The question is: Did any member keep a detailed diary of the Aitape-Wewak campaign, preferably from the viewpoint of his personal experiences from a Section, Platoon or Company level? The thought is that the existing trilogy of Libya, Greece and Crete diaries could become a quadrilogy (new word invented by W.O.G.?) with the inclusion of such a diary by mutual arrangement of those concerned and thus cover all the fightingin which 2/4 Bn. was involved. If any member has a detailed diary of the New Guinea phase of 2/4 Bn's campaigns the editor would like to hear from him.

Evacuation of Crete - May29 1941.

Early dawn - Hereward and Imperial both sunk about 14 miles from Heraklion Harbour. "Rocky" Denyer(NX5926) and "Curley" Gorman(NX5159) both of 15 Platoon C Coy. were rescued from the sinking "Imperial" and taken onto "Hotspur" - as the ship pulled away both Rocky and Curley protested loudly that they could see small lights (of cigarettes) near the stern but no-one believed them and there could be no check or time to wait. In May, 1944 "Artie" White, (NX15539 - ex C Coy. transferred to RAAF) was shot down over Germany. In POW camp he was told by an inmate that he had been left on a sinking ship off Crete and in company with a British Sgt. they took many hours to swim to shore and capture. The man was from the 2/4th and Arthur cannot remember his name but thinks it was Webb or Hill. "Rocky" and "Curley" will buy drinks for our comrade at the next re-union if he can be identified.

President's Annual Report.

We are in a sound financial position despite the capital expenditure incurred in purchasing a copying machine to enable us to print and produce the Monthly Journal entirely within our own resources, and further despite "non-recurring" expenditure associated with (a) the presentation of a flagpole and commemorative plaque to the Country Women's Association of N.S.W. and (b) the acquisition of our own new Association Flag which, distinct from our Banner as used on Anzac Day and similar occasions, will be used on more personal affairs such funerals of our members and so forth.

Some of the more significant events of the year were:-

Anzac Day: The wreath-laying ceremony was not as well attended as in previous years but the main march and the re-union luncheon were up to our usual standard and we had a very good attendance of country members. Once again we were led by "our" Parramatta Pipe Band, and in the late afternoon several of our ladies joined us at the Gallipoli Memorial Club at the conclusion of their own luncheon.

Annual Church Parade - Association 4th Infantry Battalions: The pre-service march was held in less-than-favourable weather but was most impressive due to the soldierly bearing and immaculate appearance of two companies of 4Bn. Southport Re-union: at its conclusion each year, we invariably feel that the most recent Country or Interstate Re-union has been "the greatest" and whether this is right or merely a figment of our ageing imaginations we can certainly claim that every Re-union has been a success. Southport was no exception, thanks to the hospitality extended to us by the R.S.L. Club and Sub-branch and the excellent organisation of all the functions by our Southport Re-union Committee.

Daylight Meetings: Probably the most radical change in our Sydney activities has been the trial introduction of Daylight Monthly Meetings. Treasurer's Annual Report - 1983.

Total Association Funds at 31st December, 1983 were \$12332 compared with \$13347 at 31st December, 1982, a reduction in funds of \$1015. The main contributor to this reduction was the expenditure of \$1500 on a Nshua Printing Machine. The Association will enjoy the benefits of this expenditure in future years by way of reduced costs in the production of the monthly newsletter.

Members continue to give the Association good support by the regular remittance of subscriptions and donations, however it must be realised that the Association's income will gradually decline with the diminution in the list of members and falling interest rates.

Therefore your committee must continue to exercise tight control over expenditure.
