AN IMPORTANT LETTER

From Mr. Steve Coles came a letter dated 3rd May 1982. The text is published in full.

"Back on the 11th December I wrote to you regarding the formation within your Association a subsidiary membership, to all those sons and daughters of the members of the 2/4th Infantry Battalion, or something along those lines. At the time this was only a suggestion and to date

I don't want you to think I am a nuisance, but I feel this matter to be of some importance, as Miss Taylor and myself would like to know what will be the next procedure in forming such a membership if it has indeed been accepted by your Association.

PROPOSAL

- 1. All near relatives and friends of members and deceased members of the 2/4th Bn. Association be invited to become Associate Members of the Association.
- 2. Associate members to be entitled to attend all meetings and social functions of the Association with the exception of Anzac Day Re-Union Dinner and Anzac March.
- 3. Associate members to pay the same subscriptions and le's as Association members with the exception of widows of deceased members who will be exempt from all membership fees.
- 4. Two associate members to be added to the existing Executive Committee if so elected at an Annual General Meeting.
- 5. The Association Constitution be amended to enable the incorporation of associate members.
- 6. That this proposal be discussed by the Committee and the following general meeting, and then be tabled for two months published in W.O.G. that members and interested persons be invited to put ideas and counter proposals in writing to Hon. Sec. before the August meeting.
- 7. A subsequent special meeting be duly called to draft a motion in this regard and make the necessary amendments to the constitution to enable associate members to be admitted to 2/4th Battalion Association.
