking issues at the same time. How pleasant is that?
