DEDICATION and UNVEILING of the COMMEMORATION PLAQUE and FLAGPOLE.

At the NEW CLUB BUILDING - POTTS POINT of the COUNTRY WOMEN'S ASSOCIATION.

On Friday, 11th November 1983, some 16 members of the Bn. Assn., along with their wives assembled at the Country Women's Assn's Club Rooms at Potts Point The reason, to witness the dedication of the new flagpole and the unveiling c the memorial plaque. The flagpole and plaque were donated by the Bn. Assn. to honour all the members who enlisted from the country centres of N.S.W. and joined the 2/4 Infantry Battalion during World War II and paid the supreme sacrifice. Prior to the ceremony, members and their wives were treated to a beautiful morning tea, being waited on by the various area representatives of the C.W.A. coming from all parts of N.S.W. for this auspicious occasion.

Mrs Commens of Junee, the State President of the N.S.W. Country Women's Assn. called the gathering to assemble outside the building at approx. 1050 hrs. Addressing the assembly, she thanked the President and members of the Assn. for their generosity and thoughtfulness in donating the new vandal proof flagpole and memorial plaque. She said the C.W.A. were indeed highly honoured to accept the new flagpole. They looked upon it as a fitting memorial to all the young men who had enlisted from the country towns of N.S.W. and never came back. To have such a memorial given them by one of the distinguished fighting units of the 2nd A.I.F. was in itself a cherished honour that will forever remain in the annals of the C.W.A. of N.S.W.

At precisely 1100 hrs Bugler Peter Scala of the Waverley Band sounded the "Last Pos and after two minutes silence sounded the stirring notes of Cavalary's "Revei"." One must compliment young Peter Scala on the feeling he put into the renditio. of the two revered military "calls", he really put that extra feeling into every note and played his instrument like a true veteran.

After the sounding of "Reveille" Mrs Commens then called on our Patron, Sir Ivan Dougherty to unveil the memorial Plaque. Sir Ivan removed the White Over Green cover from the Plaque and read the inscription appearing thereon. Sir Ivan said that although the plaque's wording commemorated the members of the 2/4 Bn who paid the supreme sacrifice, in his view, it also remembers all those young people who joined the Navy, the Air Force and those devoted women of the Nursing Services who also gave their lives.

After the ceremony members and their wives were taken on a conducted tour of the building, which proved to be very enlightening.

Letter from Harold Smith - late of 4Bn A.I.F. 1914-18 and the Camel Corps.

(NB - Harold has managed to get a lot of information onto a comparatively small amount of paper, making it difficult to transcribe with complete accuracy. However in presenting the following your type-setter has endeavoured to record Harold's writings as close to verbatim as possible.)

Mr Laurie Waterhouse Hon Secretary of White over Green Dear Laurie

Well mate reading WOG I saw where the 2/4 are going to Victoria Barracks. I year at this time, after the ceremony at the "Cenotaph" we went to Victoria Barracks also to the Museum. Before I Forget - a request. When looking over the War Relicks, the only Colur Patch of the Camel Corps was the Red Pyrimid, 1st Battalion Colour Patch, 2nd Batt was a black Pyrimid, I forgot 1st were Aussies and formed of chaps who were in Hospital at Abbeersear and in the 14th A.G.H. and on comig good volunteered to go in the Camels that was mostly all who had bee wounded on Gallipoli, 2nd were English, Scottish & Irish, 3rd Battalion was a green Prymid all Aussies although I ve an idea there were two companies of N. Zers Could be wrong, 4th a Blue Pyrmid I'm sure of this lot 15th & 16th were N.Z. who had been in New Zealand Mounted Rifles 17th my Coy & 18th both Aussies, those colur Patches were absent as were the 14 ALH & 15 ALH. Would somebody be kind enough to let me know if those Colour Patches are alongside of a glass fronted case thats full of Colour Patches minitures of course. We didn't get any Refreshments & I could have sunk 4 or 5 Vin Hallannin was with me, wrong way round I was with him & we were last to leave, its a very interesting place. I'd like to go once more & if I live long enough I'll get a nephew to take me there. He and his wife are very interested in the Relics of WWI. One thing more Re the Chaps who are called Ross Smith, my or our Step Brother was called Ross, he enlisted in the 2/1st Machine Gun Battalion went to England on the Mary returned to North Africa and from there to Greece his mob were in the rear guard & a more Bloodthirsty bloke would have been hard to find. He came out to Bourke to me when I was Roo Shooting the hard way using the old .303 with Dum Dum bullets. He got away from Greece on a Distroyer & he said all day long they brought down every plane that tried to sink their boat & just as the sun was going down one came in the sun sinking us we couldn't see until it too late but it was brought down as the boat took a list he pulled off his boots slung them round his neck

