SPEAKING OF "DAY BOYS."

About late May and during June 1940, during the critical battles in France, enlistments in the A.I.F. rose from a disappointing low to an unmanageable high. A lot of Sydney enlistments were trained on a '9 to 5' basis and going home to sleep. This occurred at the Marrickville Barracks which, in peace time included 'A' and 'DON' Support Companies, B.H.Q. and Headquarter Wing of the 55/53 Battalion. Also in the same depot was the entire 14th Artillery Brigade, complete with 18 pounder field guns, limbers, horses, etc., together with Supply and Ammunition columns of the Army Service Corps. The Army Medical Corps was also established there.

The parade ground was something like 400 x 250 yards and initially there were two platoons of approximately 40 strong. Quite rapidly these grew to 15 platoon of the same size, all trained by Militiamen. Peter Cade, who was a Lance-Sgt. in the militia had the dubious distinction of being drilled by one of his erstwhile corporals!

The routine of the life was that we reported at 0800 hrs and knocked off "work" or training about 1600/1700 hrs. We were trained in squad drill and the handling of weapons. Our route marches were through the suburban streets of Enmore, Petersham, Sydenham, Tempe, Marrickville and along Myrtle Street, past Dick Pinson's house many times, and once to Sans Souci when we got back very late.

For a band we had four side drummers and a base drum carried by two men as the drummer ("Mary"Pickford) was smaller than the drum. Out of this band, four men finished up in 2/4 Bn., "Mary", a chap named Crawford, Peter Ca and George Ponting.

Agroup of local ladies provided our mid-day lunch for five of our five and a half day training week. This lasted, I think, for about three months, the reason being that a new camp at Tamworth had not yet been completed.

From No.1 Platoon alone the following finished up in 2/4 Bn: Harry Wright, Jack Braid, Harry Westwood, Joe Reid, Peter Cade, Bill Bourke and myself. Luke Tallon, brother of Bob (the "titun tutin took" - already an identity in the battalion) was on a draft but I don't think he got to the battalion.

Of the people who trained us, all 55/53 Bn. personnel, Lt. Reardon finally got his transfer to the A.I.F. and finished up in the 2/3 Bn. with all the earl enlistments from the 55/53rd. Having returned from the Middle East, when sighted in early 1943, he was much delighted that he had bought a house in Rose Bay at a give-away price from a "reffo" who took flight after the submarine attack on Sydney Harbour. Of Sgt. Berriman and Cpl. "Stumpy" Johnstone no information at all. Cpl. Cyril Young was killed in action in the early fighting in New Guinea and initially was buried in Soputa War Cemetery near Buna.

Do any members know of any other "Day Boy" establishments in any part of Australia during 1939/45?

"Carpenter's Tools."

As you know Alf Carpenter and I usually leave our cars at Gosford and Woy Woy respectively, and travel to committee meetings by train. During a recent return trip after a "refreshing" supper Alf started recalling a few incidents of immediate post war years.

Alf and Johnny Hawkins shared a big suitcase whilst partaking of a certain sea voyage at the expense of His Majesty's Government in 1942. (No doubt the R.S.M. and C.Q.M.S. could label it "Wanted on voyage." It contained Alf's Sam Browne and S.D.uniform, odd army manuals and a few souvenirs, etc.) After Alf left the 2/4 and gained his commission, among the many jobs he had, he had at one time lectured and demonstrated anti-personnel bombs etc. Two phosphorous bombs of about 9" in length looked particularly attractive so in they went into the suitcase. Knowing Alf they would certainly been deloused, good soldier that he was.

However after 7 years of army life, when he got home, as storage space was short in his house, he tossed the suitcase up in the rafters through the manhole and promptly forgot all about it.

Years later they sold the house and took a trip overseas and returned to a new house. Alf came home from work one day to"find Marj nearly hitting the roof." 'You could have blown us all up - fancy selling a house with high explosives in it' etc. etc.

It appears that the new owners were having electrical work done and the suitcas was found. The bombs must have had a few grains of phosphorous left which on contact with the air had rusted out a little. The new residents panicked and called the police who swore they were alive - moved the residents out and called in the army bomb disposal boys. They also said they were alive and took them carefully away between sand bags to dispose of them. Alf says that
