ANZAC COVE - SIXTY-FIVE YEARS AFTER

(An address by Lieutenant-Colonel Bryce Frazer)

In a nutshell, the attendance was good. The presentation was excellent and was received with acclamation at its conclusion.

That he knew what he was talking about was quickly evident to listeners who had more than an average knowledge of the campaign. Others less informed could not but be interested in the method of presentation. The strategic thinking of the time illustrated by maps on the colour projector, and Colonel Frazer's forethought in taking with him 1915 photos and taking his own colour slides of the same scene from the same spot 65 years after.

From the photographs it is obvious that the salient features of the Anzac area have changed little over the years. The "Sphinx", "Razor's Edge" "Lone Pine", "Plugge's", etc, have not changed topographically except for seasonal vegetation and, as Colonel Frazer said, the remains of the tre mches saps, tunnels, etc. are still there "if you know where to look for them".

His description of the relics lying around and the showing of a few at the address, including a dirt encrusted rifle bolt and a Turkish grenade inspired further interest. But perhaps the most poignant part of the whole presentation was the reception and burial of the ashes of an old Anzac who died in Australia and who wanted to be laid to rest beside his mate on the Peninsular. This was done with due ceremony by Turkish and War Graves Commission officials, and recorded on camera by Lt.-Col. Bryce Frazer.

Congratulations, Sir, and thank you for your presentation.

"I also met Sir Ivan again when he was Guest Speaker at the Annual Change-over of Inverell Legacy, at which time I was a Legatee and a member of the Bingarn Committee of Inverell Legacy.

"On another occasion when Harry Stafford was failing in health, I accompanied him to a meeting of 2/4th Bn. Association as a stand=by driver. I wasn't needed in that capacity as Harry managed quite well. It was a pleasure to meet the members of your Association, and I couldn't help but notice the high regard in which my sponsor was held by them.

"It wasn't long after that that Harry moved to Nelson Bay and I never saw him again. He was a proud torch-bearer for the 2/4th Bn. So, Jim, you can appreciate why I was pleased to learn that you were one of this group and I am proud to know you."