Harold Smith's Letter (continued) also a pair of Binoculars & a Prismatic Compass which he took off an officer, German of course, his boots floated away but the other two things he hung onto them & another Distroyer picked up most of them who were swimming they were put ashore (presumably Crete - Ed) & said Ross I looked around for a pair of boot got them off an officer who didn't have any more use for them, then looked Round for a Machine Gun & all the ammo I could find put in a heap & he said that not one Parratrooper came down within range of my gun alive they paid dearly he said He dropped dead about 4 or 5 years back over Collaroy way, he suffered a lot was in a stright Jacket for over 12 months. Poor fellow was married but no family There was a chap in the 17th Company Camels of coursehis name Jones J.J.J. his nickname, Double Barrell. My nickname was BWI every Smith had a nickname another in my section was F.A.Smith & he got it especially on Pay Days the full words, another Mungindi Smith he had a walruss Mostash & was always referred to as old M You could guess the three words of mine, they are a bit religious & charcoal would make a white mark on their faces. I was in number I section the worst one in a hop over, or as we had to do at Amman take 2 lines of trenches from the Turk to get shelter but not for long 3 hop overs in 3 days then the English Infantry came up & dug in, we went back across the Jordan River on a pontoon bridge had to get off and lead our camels over & soto the west of the Jordan Valley 6 weeks before we were relieved then back to the Holy City and Jaffa Road, our camels wer taken from us and we got Horses and Swords not slashers but made for sticking and even if dying on the ground the swords could reach them. The only thing I got was a goose broke his wing. Well now enclosed OH No just remembered, I thought there was 1 cheque in my book & when I went to write it out I remembered that I used it for drinks Apple Cider, Apple Juice no sugar in it, & someRaspberry flavoured stuff goes well with water. Only Friday evenings I have a few stubbies with 2 of my best friends and again on a Sunday mornings Chook Run (Bowls). I will have to send you something for stamps & please one WOG is enough why send me 2, expensive that is & I know you dident win the Melbourne Cup or the Lottery Cheers to all. I'll make a trip down one of these days to go to a 4th meeting with the people who send me the Monthly Journal, its read from the top of page 1 to the end. I'll leave this open until I can get a new cheque book and will send you the stamp money if nothing else. 2nd Batt colour patch Black Pyrimid. Well it would not be right to not tell you my Sweetheart was very pleased to see me back in Bourke, I told her some few weeks ago I was going to live in Queens-land & she cried. Poor little girl only 4 feet Eleven inches in Height, figure not like the younger ones, she has a very nice disposition & I love her, have asked her to marry me. No she says you should not marry into my big family, because if living in the one house, there would be young people in and out at all times of the day and nights, and your nerves are not the best, that would make you chip them and we would be unhappy. So I've got to live alone as I have for the last 18 years & I get very lonely at times. I won't live with any of my 3 children. My Daughter is the one who has told me I am too old to be living alone so its sell out & go over to be within a couple hours drive from their place & as my youngest Son has offered me a 2 bedroom cottage at Redcliffe on the coast north of Brisbane to live in it rent free for the rest of my life, but my legs are giving me a lot of pain & theres a big possibility I'll have to go into a Home for the Aged, if so its to a R.S.L. Village on the coast of Brisbane & as I was born in Queensland I'll go back to die there & be cremated, my ashes are to be spread on a green at the Cunnamulla Bowls Club to make the grass grow it would be awful if the grass died. Please excuse mistakes and bad spelling 9-11-83 & alittle after 4pm & I've been down the street paying a debt and collecting my allowances for the next fortnight & I've been doing it for just on 21 years. Also got the cheque book. In these Back Country areas a cheque book is necessary for one does not need much cash except for the Pokies and Grog wine and beer. My favourite is good amber lemonade. OH yes there is crook beer and wine can't say about the hard stuff, anyway its over a dollar for a nip & I've only the Service Pension & am a greedy old B....d & number is 147032. How does one go about getting to the Museum are there any special days? Cheers to all from Harold.
