# ARMY NUMBERS.

On enlistment in the 2nd A.I.F. each and every man was allotted an "army" number, and depending from which State of the Commonwealth he enlisted, his number was distinctive, in that no other enlistee could have the same "army" number.

This was not the case when members enlisted in the 1st A.I.F. where, as will be seen, it was possible for men having the same name to also have the same number. In the first AIF officers were not allotted a number.

In the planning that took place between the two world wars, it was decided that in the event of another major conflict the "army" system of numbering would be used as opposed to the "regimental" system used in the 1st A.I.F. The "army" system being that each State would allocate numbers from one upwards, prefixing the number would be two letters, the first to indicate the State of enlistment, e.g. for N.S.W. the letter "N" followed by "X" for A.I.F. enlistment.

In N.S.W., W.A. and Victoria, the low "X" numbers were allotted to the officers, while in the other states the low "X" numbers went to the other ranks.

Detailed instructions to be followed in allotting "regimental" numbers in the 1st A.I.F. was contained in A.I.F. Order No.2 dated 26 August 1914, and is reproduced below;

"Numbering. The following instructions are to be followed in allotting regimental numbers to personnel of the Australian Imperial Force:-

Divisional Headquarters From 1 upwards. Personnell to be allotted Brigade Headquarters numbers with units Each regiment to run from Light Horse Regiments 1 upwards. Infantry Battalions Each battalion to run from 1 upwards. Numbering will be by brigades Field Artillery Batteries including Brigade Brigade commanders will arrange ammunition columns and communicate allotment to battery commanders. Divisional Ammunition Columns From 1 upwards Signal Troops and Signal Officer commanding signal

units to allot from 1 upwards

From the above system of "regimental" numbering it will be readily seen that in an expeditionary force that raised fifteen regiments of light horse, thirteen field artillery brigades, some sixty infantry battalions, five machine gun battalions, five pioneer battalions, plus the many other units that made up the 1st A.I.F., the possibility existed for men having identical names to also have identical "regimental" numbers.

On 1st August 1871 Henry Thomas GREEN was enlisted in the New South Wales Artillery as Battery Sergeant-Major. BSM GREEN was the first non-commissioned man enlisted in any of the Australian Colonial Permanent Forces and was fittingly allotted Regimental Number One in the New South Wales Artillery.
