THE 1984 COUNTRY REUNION - GOSFORD. The name of Gosford: - synonymous for the 1984 Country Reunion of the 2/4 Aust. Infantry Battalion Association, held on the week-end of the 6/7th October, 1984. What a week-end it was! One that will be rembered by all who were fortunate enough to attend. They came from every State in the Commonwealth and from all parts of N.S.W. There were those who were attending a reunion for the first time and, of course, those who had never missed one. Approximately two hundred and forty members wives, as well as, in some cases, families and friends, attended the reunion, making it one of the most successful reunions yet held. What made it so was the atmosphere that was created from the affability between the members themselves, as well as our hosts, the Gosford R.S.L. from whom great hospitality was received. One cannot speak or write too highly of the organizing committee, headed by Jack Partridge and his wife Mary, assisted by George and Heather Mitchell and their respective families. Other people who gave their time and energy included Elsie Bradford, Len and Nina Hart and a number of other young people. One can say sincerely, well done and thanks for a wonderful week-end. The week-end began, for the early arrivers, on the Friday. They joined in the RSL Club activities, such as raffles, pokies, restaurant, etc, as well as the many and varied assortments of refreshments available. Some struck it lucky - Betty Dalla was seen receiving a tray of meat, which I think finished up in someone else's fridge. Doug Slinger, from W.A. was seen renewing his acquaintance with NSW beer, whilst many others were just renewing acquaintances and old friendships. So it went on into Saturday when the tail-enders started to arrive. The atmosphere built up for the evening when the official dinner was held, at which the Mayor of Gosford gave the Association an official welcome to Gosford. The main highlight of the reunion (and there were many) was the attendance of the Parramatta Caledonian Pipe Band. Some weeks ago they decided to join us at our reunion in order to assist in the success of the function. This was greatly appreciated by all concerned, especially the Organising Committee. The band, resplendent as ever, commenced proceedings for the reunion by assembling at the front of the Gosford RSL., at 5pm. 107 2/4thers formed up in "Column of Route" behind the Battalion Banner and, led by the band, marched through the spacious grounds of the RSL Club to the memorial flag-stand area where there were three flags flying, the Australian Flag, the Union Jack and the Battalion Colours. Here a wreath-laying ceremony was carried out by Sir Ivan Dougherty, President Alf Carpenter and the President of the Gosford RSL, Mr Tom Prosser.

After the sounding of the "Last Post" and "Reveille" President Alf recited the "Ode". Captain Phil Smith MBE MC MID then delivered a short address on the formation and history of the 2/4th Infantry Battalion, 2nd A.I.F. At the conclusion of this ceremony the Pipie Band played the marchers back to the front of the RSL Club where President Alf dismissed the parade.

The main function commenced at 1900 hrs, taking the form of an official dinner, followed by entertainment by the Parramatta Pipe Band who excelled themselves and earned the appreciation shown by the members of their efforts.

The Reunion Dinner was held in the main auditorium of the club, the decor was, as usual, white and green, each table bearing a floral arrangement in those colours. The stage front was one mass of colours from the floral arrangements, which must have taken hours and great pride in arranging. Once again our thanks go to Len

and Nina Hart for their magnificent efforts.

The dinner was commenced by the Master of Ceremonies, George Mitchell, calling on Dick Morris to recite "Grace", followed by thr proposal of the Loyal Toast by Phil Smith. This then was followed by an address of welcome to the guests, members of the Association, their wives, families, friends and visitors by the Chairman of the Gosford Reunion Committee, Jack Partridge, who expressed the following

"Our Associationis, this year, celebrating the 45th Anniversary of the formation of the 2/4th Infantry Battalion, 2nd A.I.F. The fact that it has survived for 45 years and indeed, goes from strength to strength, as witness the large gathering here this evening, is testimony to th loyalty, pride and comradeship which were originally fostered by our Patron and former Commanding Officer, Sir Ivan Dougherty and were forged in those desperate years, 1939 to 1945. This comradeship has new waivered and indeed strengthens as the years roll by. It is my sincere wish the our guests here this evening absorb some of this spirit of comradeship that is so deeply embedded within our Association. That was the theme of Jack's welcome. Afterwards Jack announced the apologies which were numerous and in the interests of conserving space are not printed here.

Our special guests included our Patron, Sir Ivan Dougherty, Alderman Peter and Mrs Coleman - Mayor of Gosford, The President of the Gosford RSL Sub-branch - Mr Tom Rosser and Mrs Rosser, Messrs Jack Ryan and Harry Newhouse - Gallipoli veterens of the 4th Battalion 1914-18.

Then came the Address of Civic Welcome to the township of Gosford by the Mayor who spoke highly of the Battalion when at war and of the Association, which, he said, had created a great "Esprit de Corps" which had stood the test of time. He then went on to invite the Association to enjoy the many sights and recreational areas that the Gosford District offered.

Harry Wright, our Welfare Officer, followed by reading the Last Post of recently

departed comrades and reciting the Ode.

Then came the President of the Gosford ROL Dub-branch, Mr Tom Rosser, an ex-RAAF pilot of 1939/45 War. He proposed the toast "The 2/4th Infantry Battalion". He expressed his pleasure at being invited and hoped that the Association enjoyed their stay and that we would return in the future to stage another reunion. Pr Alf then responded on behalf of the Battalion, expressing his desire to see the dent friendship so evident at this reunion, to be carried on for all time. After President Alf came the Occasional Address delivered by Sir Ivan Dougherty. He spoke of the District of Gosford, how he had fond memories of it and what a great place it was to hold a reunion. He also stressed a hope that the friendship created at Gosford would endure through the years ahead, wishing all present a happy and memorable

Allen Lindsay. Senior Vice-President of the Association, was then called upon to give the last official speech of the night, that of the "Toast to our Official Guests" to which Allen responded in true form and pleasing brevity in view of the

THE OCTOBER MONTHLY MEETING - 1984.

Both Committee and General Meetings were held on Tuesday, 23rd October, at the Gallipoli Memorial Club at 1130 hrs and 1430hrs, respectively, President Alf Carpenter presiding at both meetings. Thirty-one members in all, making it the smallest attendance this year and the commencement of the daytime meetings. This was no doubt due to there being no October WOG published and therefore no notice to members. After the usual one minute's silence and the apologies the correspondence was dealt with. The main business arising out of the minutes was on the controversial title of the ABC documentary "The Unnecessary War". A detachment from the Grenadier Guards Regiment is being invited out by the Royal Agricultural Society, and will possibly attend this function. (Whose fine hand do we perceive behind this operation?) There will be a special chapel at the Garrison Church to be dedicated plus a memorial window, also various dinners to attend. A Ladies Night will be held at Arncliffe Drill Hall on Friday, 14th December, Supper will be served at a cost of \$3 to\$4 per head, drinks to be paid for as ordered.
