On Sir Ivan's suggestion I am forwarding this letter to you, which could possibly be put into W.O.G. and somebody might be able to give further information.

The man we are talking about is NX 2060, Pte. Jack Bennett, "C" Coy 2/4 Bn. The honour roll in the War History indicates that he K.I.A. 16th April, 1941. Anyone with any information is requested to contact Cec Chrystal, 24 The Battlement, Castlecrag, 2068.

MEMORIAL TO VETERANS AT "THE ROCKS"

A memorial in the shape of a sculptured bronze plaque depicting WWII Diggers in battle array, created by Lyndon Dadswell, the famous sculptor, himself a veteran of 6 Div., will be unveiled by His Excellancy Sir James Rowland, KBE, DFC, AFC, Kt. St. J., Governor of N.S.W. at "Customs Officers Stairs", Circular Quay West (i.e. George St. North) at 10.00 a.m. on Sunday, 17th July, 1983.

Representatives from other states will be in attendance along with many leading citizens and servicemen. Veterans wishing to take part in the parade are invited to attend. The parade includes a short march from the Circular Quay overpass along Circular Quay West and past the overseas terminal the site of the memorial.

Medals should be worn.

Though the memorial is dedicated to the men of the 6th Division, it's siting in such a prominent position, facing down the harbour, must commemorate the sailing of all who left these shores during the Second World War.

The previous evening, Sat. 16th July, a get-together of 6th.Div. Veterans will take place at Paddington Woollahra R.S.L.
