

THE CONSTITUTION.

Our new constitution was approved and adopted by the 75 members present at the Extraordinary General Meeting, held in Sydney on 27th June, 1946.

Two amendments were submitted, and their incorporation was also approved; the details being as under:—

After paragraph 5, sub-paragraph (f) to read:

(g) That all members of 19 Bde. H.Q., 2/8 Bn., and 2/11, be permitted to make application for membership of the Association, and if acceptable to the Committee be deemed members within the meaning of Clause 5 (a) of the Constitution except that they be void of voting powers.

After paragraph 7, sub-paragraph (e), to read:

(f) Financial members outside a radius of thirty (30) miles from Sydney, notwithstanding sub-paragraph (b) of this paragraph, may forward nominations for office and votes on same to reach the Honorary Secretary not later than forty-eight (48) hours before any Annual or Extraordinary General Meeting.
